Our Dream

We work towards the day when every child in every village gets to go to school and every one of them gets to hear a clear presentation of the Gospel.

Expanding our network of schools

In 2020, we have 51 schools in 3 countries and 9 more are under construction.

Increasing enrollment with at least 50% girls

Currently, 55% of our 12,878 students are girls.

High academic performance

In 2019, 97% of our students passed and 54% did well enough to go on to college!

Visible community service

Our largest project is our HIV/AIDS clinic that serves 1208 people every month.

Continuing involvement

41 of our 599 teachers are our graduates and 8 serve on our International Team.

Sustainable financing

Last year parents paid \$792,000 which fully paid our teacher and staff salaries.

ntermediate Outcomes

Word spreads as more villages ask to partner with us to build schools.

Village Schools becomes a country-wide movement.

Students show increasing evidence that they understand they are blessed to be a blessing to others. Their faith produces good works.

Graduates of our schools are being productive members of society.

Many of them choose to be involved in Village Schools.





We are partnering with 262 villages to run the 51 schools we have built together since 2005.


Students Enrolled Annually



12,878 students are enrolled today in our schools. 7045 (54 percent) are girls. 1045 (11 percent) are orphans. Almost all of them would otherwise not be in school.

Cumulative Number of Graduates



219 missionaries have come mostly from churches in the United States and Canada to live in these communities and teach our students.


6283 students have already graduated from our schools. Most have gone on to universities and colleges. 41 have returned to serve with Village Schools.

National Exams Results



Over the last decade, we have an average pass rate of 95% on all national exams. Last year we had a 98.9% pass rate.
