School Review

This year, Our Lady of Sion College will be undertaking a School Review process. Reviews occur every four years and provide valuable opportunities for schools to reflect and plan for continuing growth and improvement. For this review cycle, the College will be using the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) National School Improvement Tool (NSIT). Rather than completing surveys as we have done in the past, three reviewers will spend four days at the College, 1–4 May, evaluating our programs and processes against nine Domains. Their report to the community will include affirmations, commendations and recommendations. The latter will inform our next School Improvement Plan, which will guide our work for the next four years. A special part of the retreat saw the girls pack toiletries to be distributed to men attending Ozanam House — a shelter in Flemington for the homeless. Also last week, four students, Sally Collins, Georgia Drake, Rebecca Hosie and Monique Turner, who participated in the Australian Catholic Youth Festival in Sydney last December, were part of a student panel that presented to the staff of Catholic Education Melbourne, sharing some of their thoughts and reflections that the Festival has had on them.

Below is an extract from the CEM Director's eNews:

The panel also commented on quotes from Pope Francis and Archbishop Hart about the Year of Youth, where the leaders speak of their intention to listen to and engage with young people as often and as extensively as possible, drawing them into the heart of all the Church.

Georgia Drake, from Our Lady of Sion College, described a conversation she had with a bishop at the Australian Catholic Youth Festival, saying 'he cared about what we had to say, what we had to say about growing up Catholic, Catholic schools and the stigma of being Catholic we endure because it is something we want to be a part of'. She described how he had joined them on the train and that at first they didn't know whether or not to talk to him, but that he encouraged them to speak freely. As the students shared these anecdotes the heads were nodding and the sense of recognition rippled through the audience.

Deputy Principal Learning and Teaching

Next week we acknowledge International Women's Day and are grateful that our girls can be educated in a safe, nurturing and vibrant learning community such as Our Lady of Sion. It is an opportune time to pause and reflect on the learning that is possible at Sion and the opportunities that an excellent education provides for the future. Girls' schools are equipped to cater to the learning needs of girls where learning has no boundaries. We also understand not only how girls learn but also what strategies can be used when learning is challenging.

Every day your daughter is being confronted with new knowledge and new concepts, or her prior knowledge is being extended. Sometimes being confronted with lots of new knowledge can be challenging. Challenge is exciting when we feel empowered with strategies to actively make sense of new knowledge.

This raises a very important question, 'How can we empower our learners?' There are many strategies you can use to help your daughter feel that she is in control of her learning. The following is some useful advice from Professor Andrew Martin, University of Sydney.

Support your daughter to take control of her learning

Girls tend not to have a strong sense of control over their academic life, Andrew says.

'We find they don't always feel they're in the driver's seat and they are uncertain about their ability to avoid poor performance and failure.'

Parents can remind their daughters of three things where they have control over their learning:

- Effort how hard they try
- Strategy the way they try and the way they do their work
- Attitude what they're thinking about themselves and the tasks they have to do.

'The more they can focus on these three things, the more in control they'll feel,' Andrew says.

I would like to remind parents and students that learning is a partnership between the teacher and the learner. Teachers welcome student feedback and it is crucial that students develop the skills to confidently ask questions, seek clarification and share their learning perspective with their teacher. A key strategy in becoming an active learner is to speak directly with the teacher with any learning concerns. Likewise, I encourage parents/guardians to also speak directly with the subject teacher if there are any concerns.

I would also like to inform parents that formal feedback on student learning progress takes place through Student Progress Meetings. In Semester 1, Student Progress Meetings are scheduled to take place as follows

Deputy Principal Student Wellbeing



Developing good skills to make and manage relationships is not as easy nor naturally occurring as one might imagine. With technology being used as a significant medium for relationships, it is not surprising that we are now seeing a 'delay' in the development of face-to-face social skills such as reading body language and knowing how to respond when someone is angry, upset or frustrated.

We commonly see a shift in friendships at all year levels at the beginning of the year and it is not only our Year 7 students who are experiencing the challenges of managing old and making new friendships. It is important that parents, regardless of the age of their daughters, talk about what to look for in a good relationship, including:

- the use of kind and supportive language
- · taking turns and cooperating
- offering help when needed
- loyalty and being a good confidant
- inclusion in groups and activities
- an understanding of how others feel
- caring about others' opinions and interests
- the ability to give each other space and time outside of the friendship.

It is also important for parents to expect that their daughter will be a good friend when looking for companionship in others. Asking your daughter, 'Who were you kind to today?' is one way to set this expectation during her earlier years at school. When students understand how a healthy friendship should look and feel, they are better equipped to extricate themselves from relationships that are hurtful or make them uncomfortable.

Child Safe Standards

The second *Child Safe Standard* requires schools to develop and publicly communicate a Statement of Commitment to child safety or a school child-safe policy to their community. Our Lady of Sion College has recently undergone the process of reviewing both our Child Safety Policy and Code of Conduct to ensure that they continue to reflect the needs of our students and comply with changes in Government guidelines. But, it is important to focus on what can be learnt and the benefits of such experiences to student growth. Trying new things even when feeling nervous will show students that they can complete challenging tasks, and give them the confidence and resilience to overcome such feelings in the future. It's important to focus on these positives, and to remind students to be positive in their self-talk.

Hopefully all students will return home having had a positive experience, and will be grateful for the rest that the long weekend will bring!

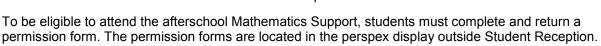

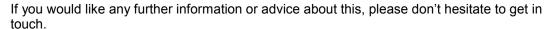


From the College Psychologist

Developing routines and helpful habits is a good way of setting ourselves up to function effectively, and also to cope during those times when life might become difficult and stressful.

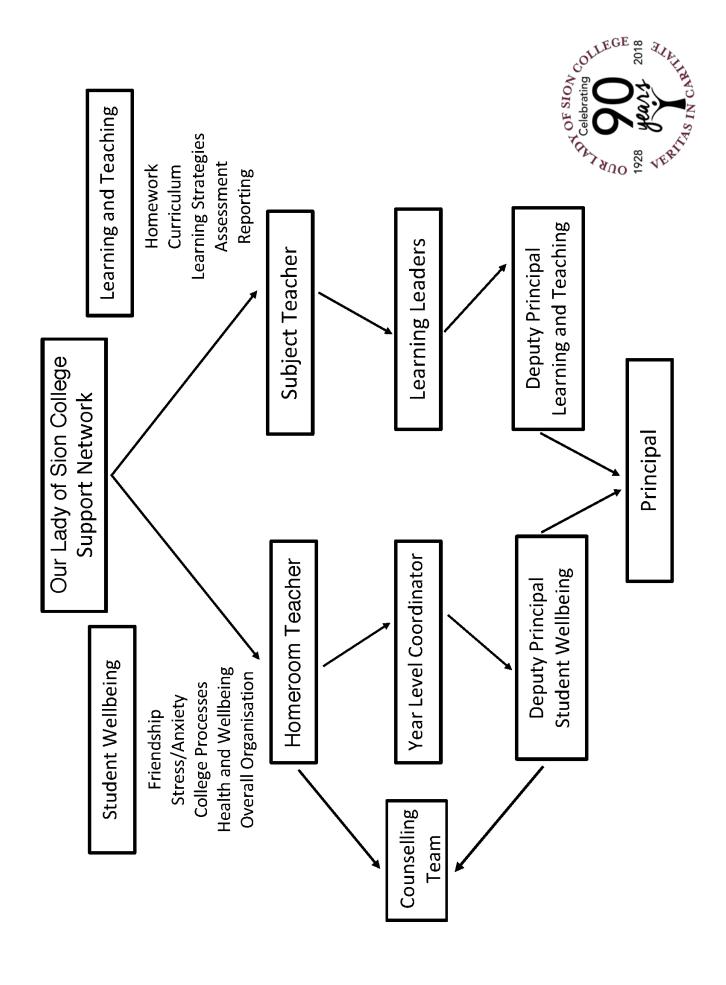

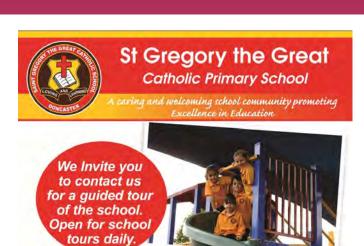

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

Dear Parents/Guardians

The Victorian Government has announced \$148 million over four years for the Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF). Families who hold a valid means-tested concession card or are temporary foster parents are eligible to apply to the fund. An allowance of \$225 per eligible student will be paid to the College to use towards school trips and sporting activities for the eligible student. The above flyer provides more information. NEW FOR 2018!

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2017, you do not need to complete an application form in 2018 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools in 2018 or you did not apply in 2017.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2018.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.
