From the Pastor

There may be someone out there who will disagree, yet I have not actually met anyone who was not sick – no pun intended – of COVID-19 and the way that it has affected our lives, and by “our” I am intending those of us who have neither contracted it nor lost a love one to it nor has or have had a loved one hospitalized by it, I have not met anyone who says he or she is enjoying the impact, is happy about the impact, of COVI-19 on his or her life. (One member of the Florence congregation, Linda Ernst, who now lives in Denver, had it but has recovered, and Grace Gorman of Community has told me that there are some members in her family who have experience it.) Not having encountered the disease does not mean that we are happy!

And yet if we do not learn something from this experience, and I am not talking about disease control or vaccines or anything like that, if we do not learn something we are wasting the experience, and one thing I hope we have learned is , no, *two things* I hope we have learned are at their core based on our Christian faith, or should arise from our Christian faith.

In particular, we can safely say, I believe, that a major factor in the re-outburst of the disease in Arizona is from, first, peoples’ not following the “rules,” and, related to this, peoples’ failure to wear simple facemasks when they are within ten feet (that may be overkill, I know, so “six” feet) from the non-immediate-family-member persons they encounter.

Religion?

Why in the past did some Jews consider themselves, or what did they mean by, “the chosen people”? Well, it was that God had chosen them *to receive Torah, to receive God’s Law!* “Chosen” did not have a “we are better than you” meaning, but rather a “we have been blessed!”

And *why* did God give the Law? Because of the way most of the Ten Commandments are phrased in the negative, “Thou shalt not,” the standard joke is that God is a killjoy, but what do the “shalt not’s” result in if followed? Six of them in the Protestant version (seven in the Catholic version) have the objective of avoiding injury to another person! They are meant for the well-being of people! They are not restrictions on behavior for the purpose of restricting behavior, they are restrictions on behavior so that *all might have the opportunity of enjoying life without fear of harm from a fellow member of the community.*

God’s Law is meant to allow humans to live together in happiness without being injured by another! God gave the Law not to be a killjoy, but, in fact, to be a liberator, a liberator from fear.

Obviously, social-distancing rules that have been put forth are not on a par with God’s Law and commandments, yet they are for the same purpose – avoiding injury (really, to both parties in an encounter) while allowing at least some aspects, *most aspects*, of daily life.

And facemasks? A rule to wear a facemask could be phrased, “Thou shalt not take the chance of spreading your nose droplets to another. . . just in case!” It’s both those same six or seven of the Ten Commandments and their summary: *Love your neighbor!*

I no longer contribute to the seminary I attended (there are too many Presbyterian seminaries for the number of clergy positions that will be available to their graduates; I think anyone who seeks to enter a seminary needs to think long and hard as to what he or she expects to gain from the experience), but I still receive mail and email, and this week I received an email blast from the president of the school with a prayer I had never heard before by a man who wrote one prayer most of us know and love, “The Serenity Prayer” (“God grant me the Serenity to accept the things I cannot change. *Etc.*),

Reinhold Niebuhr, the great early-mid twentieth century theologian and ethicist. The president thought this particularly appropriate to how Christians should behave during this pandemic, and I agree, so allow me to share it with you:

"O God, who hast bound us together in this bundle of life, give us grace to understand how our lives depend upon the courage, industry, honesty, and integrity of our fellow humans that we may be faithful in our responsibilities to them." Reinhold Niebuhr

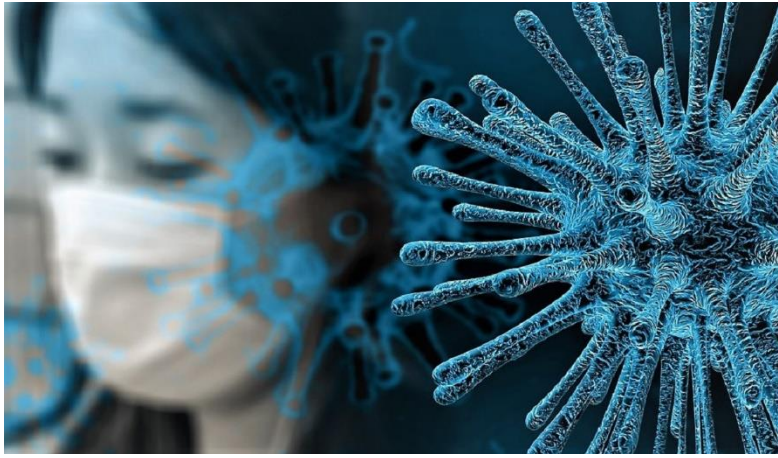

Christian-empathetic worship practice rules:

- 1. Everyone wears a mask going to one's seat. Recommend that everyone wear mask during worship or sit 20 feet away from anyone else. Masks are to show respect and consideration for others – even Sean Hannity recommends them.**
- 2. Everyone enters from side door and enter sanctuary from east door into sanctuary.**
- 3. No physical contact with other worshippers, ushers, or worship leaders.**
- 4. Sit *not closer than* in alternate (every other) pew; no more than two family groups in one pew and seek for groups to be ten feet apart.**
- 5. No hymnals, no bulletins, no collection plate passed; collection plates will be placed in front pews.**
- 6. No singing of hymns, no “Sharing the peace and joy” by physical contact.**
- 7. Exit from sanctuary will be by rows from the front and first from the east pews. East pews exit toward outside aisle, west pews exit toward center aisle.**

Hello All,

This attachment was read on the radio this 4th of July and seems appropriate at this time of concern and anxiety in our country. The highlighting is mine. Lincoln's words are lengthy but to the point and thought-provoking.

**Washington, D.C.
March 30, 1863**

Senator James Harlan of Iowa, whose daughter later married President Lincoln's son Robert, introduced this Resolution in the Senate on March 2, 1863. The Resolution asked President Lincoln to proclaim a National Day of Prayer and fasting. The Resolution was adopted on March 3, and signed by Lincoln on March 30, one month before the fast day was observed.

By the President of the United States of America.

A Proclamation.

Whereas, the Senate of the United States, devoutly recognizing the Supreme Authority and just Government of Almighty God, in all the affairs of men and of nations, has, by a resolution, requested the President to designate and set apart a day for National prayer and humiliation.

And whereas it is the duty of nations as well as of men, to own their dependence upon the overruling power of God, to confess their sins and transgressions, in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon; and to recognize the sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proven by all history, that those nations only are blessed whose God is the Lord.

And, insomuch as we know that, by His divine law, nations like individuals are subjected to punishments and chastisements in this world, may we not justly fear that the awful calamity of civil war, which now desolates the land, may be but a punishment, inflicted upon us, for our presumptuous sins, to the needful end of our national reformation as a whole People? We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of Heaven. We have been preserved, these many years, in peace and prosperity. We have grown in numbers, wealth and power, as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace, and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us; and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us!

It behooves us then, to humble ourselves before the offended Power, to confess our national sins, and to pray for clemency and forgiveness.

Now, therefore, in compliance with the request, and fully concurring in the views of the Senate, I do, by this my proclamation, designate and set apart Thursday, the 30th. day of April, 1863, as a day of national humiliation, fasting and prayer. And I do hereby request all the People to abstain, on that day, from their ordinary secular pursuits, and to unite, at their several places of public worship and their respective homes, in keeping the day holy to the Lord, and devoted to the humble discharge of the religious duties proper to that solemn occasion.

All this being done, in sincerity and truth, let us then rest humbly in the hope authorized by the Divine teachings, that the united cry of the Nation will be heard on high, and answered with blessings, no less than the pardon of our national sins, and the restoration of our now divided and suffering Country, to its former happy condition of unity and peace.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this thirtieth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty seventh.
