

Catholic Saints on Education

Every calendar year, the church celebrates saints who inspire and teachers and educational leaders. Our Parish School calls attention to those saints who served Catholic educations and people throughout their life.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seaton (Jan. 4th)

The feast of Mother Seton on January 4 invites us to ponder this saint's life (1774-1821) of dual commitments to education and caring for society's at-risk children. She founded America's first parish school.




St. John Neumann (Jan. 5th)

St. John Neumann, was a native of the present-day Czech Republic. He traveled to America, was ordained a priest, and became Bishop of Philadelphia in 1852. He oversaw the construction of numerous parishes and schools for immigrants, founding the first Catholic diocesan school system in the United States. The Church's January 5 feast is an opportunity to reflect upon the teaching vocation as a journey shared with others.



St. Andre Bessette (Jan. 6th)

On January 6, St. André Bessette (1845-1937), a religious brother in the Congregation of Holy Cross, is celebrated for his unique ministry to the sick and marginalized, which grew miraculously even as he humbly served a Catholic school in Montreal—as a porter, not a teacher.

Atonement Track and Field

The Middle School and High School Participated in their first Track and Field meet, of the year, this past week. It was a good start for the Teams. Middle School Boys 8th grade finish 3rd as a overall at the San Antonio Christian meet. James Vester ran 12.6 in the 100 meters (1st place) and second in the 200 meters with a time of 25.5 Personels best. AJ Pena, won the 400m with a time of 56.66 also, a Personal best. He also won the 800m with a Personal best, 2:13.

Michael Cantu came in second in the 800m with Personal best time of 2:49. Dominic Peteres came in second in the 110m Hurdles with a time of 18.1, Personal best. The 4x200 Boys 8th grade came in 2nd with a time of 1:54. And, 4x400 Relay came in third with a time of 4:11. Karolina Garza won the 100 meters with a time of 14:35 and the 400 meters with a time of 1:11, Personals best.

The High Schoolers ran at the Holy Cross meet. Gabriel Prochko ran a personal best in the 400 meters with a time of 54.1, first place. Sergio Almenarez(JV Div.) can in 2nd in the Long jump with a jump of 17'11", Personal best. Mia Robles won the 100 meters in the JV Div. with a time of 14.3 and also won the 400m with a time of 1:11, Personals best. Mia also won the Long jump in the JV div. with a jump of 13.9, Personal best.

Kathleen Morrow came in second in the 800m and second place in the 1600 with a time of 6:36 with a Personal best time of 2:56. Maire Kennedy came in 2nd in the 1600m with a time of 6:39 and 1st in the 3200m with a time 14:30, both times Personal best.

Learning about Bacteria

We have been learning a lot about the beauty of God's creation in AP Biology as we prepare for the upcoming test in May! Earlier this quarter we delved into understanding the simplest of God's organisms, bacteria. Bacteria are unicellular creatures that are prokaryotes, which means they lack a nucleus to hold their DNA. In our desire to learn more about these organisms, we swabbed various places around the school to see which had the most bacteria. We investigated 10 different items including: the castle on the playground, the nurse's office, the phone in the lab, the hand railing, the water fountain, and even a fish used for dissection in 7th grade life science. We found that the fish was the cleanest. We also added hand sanitizer to one of the samples and found that it destroyed some of the bacteria as we expected. We look forward to learning more about the mystery of God's creation as we perform more labs in AP biology!

It wasn't until the beginning of my senior year that I even entertained the idea of pursuing a degree in music. Before then, I felt I lacked the necessary talent to earn a degree in music let alone a scholarship. Perhaps that is why I encourage my colleagues to push our students so hard, for I can only imagine the heights I could have reached had I started my journey with their natural abilities. But my goal is not to drive every student to be the next Pavarotti, Aretha Franklin, Billy Joel, Adele, or even the next music teacher; instead I want to give them the tools to create opportunities to pursue such dreams and aspirations. I want students to believe that if a kid from a broken home who had extensive speech therapy for five years can earn an over \$100,000 scholarship to the University of Miami for singing, then no dream is too big, no problem too challenging, and no situation too impossible to overcome.

Loving to Learn Latin!



Your children continue to learn Latin in the Lower School. Grades Pre-K and Kinder learn through fun songs, games and stories. We learn new vocabulary words every week and they are learning their Our Father in Latin too! Have them sing a song or two for you. First and Second grades use their workbook and also learn new vocabulary on a weekly basis, their workbook is filled with short exercises, writing exercises and fun pages to reinforce their learning. They can ask you what your name is, name the parts of the body, the people in a family, items in a classrooms and various animals, all in Latin!

Third, fourth and fifth grades learn not only the fun vocabulary but grammar as well. The way the program is set up is that it is parallel to our Shurley Grammar program so the students reinforce what they have learned in English grammar when they learn new concepts in Latin.
