



THE DERANGED VISION OF JEFF BEZOS

wealthiest man Jeff Bezos gave his best version of a TED Talk, titled "Going To Space To Benefit Earth." If you were to watch this event free of context, with no idea who Bezos is and what he has accomplished, it would come across out laughable at best, and utterly insane at worst. Among other proclamations, Bezos announced it was time for humans to start figuring out how to get the hell off their home planet. This was possible, he assured his minions. He announced that humans could build colonies between the earth and the moon, rotating habitats that would house a million people each, hovering in space. He suggested they'd house a trillion humans. Bezos wanted the world to know that this vision is his passion, and he's devoting much of his wealth and power toward achieving it. Again, if you didn't know who he was, you probably wouldn't think too much of his address. But, the truth is, you do know who he is, and he is unfortunately someone who people choose to take seriously. This is one of the problems with the catastrophic concentration of wealth that has seen the likes of Bezos amass fortunes many nations could only dream of. Now that he's got this money, power, and notoriety, well, he's largely free to do what he pleases. So, while the planet

we, you know, actually live on, is enveloped in a series of interdependent crises (which Bezos flaccidly acknowledges before speaking to his pipe dreams), those at the top of the pyramid feel empowered to literally look beyond Earth, no matter how ridiculous those gazes may be.

Bezos may have provided the most ambitious 'path' forward to date (seemingly by taking science–fiction literally), this is not an uncommon trope for the wealthiest among us. Many billionaires have looked to the stars, devoting billions of dollars to the idea of space travel. That Bezos goes further, claiming to begin for us all the journey off our planet, is only an extension of his greater wealth, and the greater concentration of resources in the hands of even fewer as time has wearily marched on.

This is the contradiction between capital and democracy in its extreme. Let's just say, for the sake of argument, that there was some way in which these preposterous fantasies could be fashioned into a reality. They would require much more effort than those of one man alone, no matter what he has at his disposal. Should a society not be able to say, wait a minute, are we ready for this? Have we figured out a stable enough situation on this planet to merit this concentration of wealth aimed towards the

goal of getting the hell out of dodge? Of course not. But, what we have done is spent centuries now working toward isolating our resources from the collective. As such, we are more than ever beholden to the whims of a guy who's best idea for how to make things better is to admit the planet is dying and pack up and bail out. No matter how much money, time, and effort he wastes on this endeavour, it's beyond us to stop him, and turn his attention to that which plagues humanity on this here rock.

Watching Bezos speak, it's impossible not to feel as though this is little more than a coping mechanism. After all, built into his ideas is a defeatism of life on this planet, one brought about by the very system that has spat out people like Jeff Bezos. Perhaps on some, if subconscious level, Bezos and his peers are aware of the destruction and inequality they have wrought. That the abuses of power and the planet that have helped make them gods among men can never truly be atoned for. So, what's to be done but enter the realm of fantasy? Bezos is onstage, not just for us, but for himself. He is trying to convince himself that maybe he will not be seen as a symbol of an economic system that went completely off the rails and fundamentally destroyed what he so patronizingly called "the best planet!" But rather as



the great white knight who led us to the great beyond. That maybe, just maybe, one day people will see that all of this pilfering of resources, this zeal with which infinite growth became the only option, was just a necessary hiccup in a much grander cosmic lifespan for the species. What is more likely, is precisely the opposite. That, one day, amongst the ruins, in some godforsaken data centre, some enterprising survivalist hacker years and years down the line will discover footage like this Bezos speech and get a fuller understanding for the depths

to which humans would go to ignore what was happening right in front of them. When the scattered history of this time is cobbled together by whatever has survived what damage has been done, it is precisely the likes of Bezos who will serve as the symbols for what happened here and now. Talks like these will not serve as examples of the brave vision required to usher in a greater future, but as the height of delusion that had swept the most wealthy and powerful into a game of pretend they used to justify all they had done. **V**

Dear EarthTalk: What are some examples of ways food and drink producers are fighting the plastic waste epidemic they helped create?

As MORE PEOPLE become aware of the extent of plastic waste clogging up our environment, cutting back on plastic use is fast becoming a key environmental priority around the world. According to a 2017 study by researchers from the University of Georgia, UC Santa Barbara and Sea Education Association, humans have produced 8.3 billion metric tons of plastic since mass-production started in the 1950s. While we've recycled about nine percent of all that plastic and incinerated another 12 percent, as much as 75 percent has been discarded into landfills or, even worse, set adrift into the environment. If we don't slow down our current run rate of producing new ("virgin") plastic, we can expect to add another four billion metric tons of it to our global environment by 2050.

With no cheap and scalable way to collect and get rid of all this plastic, the best we can hope for is to not make the problem worse. Luckily sustainable alternatives to plastic are coming on strong. PLA plastic, which is derived from plants and functions like conventional plastic, is promising but needs to scale up to become economically viable as it requires dedicated recycling/processing systems to truly "close its loop." Likewise, paper or cardboard cartons could be a viable alternative to plastic food and drink storage containers if they are produced at great enough scale to justify dedicated facilities to process them for recycling, given that they are also infused with non-recyclable layers for strength and to prevent seepage.

PLA and cardboard are just the beginning of what is possible. Food producers and chemists are experimenting with making containers out of biodegradable plant products like corn starch, cassava and even algae. And just this spring, tens of thousands of runners participating in the London Marathon were given water out of edible pods made from seaweed and plant extracts instead of plastic bottles. Skipping Rocks Lab, the London–based startup

behind the newfangled containers, reports that they're not only cheaper to produce than plastic but are also biodegradable, breaking down completely within a month, while not imparting any flavour or taste to the water or whatever else is inside.

While there's something to be said for technology, an older school "alternative" to plastic is all—natural plant material. American supermarkets could learn a lot from some Southeast Asian grocers, for instance, that wrap up produce for sale in biodegradable banana leaves instead of plastic bags. These all—natural wrappers can be thrown into the compost pile or yard waste bin and become rich soil without ever having to be processed using fossil—fuel based energy (like traditional recyclables).

You can do your part by telling your friends, neighbours, store managers, policymakers, elected officials and anyone else within hearing distance that you and millions of others like you don't want any more single use plastics in your town, county, state or country. And if you haven't already done so, get yourself a reusable water bottle and reusable shopping bag(s) so you can start being part of the day—to—day solution.

BEFOREHAND, I KNEW just a little about *The Who's Tommy*. Obviously I'd heard of the band and its music, and knew *Tommy* was also a concept album and a film. I could also sing scraps of "Pinball Wizard," its most well known song. I was an undergrad in 1995 when the Canadian production landed at the Elgin Theatre in Toronto, and by sheer force of repetition, the TV commercials embedded lyrics in my brain.

Growing up in post—WWII Britain, young Tommy is left catatonic after witnessing a murder involving his parents, who browbeat him into remaining silent. Unresponsive as a result, he suffers cruelties from those around him. Before he finally regains his ability to interact with the outside world, he discovers a talent for playing pinball which brings it to his feet.

To be clear, the biggest criticisms I have stem from the story as it was conceived, not this production in particular. I suppose they'd be best directed to Pete Townshend, and he's unlikely to be concerned. Given the success of the musical, still being mounted 27 years after its premiere, and a two year Broadway run with over 900 performances, Tommy has plenty of credibility. It has the cachet of a famous rock band, a great poster, and a memorable signature guitar riff. Its Broadway run garnered ten Tony Award nominations and four wins, among other accolades. Its original London production gathered over a half dozen Olivier Award nominations and wins.

So it's a good bet for a community theatre, although challenging to mount. I'm always amazed at what HTI accomplishes, layering action, stacking performance space, and tucking the band into place like a theatrical game of Tetris. They do it with admirable choreography and what must be exhaustive prep; there's not a misstep among such a large ensemble. Kudos to director and choreographer Bethany Charters, stage manager Nicole Airdrie, and set designer Rick Rivait

For me, the plot of *Tommy* is thin, drawn out in some places and patchy in others. There's significant lead up to the trauma Tommy witnesses but, in Act Two, a rapid sketching of Tommy's success, motivations, rise and fall as a pinball and pop culture superstar. There are interesting threads about how we create,

glorify, and then ultimately turn on those we make 'stars.' Popularity and influence can be fickle, and the mob can turn on an individual whether he's a pinball whiz or a strange little 'deaf, dumb and blind kid.' But these threads seem glossed over.

The ending is most boggling. When Tommy is reunited with his family, I wondered how we managed to get to such a 'happily ever after.' I was jarred by the abuse to which Tommy is subjected. Neither parent would win a Parent of the Year award, given their (well intentioned but) horrifying actions to set in motion and then attempt to cure Tommy's plight. Creepy Uncle Ernie (played by Matt Moore with a great balance of the sinister and mundane) deserved a jail cell for his child molesting aspirations, not a hug. Cousin Kevin (played menacingly by Devin France) deserved some comeuppance for his bullying, not a forgiving thump on the back.

"Pinball Wizard," "See Me, Feel Me," and "I'm Free" stand out whereas other songs are forgettable. But, as always at HTI, the music is excellently performed. Under the direction of Christopher Bee, the band has impeccable timing and note perfect delivery. That guitar riff in "Pinball Wizard" succeeded in raising the little hairs on my forearms!

The entire cast does a capable job, singing with commitment and moving with practised ease. It's always a treat to hear Richelle Tavernier's robust vocals, and she pulls double duty as 'The Gypsy' and show producer. While the costuming is mostly solid, one performer has been

Fittingly, it's the performers embodying 'Tommy' that stand out most, particularly grown up Tommy (Eric Gibson). He has confidence and composure that is compelling to watch, and it comes as no surprise to read he has three years of musical theatre and at least as many productions to his credit. He's also the lead singer in a band; it comes across in the power and control he exhibits in his vocals.

Both young Tommys must be mentioned, not simply because they are children. Siblings Nola (Tommy, age 4) and Izzy Skinner (Tommy, age 10) show remarkable control over their bodies and facial expressions as they are hoicked around like mannequins, not to mention when other actors scream, poke, and gesture in their faces. Tommy is supposed to be catatonic, and a lot rides on these younger performers. They show amazing restraint. It also took me a while to realize they weren't actually little boys!

When I saw *The Who's Tommy* last Saturday afternoon, there appeared to be only 2–3 seats left empty, and it's been noted on social media that tickets are going fast for the entire run. **V**



WHERE HEADS MEET'S TENTH ANNIVERSARY

THE YOUNG DON'T notice the seismic changes that occur over time but the city and the world were quite different just ten years ago. Sure it wasn't like the '60s and '70s counter culture but James Lloyd was one of many who believed in a culture and helped the world bring it more into the mainstream. Once a place you might not bring your mom, head shops almost seem quaint in the days of cannabis retail outlets but for Lloyd and Where Heads Meet, business has always been booming. The store on Ottawa Street North celebrates a decade helping to add character on that neighbourhood as well as bringing a community together that oft includes a wack of musicians.

"It was a business plan I drew up about twenty years ago but the business plan got lost on a computer that crashed," recalls Lloyd. "My cousin fixed it, I found the business plan, six months later I opened the store. I was always a cannabis enthusiast and it just seemed like a natural fit for me. When I opened my store, it was downtown Hamilton or St. Catharines for the next store. The head shop started in the '60s down in California. You'd go in and the guy would be doing a painting and at the end of the week, the painting would be for sale. They were the first underground dispensaries and if you knew the guy well enough, he might offer you something under the table. It was about potheads, deadheads, motorheads or cool people, right? There was a whole bunch of stores downtown throughout the years but they became a more common culture more recently but at one point they were more underground. I sold a wealth of products from the bongs, vapes and even 30000 vintage records but it was all on the up and up — I've already got into trouble in my earlier life. This store is about the rock and roll lifestyle with the glow in the dark posters, tie-dyed t-shirts but I do have an ecclectic collection of stuff like soap stone carvings. I deal with about 200 wholesale companies and we offer a lot of interesting things for sale.

"I've got a reputation and a clientele that I've developed over the years but there were a couple of days in the first year where I didn't have a single sale — those days were tough," adds Lloyd. "But now we get lineups and the store is very popular. When the dispensaries opened up originally, it was a bit of a cottage industry as I ended up supplying them with — I was selling about 150000 empty pre-rolled cone joints a month to them. I did a math formula and figured they were selling a million joints a month in Hamilton so that's a lot of up in smoke there. They closed most of them but maybe they switched gears to home delivery."

The head shop has offered a community to grow around with Lloyd as a lightning rod. Now a respected businessman and community member, Lloyd and Where Heads Meet have added a culture that has helped grow the Ottawa Street retail district that two decades ago was at best limited. Musicians have been a big component of the clientele as well as employees at the shop and with an anniversary celebration this weekend for Where Heads Meet, a wealth of musicians are coming to celebrate.

With a shake up in their membership bringing old drummer Adam Benning back into the fold, Lo–Fi guitarist and vocalist Todd Knight confirms preparations for their latest release, 'The Pink Album' are moving forward as planned tentatively scheduled for release this fall. But with a special anniversary for Where Heads Meet, the band's dubbing Saturday 'Lo–Fi Day' in Hamilton with two live performances.

"We're doing a day gig and an evening gig so you can bring the kids and teach them new swear words and it'll be fantastic," quips Knight. "James and Where Heads Meet are one in the same to me. He's a real character that's always out in the community. We've played for James before but this year looks like the biggest with lots of bands and lots of giveaways. James just throws it and works hard to make it all come together. He knows a lot of people in this city and the scene — the music and cannabis scene — he's a real hard worker and he's the kind of guy we like to tie our ship to. We've played a bunch of gigs for James because we're proud to support him. Lo-Fi is an off-colour, funny band with our lyrics and Lloyd's got a good sense of humour so it's a good fit.

"We're really excited for the weekend and Saturday is going to be a marathon," adds Knight. "We're playing at 4pm but there's a little break at 4:20pm because James has a massive joint we're going to pass around. We're honoured to be on at that time. We're going to play until the party is over there - but then after that we move over to Hess Village and do a full night of debauchery at the Lazy Flamingo. We've helped out the cannabis community over the years and a lot of them have been working on legalization for decades so it's about time for that. It's still a little strange playing a gig and not having to hide in back of the bar to partake and instead doing it in front of the club. The party rages on just not as much in the shadows. We're going to playing two great shows and featuring some songs from the forthcoming album at both but you can expect a party for James and Where Heads Meet as well as for Jay [Skarratt] and the Lazy Flamingo."

"I've been an outlet for bands to sell their tickets, I've sponsored

band's albums — I've always been a music enthusiast, going to hundreds of concerts every year," says Lloyd on his musical connections. "Using the church parking lot in front of my store, we've got a bunch of friends coming out to play through the afternoon. We've got live glass blowing, interactive art displays, Smoky Bandits Tattoo Shop is raffling off tattoo sessions and there are a lot of things going on in and out of the store. At 4:20 pm, we're going to light a three ounce joint. It's nice that the community can publicly embrace their culture and enjoy it without threat of persecution.

"Where Heads Meet is doing fine and we're not going anywhere because we're still seeing positive growth," adds Lloyd. "With the tenth anniversary, we've hired bands as well as doing a jam, we've got a bigger space outside, The whole community is welcome, we just say no attitude. Come happy, enjoy the music, art and the company. I'm hoping there are passerbys that just join in. We do pretty good with our events. We get a mixed crowd from young to old, people come with their families. It amazes me how many nice and kind people come out - it makes all the work worthwhile."

THE BEELAYS RISEUP TV TOUR FILMING

With a change up in membership, the Beelays didn't feel at a disadvantage with two front people instead of one and have since fashioned a new EP, Hoss and are excited about promoting the latest incarnation of the band to as many people as possible. Priding themselves on their live show, this week the Beelays - curfeaturing Emily

(vocals), Jocelyn Russell (vocals), Altobelli (bass), Scott MacIntosh (guitar), Chris Bruder (keyboards), and Jordan Snider (drums) are excited to be a part of the filming of a UK music reality show happening across North America but making a stop down in Hamilton.

"We found out that they were looking for one more Hamilton band," says Kemp. "They're following a band on tour and at every stop they have local bands playing. It sounded pretty interesting to us, sent them our information and they asked us to be a part of this. I believe they're following a band from Greece and a Canadian artist, Sarah Smith. There will be three bands from the Hamilton area being the headlining acts — us, Days Ahead and Brantford's Innersha.

"We're going to do an interview before the show and then they film us performing live," adds Kemp. "They will be using clips from all of the shows and putting them together to make the series. This is actually for Season 2 but Season 1 hasn't aired yet. We don't know what will get used from each show."

"But we're going to put on the best show we've ever put on so hopefully they use lots of us," interjects Snider. "We rehearse regularly, we've worked out a solid set list and of course we have the outfits to look the part. Hoss was a great EP but it was a transitional phase for us as a band. Since we've added Emily and Jocelyn, we've been working hard and trying to put our all into the band. We're in the midst of writing a new album that we're in the midst of recording at Grant Avenue Studio. This new album is going to represent who we are and what we sound like now and we're excited about our sound."

There are a couple of trailers available on YouTube that offers a rough and tumble document of a variety of relatively unknown artists all trying to make it through the process. If you're interested in knowing what it's like to be in a band and putting on a show, you might be interested in it. RiseUP TV is a live musical tour and reality TV show that features musical artists from around the world filming behind the scenes footage and performances. Reportedly, the focus of the live episodes is "to document what goes on when you bring together artists of all ages and genres that have never met, for a series of live shows, while travelling and staying together in hotels, along the way. The Beelays are excited to be accessing a novel way to promote the band with this opportunity.



A REMAKE OF the 1988 comedy Dirty Rotten Scoundrels (which was a remake of the 1964 film Bedtime Story), The Hustle doesn't add anything new aside from flipping the genders of the con artists. Still, this is a fairly funny movie with enthusiastic performances. Sure, the characters are shallow and a lot of the times the movie is straining for laughs by being rather loud but there are enjoyably frantic moments and quips. This isn't great but it is breezy. Penny (Rebel Wilson) is a small-time con artist who draws the attention of a bigger con artist, Josephine (Anne Hathaway). Living in an elaborate mansion Josephine stages various cons with the help of her butler Albert (Nicolas Woodeson) and con-artist assistant and crooked police officer, Brigitte (Ingrid Oliver). Josephine takes Penny

under her wing to teach her how to work bigger scams, hoping it will just frustrate Penny and make her leave. Unfortunately, it has the opposite effect, so the two make a pact that one of them has to fleece an unsuspecting tech guru, Thomas (Alex Sharp). Penny pretends to suffer from hysterical blindness and Josephine poses as a doctor who can treat her, both needing cash for the operation. But Thomas may not be as rich as they first thought and for Penny things get emotionally complicated. Although, Josephine is quite happy to bleed Thomas dry and leave Penny in the dust.

In a two-hander comedy, a key ingredient is the chemistry of the leads and both actresses work well off each other. Wilson's character Penny is incredibly abrasive which is really what a lot of Rebel Wilson's characters tend to be anyway. The character is shrill and deliberately annoying but there are so many random jokes and quips thrown out eventually something lands. Once the two try to one up each other some of Penny's put downs of Josephine are brutally hilarious. The moment when Penny has feelings for the mark feels emotionally inauthentic because this movie is best when it's nasty.

The most entertaining scam the two ladies pull is what they call the Lord of the Rings con, which veers into absurdity. Josephine pretends to be 18th in line for the English throne, gets engaged to wealthy men and scares them off introducing them to her Penny who plays a deranged sister they keep locked up in the basement. It lets Wilson act crazy like Gollum as Hathaway titters as if her sister is no bother. The gags in the sequence get more and more insane as it goes on which pushes the limits of incredulity but are still funny, so much so that another scene from this sequence is used in a post-credit

Hathaway generally makes the movie better, bouncing between random accents easily. Her first scene has her natural American accent and then when the con is over she switches to a British accent for Josephine and drops in different accents for other scams. When they are pulling the big con on Thomas she pretends to be Dutch and her treating Penny's "hysterical blindness" has some good physical comedy like when she encourages Penny to run down a hallway with a loud "Yah!" pointing happily at the doorway. There are some good strange moments like when Josephine sits down and eats what she thinks is a mint on a table and then spits it out smoothly saying "Those are decorative". One of the best scenes she has doesn't involve any dialogue at all, she at a gaming table attempting to get Thomas' attention but Penny shows up bumbling blindly through it as Josephine's aggravation mounts.

Sharp as the victim is a blank dolt, however he gets to do some interesting stuff by the end. As Josephine's partner in crime, Oliver's Brigette, is just a stone–faced exposition piece, however there is a funny moment when Penny is imprisoned and Josephine pretends to negotiate in French about releasing her with Brigette but they're actually just talking about what they're going to eat. Albert the Butler is mostly silent but he has some good physical comedy and when he finally talks at the end it's a good gag.

The direction by Chris Addison is fine, nothing really pops visually aside from maybe a moment when Josephine hollers in impotent rage at the skies, or a training montage that is fun if superfluous, or a nifty stylized opening credit scene. There is also a very nicely composed visual gag where Penny blends into an alleyway easily which is repeated later. Basically, Addison just locks the camera down and lets the actors riff. The screenplay is a basic copy and paste of *Dirty Rotten Scoundrels* but new random asides are pretty good. Amusingly, Penny's con to get money out of guys by telling them her hot sister has been kidnapped is literally just her relating the plot of the movie *Taken*.

The Hustle may be a pointless remake yet is an enjoyable romp. This may be a bit wrongheaded at times but at least it is trying. When it drops any pretense of sympathy and just decides to be mean it becomes funnier. **V**



AVENGER'S ENDGAME

★★★★★ (Directed by Anthony Russo, Joe Russo, runs 181) Avengers: Endgame is much less concerned with momentum than last year's Infinity War, at least in its initial movement. It's about defeat, and grief, and what happens when heroes are so badly beaten that they don't want to get up again. For all of its galactic scale, Endgame offers a study in small moments between people who are suddenly alone with themselves. And then someone turns up with an idea, and hope is reintroduced to the world - at which point Avengers: Endgame becomes something much more familiar, not just in terms of its tone but in its points of referplot engine, the movie plays like a remix of Marvel's greatest hits, riffing on 40 hours of cinematic continuity and using the elastic nature of its comic-book origins as a strength. 



(Directed by Dome Karukoski, runs 112) Tolkien is a genteel and nearsterile drama that periodically reminds us why John Ronald Reuel Tolkien is unique. He wrote The Hobbit and The Lord Of The Rings. That's what distinguishes an otherwise familiar story about a man who, like so many at the turn of the century, had friends, met the love of his life at a young age and survived WWI. His friends are his fellowship. His wife is his Elvish princess. The battlefields during the First World War can look a lot like Mordor. These everyday things inspired his one-ofa-kind novels, don't you see. Tolkien is just the latest in origin stories about authors who wrote landmark literature, a trend that took shape after Shakespeare In Love and Finding Neverland, and has grown tiresome with Goodbye Christopher Robin and Rebel In The Rye, which also stars Hoult. This is uninspired franchise fare for a certain age. If superhero movies crowd the Scotiabank Theatre, these literary origin stories are what overrun the Varsity. US ★★★☆ (Directed by Jordan Peele, runs

116) Us may not feel as revolutionary as writer/director Peele's first feature, Get Out, but it's still a damn good horror movie - smart, sharp, artfully made and entirely entertaining, even if the last beats don't land perfectly. Both smaller and larger in scale than its predecessor. Us focuses on the Wilson family - parents Adelaide and Gabe (Black Panther co-stars Lupita Nyong'o and Winston Duke), teenage Zora (Shahadi Wright Joseph) and younger Jason (Evan Alex) - vacationing at their summer house in Santa Cruz, where they're confronted by menacing versions of themselves. Peele takes his time laying the groundwork, establishing the family's dynamic and the specific quirks of their environment before the weirdness arrives - but once it does. Us grabs you and doesn't let go, staying with the Wilsons as the world goes mad around them. A final movement gives us more information than we need, diffusing the tension somewhat, but Nyong'o's riveting performance - performances, really - holds the film together all the way to the end. 
