Digitech

James Wright (LCC Schools Adviser and Digital Technology Network Lead) & Annalisa Howarth (Headteacher, English Martyrs' Catholic Primary School, Preston)

English Martyrs' has historically had a passion for reading and all things books! We pride ourselves on engaging children in print from the moment they walk through the door, fostering and nurturing a belief that reading is at the heart of attaining our individual goals and aspirations.

Traditionally interventions to enhance pupils' outcomes for reading have been personalised and bespoke, working with new initiatives, curriculum and assessments, we have developed reading at individuals' pace and needs, embedding their passion for reading.

DigiTech is a network of around 50 Lancashire schools and academies working together to develop and share great ideas through which digital technologies can support high quality teaching and learning, enhancing and enriching all areas of the curriculum. Central to the network's activity, are small scale, high impact, school based projects that relate directly to whole school improvement priorities.



In the ever developing world of technology, English Martyrs' wanted DigiTech to enhance current reading provision, focusing on its benefits for key individuals and groups, applying the four key areas of potential impact championed by the initiative:

1. **Improve rates of pupil progress** through modelling and reference strategies.
2. **Underpin Assessment for Learning** goals by providing opportunities for review and reflection.
3. **Raise aspirations** through increased challenge, expectation and opportunities.
4. **Enhance learning environments** through greater access, engagement and support

Within this project the aim was to explore how technology might add to current provision with regards to home reading, in particular how it might be used to assist pupils

where adult support at home was not always available. Working together, we investigated how the technology could provide either additional tutoring or a medium through which quality teaching could occur.

The two targeted groups were:

- Reluctant readers who needed to rediscover an interest in reading supported by secure video conference call facilities for after school Guided Reading support.
- More Able EAL pupils for whom home language is a potential barrier to both discussion and the development of inference, using virtual comprehension support via secure message board facilities.

Headteacher, Annalisa Howarth, recounts the school's perspective in delivering the project.

'An initial 'traditional' Guided Reading with a group of reluctant readers did not end well! One child said that reading was a waste of time, boring and pointless. We needed something fun, inviting, new and engaging to 'hook' them.

Looking at our IT provision, we decided to use some of our iPads, not as eBooks, rather as a medium for remote reading. Having chatted to the 'reluctant' readers, we found they did not like reading face to face in a group as they felt 'on show' and 'embarrassed' when they could not decode or explain texts. We wanted a Facetime style app to enable reluctant, vulnerable readers to read from home, with quality teaching, albeit at the other end of an iPad. After much research, help, advice and tech support from our BTLs tech Geoff, with bribes of biscuits and cups of coffee, the simple free app, Zoom, was found!

Fundamental to the initiative was that online safety was a paramount consideration throughout. Safeguarding wise Zoom was positive: children have a unique number for each conferencing meeting; up to 32 people could sign in at once, easily fitting the criteria. It's free and simple to use!



Agreement from Governors was provided; permissions from parents were sought with strict contracts regarding the use of iPads linking and mirroring our whole school 'Acceptable Use of Digital Technologies' agreements.

We had lift off! Each child was assigned a school iPad which


was then stripped of all other apps including Safari (so no unfiltered internet searches could take place). The only app accessible is Zoom. Simply, children login to Zoom and away we go!

The difference in confidence has been amazing. The boys independently ask to read/Zoom, most of all, they can discuss the texts calmly with confidence and clarity, using quotes and evidence. They now enjoy reading!

For our second group, More Able EAL children, we wanted a safe, child friendly, easy to access discussion board. One where multiple users could respond to a question or statement about a text, as part of a broader group discussion. Once again, safeguarding was paramount. Yammer, through Outlook 365 provides accounts which are tightly controlled and can only be accessed by key school staff; it is easy to use, free and safe!

It is an 'added extra' to their weekly class Guided Read. A statement or question about the text is posed using Lancashire English Team's reading prompts and LAPs, responses are typed online, all out of school hours (with an 8pm curfew!).

The responses have grown from simple statements to more detailed online discussions with minimal prompts from the supervising adult. The children are taking ownership of their responses; this in turn has had a positive impact on progress (all have made 2 terms + in Autumn).'



From the outset of initial discussions, our aim has been to inspire reading, prompt and ignite responses, developing children's confidence in reading underpinned by digital technology. It therefore had to be quality assured. We sought the opinions of our EYFS Class Teacher/CLL Lead in school. She was very positive, agreeing that it was the hook to get the children reading, always being the key to success in a child's development, attainment and progress. However, she was keen to

stress that there was and is a need to constantly evaluate, ensuring the 'hook' of an iPad does not go stale. Something we are continuously monitoring.

Two months on and so far so good! Our children are reading, responding and wanting to read more, by adapting our mindset towards using technology as a tool to entice, engage and inspire, not just to play Fortnite on!

We Are Reading with Teens

We thought it was time we gave you an update about the work we planned with the young people who reside in our children's homes.

- We now have Reading Champions in each unit. We also have one young person who is a Reading Champion!
- We developed a working group of Reading Champions who helped us gather the views of the young people.
- The young people said they would like to receive book loans from the Library Service. This is currently being arranged.
- Young people have signed up for monthly subscriptions for magazines linked to their hobbies, interests or future career aspirations.
- Young people are involved in reading projects. For example, one young person read Roald Dahl's Matilda and then went to see the musical. Other young people are currently reading the Harry Potter Books and are looking forward to visiting the Harry Potter Studio Tour.
- Our Employment Support Team have offered to do literacy workshops linked to careers.
- We have asked Reading Champions to consider nominating Young People who engage in We Are Reading for a Proud Award. For anyone who doesn't know, this is an annual event where we celebrate the successes of our Looked After Children and Care Leavers.

Secondary Update

As we begin a new year, it's a great opportunity to think about what 'reading resolutions' we can encourage our teenagers to make for 2019 - a great opportunity to challenge them to try something new: to read every day, to read 365 books in one year, to read a book in under 365 minutes or to read for at least 365 minutes every week!

It's great to personalise challenges, but we all know it's easier to succeed when we have the support of a group, so maybe 365 books could be read between class reading groups, members in competition with other groups. There's nothing like a bit of competition to incentivise!

Our eager readers can all too easily fall in the trap of reading yet another of their favourite authors' books, but why not encourage them to branch out with something totally out of their comfort

zone through a lucky dip of titles provided by <https://www.lovereading4kids.co.uk/>, Lancashire library service or the school librarian? Could eager readers be challenged to read as many texts from the literary canon as possible in 2019, or as many past Carnegie Medal winners as possible?

Or maybe the Year of the Pig is a great opportunity for all subject teachers, and particularly senior leaders, to overhaul their own reading habits and commit to reading some teenage fiction every day in 2019. What a wonderful opportunity then for all staff to directly recommend some engaging books to our reluctant readers, and talk about the books they've been reading in the library every fortnight as part of a new staff and student reading group.

Happy New Year to you all! Hope it's full of reading – whatever reading challenges you embark on!

Eco Books for Children

The importance of protecting the planet has never been greater, with the increase of landfill sites, production of palm oil and the problem of plastic pollution being hot topics in today's media. The importance of teaching the future generations how to look after Earth is imperative. We need to teach children about living responsibly, with a strong emphasis on 'going green' by ensuring that we recycle, upcycle and minimise the amount of waste we create, starting to introduce these concepts to children

early on can have a massive impact on their awareness as they get older.

Below are a few examples of books that use the positive power of stories to do this; stories that bring home the message of looking after our beautiful planet.



Exodus – A science fiction novel written for teens to young adults by Julie Bertagna, published in August 2002. The story is set on an island faced with the problem of a rising sea level, caused by melting ice caps and other forms of global warming.

Song of the Dolphin Boy is a moving tribute about the impact of plastic pollution on our seas, and the campaigning power of friendship from the award winning Elizabeth Laird.

Running Wild - a moving story of a boy and an elephant that survived the Indonesian tsunami, with links to the production of palm oil.

Dinosaurs and all that rubbish - After humans leave the barren Earth for a distant star, the dinosaurs come back to life and tidy up the mess that the humans have left behind. The dinosaurs will only then allow the humans to come back to Earth once they have

agreed that the planet should be shared and enjoyed by everyone

The Unexpected Visitor is a beautiful picture book which introduces the notion of sharing, sustainability and taking care of the creatures within our oceans.



Welcome to the world of **Big Bear Hug**, a contemporary fable about a bear who has an appetite for hugging everything in sight - even creatures that bears have been known to eat. One day, the benevolent bear meets up with a human. This human proceeds to do something the bear cannot understand: he raises his axe and begins to cut down a tree. Suddenly the bear doesn't feel like hugging anymore and must make a difficult decision on how to stop this destruction in his forest.

Where's the Elephant? - a near wordless picture book which powerfully demonstrates the devastating effects of deforestation as Elephant, Parrot and Snake find their simple game of hide and seek is no longer possible as the trees of the forest have been cut down to make way for houses, road and cars.

Exploring the Great Outdoors

Finding out about nature and the amazing world around them is important for each child's learning and development. Exploring the great outdoors is the key to stimulating a child's understanding of nature, but using books and stories can help us take a child on a journey beyond their immediate environment. Books allow us to enhance a child's experiences, to ignite their interest and curiosity to show them the wonders of the natural world. Here are links to three websites to get you started.

www.runwildmychild.com has selected 30 beautiful picture books about nature. The website provides a list of fantastic books as a starting point to exploring nature with your children.

www.rspb.org.uk allows children to step into the lives of some amazing animals through audio books and stories.

www.booktrust.org.uk has 10 books about wildlife chosen by author Nicola Davies, including 'Big Blue Whale' and 'Surprising Sharks'.



Use a story stick or a journey stick to encourage young children to remember and retell their journeys and adventures in the outdoors. Children can collect a range of sensory objects and items and attach them to their stick using wool, string, glue or rubber bands. As well as being fun, interactive and personal to each child, it's a great opportunity to develop and expand children's vocabulary and awareness of the world around them.

Getting EAL Parents and Children 'Reading Together'

This course will prepare you to deliver the 'Reading Together' programme to **parents and year 2 to year 5 pupils** in your school

The "Reading Together" programme explains and models to parents how to

support reading at home, ensures parents know the importance of reading and teaches them some shared reading techniques and promotes children reading for pleasure.

Reading for pleasure has been shown to have a positive relationship with educational attainment and this is a stronger indicator of educational success than the family socio-economic background (DfE, 2012). We focus on changing parents' behaviour in terms of talking about books and promoting parental engagement in children's reading. EAL pupils particularly benefit from book talk as they are very often well-able to decode, but struggle to comprehend as they cannot link the language to their own experiences and knowledge.

After trialling this project in a number of schools in Lancashire, we found:

- Parents all said that they felt very confident supporting their children with their reading.
- Pupils all had a more positive view of themselves as a reader.

As part of our pledge to inspire children to love books, we decided to ask our Key Stage 2 class, 'Oak class', to write a story to be enjoyed by our mixed Key Stage one and EYFS class, 'Ash'. Oak class has mixed ages, from Y3-Y6, so we had a wide variety of ideas.

To ensure Oak class understood the qualities of Picture Books for younger children, I read my favourite books to them, from 'The Witches Hand' to 'Sam I am'. We discussed the 'audience'. They noticed the rhyme, the pace, the morals, the loud onomatopoeias then Oak class began to write ideas for their books.

They worked in teams and discussed characters, settings, genre and having a beginning, middle and an end. Children thought about the audience they were writing for.

Once the class had written and illustrated their books, they practised



how they were going to present them to the younger children by reading them to their team. Children then read their stories to the younger children. Some read 1:1, others read to a few children. The younger children loved it; the older children were very proud.

The stories were fantastic. The children were very proud that the younger children enjoyed them so much. Some of the stories were rhyming, some had a repeated phrase, some had great onomatopoeias. There were some very funny characters and storylines. One book had a moral that the children had to ponder.



We are now asking the children to read their books out each week at assembly. Then the books will be left in the Key Stage 1 library so the children can read and re-read them! What a fantastic project!

Cosy Corners at Digmoor

Our children have redesigned our library based on the way they like to read books! The new 'Cosy Corner' library has

beanbags, cuddly animals and quiet spaces where they can snuggle down and read.



We have also added a 'Parents Corner' to the library, following a successful Book Swap Launch last month.

Bringing the Boys to Book Club

St Anne's RC Primary, Ormskirk

Having run a successful book club for children in Year 6 for several years, I thought I had developed a winning formula. Each group had comprised a fairly even boy/ girl mix and last year my two most avid members were boys. This year, however, started rather differently. As the potential book club members filed into the library, I saw eleven excited female faces. No boys. Following a meeting with our head teacher, I collected the boys together and tried to

find out why none of them had attended. It seemed that the main stumbling blocks were the idea that book choices would be forced upon them, they would have to write reviews on what they had read and the general 'girliness' they perceived.



The head teacher offered to be a part of the club and we called a meeting to discuss how it might be run to encourage a wider membership. The children voted, overwhelmingly, for two separate groups: the boys with Mr Bates and the girls with me, joining together at times for joint projects. Both genders said that they felt 'more comfortable' with this arrangement. All the children voted for their favourite new read and we ordered the books. At the first meeting after this, we had 14 girls and 11 boys. Subsequently, 2 more boys and another girl have joined.

These numbers were clearly a good indication of the success of our new strategy; however, the best result, for me was the sight that met me as I went onto the playground for break duty last week: a group of Year 6 boys, huddled up on the bench, engrossed in the book

they had chosen. We had brought the boys to book club, and they were bringing their enthusiasm to the rest of the school.

Reading in the New Year

St Veronica's RC Primary, Helmshore

St Veronica's children enjoyed taking part in the 'Don't Judge a Book by its Cover' book fair event. Our PTFA donated money to enable us to purchase two hundred brand new books. All the children were invited into the school hall to choose a book, which they then unwrapped and spent time sharing and showing their friends. We raised £482 from the event which has been used to purchase new books for our school library.



To start the New Year, we are also taking part in the Winnie the Pooh National Reading day. Children can bring in their own Winnie the Pooh books to share and their very own Pooh character.

During February, we have invited Lancashire Reading Services to come and visit each of the classes, where they will be holding story telling reading

sessions. Andy Tooze, a local poet, will also be visiting the children for the day and holding workshops with all the classes.

We have also sent out a second newsletter to all parents keeping them informed with upcoming events and to promote and communicate the, We Are Reading initiative
