1925-2018

Volunteer Hospice of Clallam County is a 501(c)3 non-profit charitable organization, whose service area stretches from Diamond Point to Joyce.

The mission of Volunteer Hospice of Clallam County is to provide physical, emotional and spiritual support to terminally ill patients and their families with free around the clock registered nursing availability and trained volunteers.

This support enables patients to live out their final days as fully and comfortably as possible. Ongoing grief support services are also offered to the families and anyone in the community who has experienced the death of a loved one.

Since its inception in 1978, all services have been provided free of charge to patients and their families; VHOCC does not bill any government agency for its services.

We remember with gratitude Rose Crumb, R.N., the founder and former director of Volunteer Hospice from 1978-2009.

She received her nursing degree in St. Paul, Minnesota, her home state, and practiced in Port Angeles.

Inspired by caring for her dying father in Minnesota in the mid-1950's, she and a small group of volunteers established VHOCC in 1978. One of the early patients was her own husband T.L. "Red" Crumb, who died in 1984.

Rose was determined from the outset that end-of-life services would be provided free of charge. This meant no charge to the federal, state or private insurance agencies ever. She declared that dying and caring for the dying was stressful enough without having to worry about finances. In her wisdom she also realized the unique opportunity for service at an extremely distressing time.



NEW HEADQUARTERS

VHOCC has had numerous inquiries on the status of our move to the new headquarters, located at the corner of Race and 8th Street. As the old saying goes, “the devil is in the details.”

Remodeling of the existing office building has been progressing nicely under the able direction of VHOCC Board Member and volunteer extraordinaire, Michael Bucierka. As of this writing, completion of the main building, as well as groundbreaking for the adjacent storage facility, is slowly working through the maze of required building permits and inspections. In February, bids were being finalized on the fire alarm and sprinkler systems that must be in place as part of the permit process.

Despite the unforeseen delays, the new 3,700 square foot office, along with a large addition specifically designed to meet the storage needs of hospice supplies and medical equipment, will be a huge improvement over the existing, cramped quarters.

VHOCC nurses, staff, and volunteers look forward to serving the community from our new home at 829 East 8th Street. Volunteer Hospice extends a huge **THANK YOU** to the Sequim Bay Yacht Club (SBYC) and all who contributed time, effort, money, and expertise on the water for another successful **REACH AND ROW FOR HOSPICE RACE**. The 26th annual race on Sequim Bay by sailors and rowers alike last September is the largest fundraiser of the year to benefit VHOCC. These funds are earmarked specifically for the Respite Care Fund, which allows families in critical need to benefit from limited, but much-needed, paid respite care. Over \$31,000 from boat sponsorships, donations and race entrance fees from the 2019 race were added to this special fund and 66 families in need benefitted last year.

Started in 1992 by two avid sailors, Dr. Mike Crim and the late Scott Ogilvie, the event has historically taken place in September. We couldn’t do what we do for our families without the help from community organizations, their vision and ongoing support, and SBYC has been a faithful, long-term partner in our mission.
