This home exists to take in women that have been pushed out by their families, because of their age or health. It's a sad cultural injustice, but Harvest India is committed to this population. These women have become prayer warriors for the ministry.

Through a series of events in 2011, the property owner that Harvest India was leasing from would not renew the lease, because of the people living there. Suresh and his team began working to try and locate another home for these women. The journey was disheartening, every landlord shut the door for the same reason as the previous one.

Although Harvest India had a basic plot of land where they planned to build an Elderly Home in years to come, there was only one structure already built with cinder block walls, cement floor, and a sheet metal roof. With NO running water and NO power, the conditions were deplorable.



In 2012, our team went to visit this new location where our friends were living and our hearts were broken by the conditions we found them in. We wept thinking about this being our parents, grandparents or ANYONE for that matter. We had to do something for these women. Our team rallied through personal donations and various fundraising tactics to get this space built out and finished asap.

One of the fundraisers birthed out of a song that I wrote while we were on that trip called: Found in You. Through the song, we were able to tell the story and donate all the proceeds to this project. Within 30 days of our trip, the money was raised and construction began. Our 2013 team just returned from India and
