At the edge of a clearing next to her house, Rose bent over her beautiful kitchen garden busily harvesting vegetables alongside other women of Nalinaibi Village. Happy chatter swirled around the little group.

"Finding food to feed my children used to be very difficult," Rose told me. "Before FARM STEW taught us about farming, we had no idea how to space vegetables properly or how to mulch them. We had never thought of using the small spaces in our yards to grow things."

Rose shared with me that FARM STEW has opened the minds of so many families in her village to all the ways that they can provide food for themselves and their children to eat.

Picking up the basket of dark green leafy vegetables she had just harvested, Rose told me, "I love my children very much!" I could see that it was true from the look in her eyes. She continued, "But love did not feed my children. It used to be very hard to feed my family. Everyone in the village was very busy just trying to survive, and when it was the dry season there was very little food. But now



that you have taught me how to grow a kitchen garden, with heavy mulch to keep food growing in the dry season, make, and cook more nutritious meals for my family, I am happy. Now I can not only love my children, but also feed them, every day! Thank you!"

## Your Generosity is Bringing Relief in the Sudan War

At just the right time, God opened a door for FARM STEW (FS) to begin in Khartoum, Sudan, at the request of Egypt Sudan Field (ESF) of Middle East North Africa Union (MENAU).

Last fall my wife, Jennifer, and I journeyed back to the Middle East where we had served with ADRA for 5 1/2 years. FARM STEW was invited to the MENAU year-end meetings and then to Sudan to launch FS. Through the church we hired and trained four new FS Trainers

that began sharing the FS recipe with members in four Khartoum church groups. None of us had any idea that in a short time Khartoum would become a battlefield.

On Sabbath morning, April 15, 2023 fighting engulfed the city. By God's grace our trainers escaped, taking along many others at great risk. Most church members became

part of the **2 million plus Sudanese** who have had to flee their homes due to the violence. With our trainers, **FS rapidly shifted gears** to provide emergency food and shelter to over 100 members who fled to South Sudan and helped another 100 who remained in the country but were displaced. We're getting them gardening supplies, just in time for planting. FS, with ESF, also executed an additional 100



supplies, just in time for planting. FS, with ESF, also evacuated an additional 100 members from the fighting that continues in Khartoum, by hiring trucks to move them to safer locations.

Without your generous support none of this would be possible. Our Sudanese brothers and sisters in Christ are tremendously grateful. Truly, God's timing has been a miracle!

The first French training also amazed the 24 participants, including Bible workers, pastors, and their wives, as well as guest trainees from Cameroon and the Ivory Coast.



beans, it was time for the fireless cooker demonstration. After a short time heating the thick pan on the fire, the trainers took the pan off the fire and placed it inside the cooker. After only 40 minutes, the igname and beans were tender and ready to eat! This amazed everyone, as this process often would take hours on the fire.

One of the lessons that provides Freedom from Drudgery and Disease is called the fireless cooker. In it, participants learn to make a simple box or basket with dried plant materials as an insulator that helps hot foods continue cooking even off of the fire. This reduces the need for firewood that needs to be carried for long distances and the smoke that is breathed constantly while women cook (before they build the efficient, low-smoke cookstoves that FARM STEW also teaches).

During the training, after the women explained the process of preparing "igname" (a local root crop) and

about the training that FARM STEW has brought for them on how to use their new washable pads. They are not afraid of being shamed by menstruation anymore.

#### **Compassionate Courage!**

Last year, in a letter I sent, I introduced you to one of my favorite Biblical heroes, Ebed Melech. I hope you remember this courageous and compassionate "servant of the king," as his name means. He was serving under King Zedekiah during the days of the prophet Jeremiah. When Jeremiah spoke the Lord's words, instead of obeying, the king chose to reject the message and throw Jeremiah into a miry pit. He was left there to die of hunger.

But Ebed Melech, an Ethiopian eunuch, had the courage to do good, confront the king about the evil plan to kill Jeremiah, and devise a new plan to reverse the harm. Ebed Melech had compassion for Jeremiah, seeing that he would die of hunger if left without assistance. Because of his courage, King Zedekiah finally did the right thing. He allowed Ebed Melech to gather 30 men, ropes, and even clothes to compassionately raise Jeremiah out of the sinking clay to eventual freedom and food! (Jeremiah 38:7-13)

Many of our brothers and sisters in Christ find themselves sinking into the pit of hunger, disease, and poverty. And yet it is within our power to lift one or even many with compassion and courage through the message of hope and freedom of FARM STEW.
