### SMALL CHURCHES NEWSLETTER Autumn 2020







Welcome to the Autumn edition of SCC news. After a beautiful summer weatherwise, we are now very much into a chilly wet autumn. But with wind and rain there have been lots of stunning rainbows which always serve as a reminder of our Creator and His promises. In this edition we will look at the autumn webinar held in September and see how some of our churches are coping with this unprecedented time. We will also look forward to another webinar, and events that are being planned.

We hope that you will be encouraged and inspired by what you read, and that you will contribute to the next newsletter if you have something happening that will be a help to others.

### **SCC Webinar on 12th September 10-12noon**

Hilary planned the morning, with speakers bringing a 5 minute introduction to each section and then break out groups to discuss and feed back their thoughts.

Sue Wetherall from Emmanuel Church at Ham Christian Centre brought the first item: Looking **UP** with God. Sue told us about the recent history of Ham - a small church with just 10 committed to membership. A year ago at their weekly prayer meeting they were encouraged to work for revival and growth. Then Covid 19 hit and their building was closed. Their leader was struck down with cancer, yet God continued to give vision and goals for re-building, including: "This little church, brought to its knees, will rise out of the ashes". They are repainting the church, ready for where God will lead.

What have we learned from listening to God while most former activities have been forced to close?

Stephen Maclean, Cricklewood Baptist Church brought the first part of **IN** - with technology. Stephen started after lockdown using Facebook Live which required a good camera on his smart phone and a church Facebook page, which they had. He said that it was very amateurish but people were very forgiving! However, not everyone had Facebook, so he began using a laptop camera to record to You-Tube. After the service he would upload a copy of

the service video, upload it to YouTube and put it on the church website. He continued to research and decided to use an app called 'switcher' which he found very easy to use. He connected by iPad to his iPhone to act as a control panel, and could then insert videos, worship songs and prerecorded material.

The church opened again for worship in August but Stephen continues to livestream for the benefit of members unable to attend for health or work reasons. He has been encouraged to be joined by contacts in other countries including family in Scotland who didn't attend church.

Part 2 of **IN without technology** was brought by Rev Gerry Stanton at Union Church, Crouch End. He was aware of what other churches were doing and felt bad not to be doing likewise, but his people were not tech savvy. Personally he spent more time praying for the people in the church, and had more time with God. Where he could safely visit and talk to people on their doorstep he did so. Otherwise he would phone

them. He set up an Excel spreadsheet with the date of contact and the type (phone, email, visit), which alerted him if anyone had

been missed for a while.

They have now returned to the church building on the first and third Sundays, using a reflective service with YouTube.

Rev Nick Graves, Old Lodge Lane Baptist Church at Purley spoke of being **OUT** of buildings and IN the community. A group from the SCC team visited Nick in the summer of 2017 and saw how their Thursday Tea filled the premises with people of all faiths and none on alternate Thursdays. The community meal attracted up to 90 people and became exhausting for Nick and his team. 2020 was to be a sabbatical for him while the Tea had a break. Lockdown broke into that sabbatical and Nick returned to take up a Crovdon Council project called the One Stop Food Stop. This meant receiving fresh, chilled and frozen food and supplying £20 worth of shopping for £3.50 to those who were struggling financially. Council officers would attend to provide support and advice where needed. The Council financed commercial fridges and freezers and someone from the church offered to be project manager. 30 volunteers responded to an appeal. In just 2 weeks the project was up and running, and they were soon delivering food parcels to 90 families across south Croydon. Some volunteers had to return to work once lockdown eased, but 60 families a week are still being fed, though most

come to the church to collect the bags. Nick has been able to have conversations with both volunteers and visitors,

some very deep. They are now having services again, but on Thursday evening rather than Sunday morning. Very exciting times!

Kim Bames from Waltham Abbey Baptist Church spoke next about GOING BACK INTO THE BUILDING.

The church started by consulting the BU website and the government advice, and then reviewed the risk assessment tasks to be completed. They put together a plan for social distancing, and another for cleaning. They then put together a plan for leading services having regard for restrictions. Finally they made a video to show the signage and directions, and to explain how services would be different as preparation for those returning.

The final speaker was <u>Pastor Sandra Kimber</u> from <u>Hampton Wick Baptist Church</u>, who looked to the future with **A CALL TO MISSION**. She had lots of questions for individual people about why they were worshipping in their present church, and whether God was calling them to remain there. She concluded with the hope to "see a new breed of missionaries sent out across the UK to help, revive and refresh churches who long to see the kingdom of God grow in their area".

The 47 people attending were then divided into groups of about 6 people who had 25 minutes to meet one another, share their situation/experiences and ideas/plans for the future. I'm sure most groups could have shared for double the time! Positive messages of using more time with God, and growing faith, were encouraging from almost everyone in the feedback.

The main feature of our harvest service was the BMS World Mission video called Operation Chad. This was heart wrenching but also encouraging as the focus was on the staff at a remote hospital in Chad. Both local people and missionaries shone with the love of Jesus,

and we were shown those who benefitted physically from their care, and also those who came to faith or had their faith strengthened. It was most uplifting and led us to praise God. What a privilege to share the Good News of Jesus as new life is combined with

healing! What a harvest to come!
