Momentum is on our side as we approach our 100th year. We are working diligently to keep it going through member engagement in voters services, educational forums and trainings, and issue advocacy. We are also expanding our team. We are celebrating the founding of the League of Women Voters of New Jersey Advisory Council and we are honored to have the counsel of many esteemed leaders whose input will provide guidance as we grow our organization into one that reflects the communities we serve. In addition, we are hopeful that we will be able to add an additional staff member in 2019 to better serve our members. Our Impact: Empowering Voters

Serving New Jersey Voters

Vote411.org, a one-stop online resource that provides nonpartisan voting information you cannot find anywhere else, is quickly becoming one of our most appreciated resources. A voter visits the website, enters her or his address, and can see her or his ballot, including candidates' responses to policy questions. This year, the League expanded our Vote411.org engagement, **more than doubling the number of races we were able to cover.**

MyVoiceMyVoteNJ: The League of Women Voters of New Jersey partnered with the NJ Principals and Supervisors Association and the NJ Social Studies Supervisors Association to help students conduct voter registration drives in high schools around the state for both the June Primary and November General Election. Together we registered over 2,000 students for the primary and an additional 3,000 for the general election! A total of 75 high schools participated.

Lwvnj.org: Our website received a makeover just in time for the fall election season. Our redesign of the site puts voters first – making sure the information they need to be empowered and participate in democracy is always front and center!

Voter Registration: As our local Leagues grow we are better able to serve our communities. Local Leagues around the state registered thousands of voters in the fall and distributed nonpartisan voting information to countless more leading up to Election Day.

Candidate Forums: During this busy election year our local Leagues held forums in numerous legislative districts and covered local races around the state. We sponsored and/or moderated over 75 debates this year.



Vote411 by the Numbers

- Reached 5.5 million voters
- Nationally covered more than 24,000 candidates in over 14,000 races
- Information about almost 1,000 candidate forums
- Published almost 400 races in New Jersey covering more than 1,100 candidates
- Over **38,000** New Jersey voters served in the week leading up to Election Day
- We covered: statewide ballot question, U.S. Senate race, every congressional race, every legislative race, almost every county race, and hundreds of town and school board races



Our Impact: Defending Democracy

A small sampling of our work in 2018 includes:

- Automatic Voter Registration:** The League of Women Voters of New Jersey was a lead organization ensuring the passage of automatic voter registration legislation. The League was given a pen at the Governor's signing of the legislation in recognition of our work drafting and supporting the reform.
- Equal Pay:** New Jersey now has the strongest equal pay law in the nation, thanks to the League of Women Voters of New Jersey and our coalition partners. We were proud to be present when Governor Murphy signed this legislation.
- Earned Sick Days:** The League, as a member of the New Jersey Time to Care Coalition, has been working to improve our earned sick leave policies for years. In 2018, we saw passage of this legislation which provides paid time off for over 1 million NJ workers currently without sick leave.
- Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI):** The League has worked for many years to reinstate New Jersey in RGGI after Governor Christie withdrew us from the program. We applauded alongside Governor Murphy and the Legislature when an executive order was signed to ensure our participation and legislation was passed requiring our participation with the added stipulation that future Governors may not withdraw us without legislative concurrence.
- Family Planning:** For eight years, the League of Women Voters of New Jersey has worked to see funds for family planning services restored to the state budget. A supplemental appropriation was finally passed earlier this year.
- Requiring email addresses on nominating petitions:** Recognizing the difficulty of reaching candidates running for office, we drafted and championed legislation requiring candidates to provide email addresses when filing for office. The passage of this legislation is making it easier for us to connect candidates and voters around the state.
- Family Leave:** As a member of the Time to Care Coalition, the League continues to work on improving and expanding New Jersey's Family Leave Insurance to make the program more accessible for working families and to ensure more job protections for program participants.
- Offshore oil and gas:** The League of Women Voters continues to protect our coastline by working to ban offshore drilling at both the state and federal levels. We supported passed legislation prohibiting offshore drilling in state waters.
- Fracking Waste Ban:** After seeing legislation vetoed in the past, the League of Women Voters of New Jersey is close to securing the passage of legislation that will prohibit the treatment or processing of fracking waste in our state.
- Other voting reforms:** The League of Women Voters of New Jersey continues our work championing election security, online voter registration, same-day voter registration, expanded in-person early voting, restoring voting rights for people with criminal convictions, allowing for 17 year olds to vote in primary elections if they will turn 18 before the general election, and working to improve transgender voters' voting rights. And of course, we continue to work on campaign finance reform and passing redistricting reform through our Fair Districts New Jersey campaign.

Goals: Maximizing Impact through 2020

The League in your corner...in every corner of the state: With your help we will have a League of Women Voters in all of New Jersey's 21 counties and many major cities including Newark, Trenton, Paterson, and Jersey City. Today we have huge gaps of underserved voters in our state, and with no local League in their neighborhoods, voters have few or no places to turn for debates, voting information, voter registration, and civic engagement. Together we can empower local residents to lead and to make an impact at the community level.

Speakers and trainers ready to answer the call: The demand for civic experts is at an all-time high and need is only increasing. We don't want to see a single request for League speakers or trainers go unfulfilled. With your support, we can give community organizations the tools, training, and knowledge they need to be more fully engaged in government.

Questions answered on every block and every ballot: The League serves thousands of voters with our website, ballot question analyses, and Vote411.org, but for every voter served so many more questions go unanswered. We receive requests for information about local ballot questions and candidates that we do not always have the capacity to answer. With your help, we can change that and greatly expand our nonpartisan voting coverage at the local level.

Expanding our reach and reaching everyone: Reaching voters with the information they need takes skill and savvy. Well thought out and implemented communications and advocacy can reach voters where they are – through social media, traditional media, and by good old fashioned community organizing and canvassing. Your partnership can ensure we get information into the hands of those who need it most.

Policy expertise too rational to ignore: Hyper-partisan politics seldom leads to great public policy. We can be the adult in the room, advocating for policies based on facts and not partisan rhetoric. But there's a lot of ground to cover – from the halls of the State House to local town council meetings we need your help building a team of lobbyists, policy experts, and everyday voters empowered to speak out.

Looking Ahead: 2018 – 2020 Goals

We have launched a million dollar Centennial Campaign to:

- Add 7 more county Leagues and Leagues in several major cities
- Add a speakers' bureau and more trainers
- Triple the number of trained nonpartisan moderators and League-sponsored debates
- Win important legislative battles like reforming our redistricting process
- Expand local elections coverage through Vote411.org
- Expand our staff from 3 to 5 to be able to better serve our members and voters
- Grow our partnership with high schools to register, train, and empower the next generation of voters
- Make sure no eligible voter stays home or gets turned away on Election Day
