Presenters

Cynthiane J. Morgenweck, MD, MA

Associate Professor of Bioethics and Medical Humanities and Anesthesiology

Dr. Morgenweck, Clinical Ethicist at the Center for Bioethics and Medical Humanities, teaches in the Center's graduate program and serves as an advisor to bioethics graduate students. She received her MD in 1977 and her MA in 1999, both from the Medical College of Wisconsin. She practiced anesthesiology for 13 years in a community hospital in Sheboygan, Wisconsin. She is the faculty advisor for BIG, the Bioethics Interest Group for medical students at the Medical College of Wisconsin. She teaches both medical students and graduate students. Dr. Morgenweck serves on the ethics committees of the Milwaukee County Behavioral Health Division, Froedtert Hospital and Curative Care Network. Dr. Morgenweck is co-director of the Bioethics Pathway for medical students. She served on one of several Institutional Review Boards at the Medical College for twelve years. She is team leader for the ethics consultation service at Froedtert Hospital, one of the two major adult teaching hospitals for the Medical College. Dr. Morgenweck's areas of interest include ethical issues related to the perioperative experience; informed consent; clinical trials and placebo surgery; do not resuscitate orders; use of scarce resources; errors in medicine; pain management and palliative care; professionalism; and ethical issues in behavioral health care.

Ryan Spellacy Ph.D.

Dr. Spellacy is The Ursula von der Ruhr Professor of Bioethics in the Center for Bioethics and Medical Humanities at the Medical College of Wisconsin, where he chairs one of the IRBs. His work focuses on research ethics, informed consent, ethical issues in psychiatry, and community involvement in research. He advised the Patient Centered Outcomes Research Institute regarding engaging stakeholders in the peer review process, the Association of American Medical Colleges on IRBs and community based research. Recently, he was the co-PI for an NIH funded national study evaluating a novel, easier to read consent form for blood and marrow transplant trials and currently leads a project to create a community-engaged research ethics training program as well as a study to evaluate the strengths and barriers regarding cancer clinical trial participation in Milwaukee's African American population.

Dawn Pflugrad Psy.D.

Dr. Pflugrad received her doctorate in Clinical Psychology in 2008. She received an additional graduate degree from the Medical College of Wisconsin in Clinical Bioethics in 2014. She is currently a Licensed Psychologist in the State of Wisconsin performing forensic and clinical work. She is employed by the Department of Health Services and the Wisconsin Department of Corrections conducting forensic risk evaluations. She also has a private practice and holds a position as an Associate Professor at the Wisconsin School of Professional Psychology, where she teaches Ethics and chairs the Human Research Subjects Committee. Dr. Pflugrad is one of two certified STATIC-99R trainers in the State of Wisconsin and the only certified STABLE/ACUTE trainer in the state. In addition to her clinical and teaching duties, she conducts research and regularly presents at international conferences her research findings related to criminality, risk assessment and treatment of violence.
