"As her Lord-Lieutenant it has been a great honour and privilege to have served The Queen and act as her personal representative in Herefordshire.

"I look back in gratitude and look forward to offering support and loyalty to The King. "My thoughts are with all members of The Royal Family at this very sad time."

Statement by the Mayor of Ross-on-Wye, Cllr Ed O'Driscoll: "On behalf of the whole community of Ross-on-Wye I would like to extend our deepest sympathy to King Charles III and the family of our late Queen. As families we have also shared in the ups and downs of Royal births, deaths, marriages and a few scandals in a way never experienced so personally before, with the growth of mass media bringing a human dimension to the royalty with which we could associate in our own everyday lives.

Even if not a Royalist, you could not but have respect for her example of total dedication to service to the nation as she so prophetically promised on her accession. For the majority who have loved and admired The Queen for all she has stood for and meant for us over the years, her loss will be keenly felt and mourned. It marks a significant shift in world affairs, and many will grieve deeply for a Queen and age now lost to us.

As the Mayor and on behalf of Ledbury Town Council and people of Ledbury, I send our deepest condolences to her family who will feel the loss most acutely. We feel for them all at this very sad time. This will go down as one of the most momentous times in our history."
