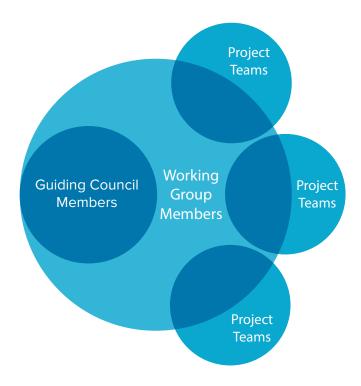
By reading and using this Project Team Go Guide, you will learn how to form your Project Teams and get started transforming the current state into the ideal state.

SUPPORT FOR YOUR PROJECT TEAM



The organization of teams within the Patient Centered Value System (PCVS) means that you are never alone on your journey toward improved care experiences. The Guiding Council serves as the foundation that supports the Working Group. Together, Guiding Council and Working Group members have already followed the six steps of the PCVS, and have shadowed to evaluate the current state. Shadowers have mapped out the patients' and families' care experience flows, captured the patient's perspective, and identified opportunities for transformation of the care experience. With this information, the Working Group will form and guide multiple new Project Teams through the same six steps to examine the current state, compare this to the ideal story, and work together to close the gap.

Congratulations on being selected to serve on a Project Team! Some of you already participate with the Working Group and some of you are new. This is by design. The ideal Project Team has a unique balance – 50% are members who come from the Working Group and 50% are members from outside of that group. This design ensures you have a team with greater diversity, scope, and involvement and that members can spread the use of PCVS, then become champions themselves. This Project Team Go Guide will serve as your team's reference to help you capture all of the important elements of your projects.

Glossary of Terms

Care Experience: (noun) */ker//,ik'spireans/

Everything and everyone that leaves an impression on the healthcare journey; always defined through the eyes of patients and families

Care Experience Flow Map: (noun) */flo//map/

A map, chart, graphic, or table that shows the movement of patient and family through a defined care experience with touchpoints, caregivers, timestamps noted

Touchpoint: (noun) */teCH, point/

Key moment or place where patient and family care experiences are directly or indirectly affected by any caregiver

Caregiver: (noun) */'ker, giver/

Anyone in the healthcare setting who impacts the experiences of patients and families

PROJECT TEAM RULES TO PLAY BY

- 1. Prioritize your projects based on patient and family needs. Don't forget "blue sky" thinking.
- 2. Consider "pilot" projects first (smaller scale, shorter time frame). Do not shy away from creative solutions. This is the opportunity to try new things! If your idea is successful, you can increase the scale.
- Provide progress updates at the Working Group's meetings. The Working Group serves as a resource and can assist if the Project Team experiences barriers or challenges. The PCVS Coordinator will maintain lists of active, completed, and future projects.
- 4. If funding is needed, present Value Fund proposals to your Working Group for approval. Finding creative low or no cost solutions is always encouraged.
- Project Teams can disband once the goals have been achieved and maintained.New Project Teams form when new projects are identified.

SIX STEPS TO ORGANIZE AND LEAD A TARGETED PCVS PROJECT

- **Step 1:** Select a project based on the needs of patients and families.
- **Step 2:** Assign Project Team co-leaders.
- **Step 3:** Shadow patients and families to co-design the care experience. From your shadowing information, create a Care Experience Flow Map to show the touchpoints and caregivers that patients and families encounter.
- **Step 4:** Recruit members of the Project Team based on touchpoints and caregivers.
- **Step 5:** Create a shared vision of the ideal story.
- **Step 6:** Close the gaps between current and ideal.

"FAST TRACK" A PROJECT TO 30-DAY IMPLEMENTATION

If, after completing steps one and two, the Project Team feels there is an urgent need to enact a change (perhaps it is an issue of patient or staff safety), the project may need to be "Fast Tracked." Project Team Co-Leaders should propose the Fast Track to the Guiding Council. The Guiding Council can approve the Fast Track and recommend administrative or clinical champions who could facilitate urgent improvements or changes.

Additional meeting time will need to be scheduled to begin Fast Track projects. A four-hour block of time is recommended so that the Fast Track Project Team can follow steps 3-6 of the Six Steps to Organize and Lead a Targeted Project Team, and then determine a pilot group and setting.

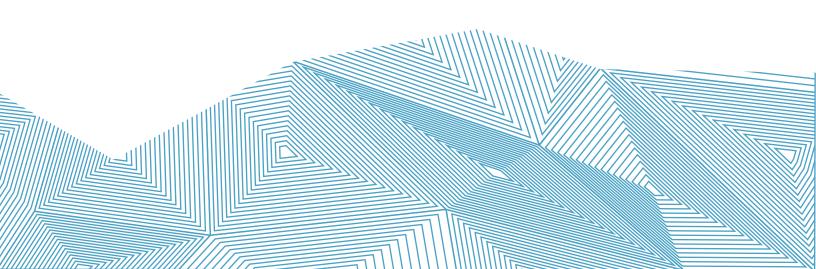
At the next Working Group meeting, Fast Track Project Team representatives should report decisions and share a plan to launch the pilot project. Within thirty days, the Fast Track project should be implemented in the pilot departments or units.



SUGGESTED INFORMATION FOR YOUR PROJECT TEAM TO CAPTURE

A designated Project Team member will need to track and record progress at each of your Project Team meetings. This information will be used to provide updates to the Working Group. The Working Group will provide ongoing support and will serve as a resource to help you overcome obstacles and barriers during project implementation.

Included at the end of this Go Guide are worksheets for each of the six steps for successful completion of a PCVS project. By completing these forms for each project, you will have a record of the steps your team took to envision, implement, and evaluate sustainable solutions. These records should be archived and shared with the Guiding Council and Working Group and other Project Teams who might benefit from your efforts. Although your Project Team may want to include more information, the worksheets are a useful reference and will keep your team moving forward.
