In addition to humanities-focused organizations, organizations whose missions are not exclusively humanities focused but have a history of humanities programming or conducting humanistic social sciences may be eligible for humanities-focused programs under Wyoming Humanities ARP awards. Applying organizations will be asked to provide a history of humanities programming/projects and evidence of organization missions consistent with the Wyoming Humanities strategic values:

- enhancing the creative and cultural economy
- engaging communities to improve quality of life;
- raising cultural awareness to expand the Wyoming narrative;
- promoting civics and democracy; and,
- fostering critical thinking and lifelong learning.

Individuals, foreign, and for-profit entities are not eligible for any Wyoming Humanities ARP Grants.

The maximum grant award for each Programming Grant and Recovery Grant is \$5,000. The number of awards and award amounts will be determined by the availability of funds.
