Notes From Sarah



Dear Friends in Christ,

Just a couple weeks ago I found myself on a restorative retreat at Mercy Center in Auburn, with many of our fellow Patricians present as well. Together we soaked in the wisdom of the Celtic tradition, taking time to witness the presence of God within all things. Yet, what I found most profound about this retreat was an intriguing linguistic reference, brought to my attention by the Scottish theologian, John Phillip Newell. He specifically mentioned that in the New Testament, the Greek word, *theos*, is most often translated as “God,” but that its root suggests another translation as well. *Theos* also can be translated as “of the flow.” Therefore, when something is “of God,” it is “of the flow”; one is connected with all that was, is, and is to come. We are in tune with the presence of God all around us.

As we commence the season of Lent—a time when we repent of those things we have done and left undone—, I cannot help but connect this new understanding of *theos*, to the meaning of repentance. For repentance just means to redirect our gaze upon God, to reorient our lives to the Holy, to return to the Divine. It means that we set time apart to consider how we have turned our attention away from God. Or with this new understanding of *theos*: how have we stepped out of the flow? Out of the flow with ourselves? With our neighbors? And with all of God’s creation? How are we out of sync with the rhythm of our lives? How are we outside of the current with Christ?

So this Lenten season, I invite you to return to the flow. I invite you to consider how you might have stepped out of the stream this past year. How have unhealthy habits kept you of course? What may you need to do away with to create health and wholeness? Or what life-giving practices have fallen by the wayside of late? Do you need more time for prayer and meditation? More time to connect with God’s creation? These next forty+ days are your opportunity to consider what might need to change in order to reenter the current with Christ. This Lent I invite you, my fellow children of God, to return to the flow.

Standing Up for Peace at St. Patrick's

At the center of nonviolence stands the principle of love.
Along the way of life, someone must have sense enough and morality enough
to cut off the chain of hate.
This can only be done by projecting the ethic of love to the center of our lives.
~ *The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.*

What was at the center of our lives during the first week in January? For many in our community, it was fear that our country was escalating toward a hotter war in the Middle East, a war with unknown consequences, but certain violence. And our faith tells us, over and over, "Do not fear."

So on Thursday, January 9, from 6:00 to 9:00 pm, North Tahoe and Truckee neighbors came together at a Community Peace Vigil at St. Patrick's to recenter our hearts, deescalate, and gather strength to act for peace. Initiated by our community coalition United for Action, this vigil was led not only by clergy from our church, but also by representatives from the North Tahoe Hebrew Congregation, Lake Tahoe UMC & Retreat Center, Church of the Mountains UMC, St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church, and the Center for Spiritual Living Tahoe-Truckee.

Each brought guided meditations, reflections, music, and prayers to share. But what "projected the ethic of love" so powerfully, in Dr. King's words, were the spontaneous messages delivered by those who came to stand up for peace.

Many of the 45 in our sanctuary, from all walks of life and faith, did more than light candles. They came forward to the podium to speak of the need for inner peace—practices of compassion, deep listening, patience, and generosity that heal our brokenness. They spoke of the need for wisdom and respect in our country and world. They spoke of the imperative in their faith traditions, as in ours, to be activists—even extremists, in Dr. King's famous words—for love and justice. Because that is the brave and powerful work of peacemaking: to cut off the chain of hate in our hearts. In our homes. In our country and world.

Peace Companions: Tough Minds and Tender Hearts

Make no mistake: peacemaking is hard work that takes individual practice. And peacemaking takes lots of counter-cultural support when collectively we're inflamed to hostility or patterned to hate. We need companions with "tough minds and tender hearts," as Dr. King said, to help change those patterns within us and in our society.

Many in our community are hungry for this change. So, inspired by the energy of our Peace Vigil and a follow-up gathering on MLK Day, I've started an experimental community support group. Come center your heart for peace and activate change!

St. Patrick's Supports English Language Learners in North Lake Tahoe

St. Patrick's parishioners have a long track record of helping neighbors in our community learn English. We warmly invite you to join in!

Within the past year, three parishioners have worked with the nationally awarded English Language Learners In-Home Program of Northern Nevada, using its administration, curricula, and basic texts to identify and teach students in the North Lake Tahoe area. This is at no cost to students or tutors. In 2019, CNN named ELL In-Home's founder, Florence Phillips of Carson City, as a Top 10 finalist in its "Hero of the Year" program, honoring her 16-year effort to help Nevadans achieve English skills and citizenship. We are proud to be affiliated with its mission.

St. Patrick's tutors—Lucille Leong Wang, Nancy Rawie, Cherry Barney, and Steve Barney—have taught a total of five students. They have tailor-made curricula for each student, with lesson plans ranging from basic English grammar and pronunciation, to civics lessons for citizenship, to journalism and the poetry of e e cummings. Students' native languages have included Spanish, Portuguese, and Mandarin. Individual lessons are held in St. Pat's Library.

After ten months of civics lessons, our first Citizenship student received her USCIS certificate and became a new U.S. citizen this January. Another student had her essay about the annual ELL In-Home Award Gala highlighted in the program's quarterly fall newsletter.

In addition to one-to-one tutoring, volunteers from St. Pat's and the wider community join local English learners in an informal discussion group called Café Conversacion on Thursday evenings throughout the year. This weekly drop-in gathering, which began in summer 2016, was the brainchild of Rev. Clare Novak and Amy Guinan of Tahoe Family Solutions, building on an earlier parish ESL tutoring program.

Spirited discussions fill St. Pat's Library each week, facilitated by an ESL teacher from Tahoe Family Solutions (Amy Guinan or Shirley Nelson) and hosted by a volunteer. Many Café learners also attend the TFS classes, and supplement their ESL lessons with friendly Café chat over coffee, tea, and treats.

Students are hard-working and sincere in their efforts to master a tough language. So we make it fun! Here they share about the culture, community, and family life in their home countries—Colombia, China, Mexico, Taiwan, Kyrgyzstan, and beyond—as we native speakers share about ours. Along with cherished pictures and objects, "Conversationalists" have brought special ethnic dishes like homemade tamales, Chinese dumplings, and pizzas to our gatherings and potlucks, bringing memories to life (and delighting us all).

There's lots of laughter along with the learning and discovery in our Café. Intriguing topics of conversation have been:

- * Of all the characters in history, whom would you like to meet?
- * What are your goals in the next five years?
- * What is your hometown like?
- * What is your favorite month in Tahoe . . . and how did you happen to come here?

Sharing our stories and perspectives brings the group closer and sparks camaraderie: we find we have so much in common. This is truly an international outreach activity that builds bridges across differences of language, age, and culture in our community. Come and see!

Thus far, the arrangement has been working due primarily to the extra efforts of a dedicated few. Health issues and physical limitations have presented some obstacles as well, but for the most part, all duties have been performed to the glory of God.

Perhaps, many of you have noticed and received Holy Communion from our intricate and magnificent new Chalice and Paten. These were gifted to St Patrick's by our beloved Ginnie Jed and Gary Thomsen in loving memory of their respective spouses, Stu and Mariel. We are most grateful for their thoughtful donation. In response to the need, Jim Hooper and Emy Gurowitz have provided the funds necessary to purchase a new veil and burse to be used and coordinate with our "White" seasonal paraments. Thank you all for your extreme generosity.

The altar guild would also like to remind parishioners to contribute to the flower fund. Contributions are vital in order to continue the purchase of arrangements outside of the Lenten season. Due to limited funds, fresh flowers will only be purchased when donation monies are available.

Annual first quarter Altar Guild cleanup times following services have been scheduled as have the Saturday set-ups for Sunday services and Ash Wednesday. Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter are particularly busy times of the year requiring more set-up and clean-up scheduling for the additional services. Second, Third and Forth quarter schedules will be arranged following Easter, dependent on committee membership size and availability. A Training Session will also be scheduled some time in the near future, details will be announced as soon as known.

This past year, the altar guild has dwindled in numbers due to illness, death, and relocation of parishioners. Therefore, this extremely vital committee is in need of assistance in order for our worship to run smoothly and beautifully. It is becoming more and more apparent that infusion of some new, younger blood would reinvigorate our team. Until that time, we remain understaffed and in some instances, due to age and physical limitations unable to perform some of the duties necessary. We are extremely grateful for the assistance the Flannel Team during our time of limited membership. Without whom, many of our obligations would not have been met. Your Altar Guild asks that you prayerfully consider joining our vital team to the life of our congregation.

2. After your form has been entered into the system, you will get an EMAIL invitation from Realm to join our online community. Check your spam folder!
3. Create an online account with Realm (login and password)
4. Click the Realm link on our website to access your account and our online directory! (www.tahoeepiscopal.org)

The online directory is where you can update your personal information, upload a personal and/or family photo, and view the contact information for your fellow parishioners!

Need a phone number and address? Check Realm!!! Not all members are in the directory, depending on their privacy choices, so you may still need to call the office (775-831-1418).

HAVE YOU BEEN GETTING OUR EMAILS?

We have been able to email you directly from Realm! Let us know if you want to be added to the list or if you'd like to be removed. We'll be sad to see you go though. Our goal right now is to stick to a once-per-week email blast with announcements and other important information.

LEAVING A LEGACY FOR ST. PATRICK'S

Planning for death usually isn't high on our "to-do" list, and understandably so, because creating/updating a will or trust will force us to face our own mortality. Of course, there isn't a known deadline so it's easy simply put it off ... and put it off again. That's why only about half of adults over the age of 55 have a will that directs where their assets will go. Yet, preparing for life after death is a holy endeavor we are called to as Christians.

Estate planning is essential because it helps your beneficiaries and allows you to leave a legacy by supporting St. Patrick's Church along with your other favorite charities. When considering where your money will go you'll often get a deeper understanding of what you value in this world, and what has transformed your life in this realm. As I prayerfully ask you to consider bequeathing money to St. Patrick's, I want to make you aware of the following.

One must be specific about your planned gifts rather than leaving it up to your beneficiaries to "do the right thing." They'll be grieving and having them guess your favorite charities might lead to conflict.

A bequest is the most common way to leave a legacy gift. Here are the different types:

- * Specific Bequest – Designate the amount of money or specific asset (property, securities, etc.) you wish to donate.
- * Percentage Bequest – Designate the percentage of your estate you want distributed to a charity.
- * Residuary Bequest – After distributions are made to family, friends, etc. instruct that the remaining part of your estate be distributed to a charity.

Your attorney or online service can assist with the language, but you will want to be very specific. For example, your will or trust should state: "I give and bequeath the sum of \$___ (or ___% of my estate) to St. Patrick's Episcopal Church in Incline Village.

Leaving a legacy for a charity can help lower taxes, especially if it comes from an IRA or other qualified retirement plan. The beneficiary of an IRA will pay taxes on it unless it goes to a charity. To leave your IRA to a charity be sure to add the organization to the custodian's Beneficiary Designation form.

If you are one of the 50 percent that doesn't have a will then I encourage you to begin planning soon. If you have one, then consider updating it with such specific language, as addressed in this article. Your beneficiaries, St. Patrick's Church, and all the people and institutions you support will appreciate your intentionality and preparation.

We've wrapped up 2019 by distributing many knitted and crocheted items to several groups.

There continues to be a good turnout each Wednesday afternoon, with a couple of new members joining. 'Course new ladies (and gentlemen!) are always welcome, even if your skills are rusty and you cannot attend the gatherings on a regular basis.

The Knitting Club at the elementary school, which volunteers from the Guild had been running for eleven years, has fallen by the wayside since the Boys and Girls Club has taking over the IVGID after-school activities. In any case, the number of volunteers from the Guild had dropped, which isn't good for giving enough attention to the students.

2019 Distributions:
