


LESSON OUTLINE

1 To begin this lesson, brainstorm reasons why a person/family may become homeless as a class. 2 Explain to the learners that homelessness is not an illness or something wrong that people have done, or something people want. It can be a result of a difficult time in a person's life. People who are homeless are not there by choice. 3 To develop a better understanding of the general causes of homelessness, learners will complete Activity 1: The ugly duckling followed by Activity 2: Illustrate the cause?

Topic: Discrimination as a cause of homelessness

Materials Needed:

- Chart paper
- Markers
- The Ugly Duckling Short Movie

Instructions:

- 1. Begin this activity by reviewing/defining discrimination for the learners.
- 2. Ask the learners discussion question 1-3
- 3. As a class watch, The Ugly Duckling short movie followed by discussion questions 4 and 5

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How was discrimination shown in the movie?
- 2. How can discrimination be a reason for someone to become homeless?
- 3. Do you think when someone becomes homeless that they still experiencing discrimination? Why or why not?
- 4. Did the duckling experience discrimination?
- 5. How did this discrimination lead to the duckling experiencing homelessness?

Instructions:

- 1. Begin this activity by explaining to the learners that
 there are many reasons why someone may become
 homeless. Explain each using the definitions below
- 2. Learners will identify these reasons and write a story or draw a picture based on a chosen cause
- 3. As a class discuss questions 1-5 before completing—the activity instructions on the following page


Discussion Questions:

- 1. Who can become homeless?
- 2. Do you think someone would want to be homeless?
- 3. Is homelessness a problem? Is it a small problem or large problem?
- 4. Who should be responsible for solving this problem?
- 5. Are there any ways that we could solve this problem? In small groups of 2-3, discuss these solutions.



Illustrate the Cause

Instructions: Cut out each cause of homelessness below based on the number of learners in the class (you may need to print multiple copies). Learners will choose one at random and draw a picture or write a story about someone becoming homeless because of the reason that they have chosen. The story/drawing should include the <u>person's life before</u> they did not have a home, <u>why</u> they became homeless and a <u>description of their life</u> with no home. Learners may share their story/drawing with the class once complete.

DEFINITIONS

Discrimination

Discrimination occurs when an individual is treated differently than another solely on the basis of some characteristic. (the way you look, your age) Discrimination impacts the options and choices of individuals when it comes to all sorts of things in life such as employment, housing and access to services that all contribute to an increased risk of experiencing homelessness.

Natural Disaster

A Natural disasters can hit at anytime and anywhere in the world and can include all types of severe weather, which have the potential to pose a significant threat to human health and safety, property. Natural disasters often result in homelessness for many people

War/Displacement

The disruptive nature of war and internal conflict can cause people to become displaced. Also known as forced migration, a displaced individual becomes homeless because they've involuntarily been moved away from their homes/home region

Unemployment

A lack of income can result in an individual becoming homeless. Becoming homelessness then makes it very difficult to obtain and maintain employment.

Mental/Physcial Illness

A mental or physical illness can lead to and be amplified by homelessness. People with mental illness experience homelessness for longer periods of time and have less contact with family and friends.

Violence

The use of physical force or power, threatened or actual, against oneself, another person.

Social supports

Social support is exactly that: the belonging and care we receive from other people. Those people can include many different groups of people, including partners, friends, family members, co-workers, neighbours or even professionals like doctors, counsellors, or peer support workers.
