Learning Objectives

This workshop is intended to address what clinicians need to know about forensic ethics, because psychologists cannot avoid being involved in forensic issues in their clinical practice.

After attending this program participants will be able to:

1. Describe the guidelines and standards utilized in clinical/ forensic psychology cases.
2. Discuss how to respond to subpoenas for their records.
3. Describe how to prepare for testimony.
4. Specify how to avoid multiple relationships and conflicts of interest in these cases.
5. Discuss how to handle the issue of "personal notes."
6. Describe the difference between deposition testimony and court room testimony.

Presenter

Dr. Ackerman is a founding faculty member at WSPP. He served as the Dean through the initial accreditation, twice served on the admissions committee, was chair of the Forensic Psychology program for 15 years, and was awarded Professor Emeritus status in 2014. Between 1990 and today, Dr. Ackerman has authored or co-authored 17 editions of books all of which, in part, address ethical issues in general and as related to forensic psychology. Besides dozens of publications, he has performed over 150 workshops around the world. This workshop will address the ethical codes, guidelines, and standards promulgated by various organizations for forensic psychology cases. Case examples will be presented from the over 2,500 legal cases with which Dr. Ackerman has been involved.
