If you claim benefits and you would also like to get paid by Co-Production Collective, we recommend you speak to a benefits advisor to see if receiving payments from us will affect your benefits.

This information sheet will help you understand:

- What counts as permitted work
- Who/when/how you may need to declare any work you do.

- <u>Please note:</u> at the bottom of the HMRC Factsheet page it says that doing permitted work can affect other benefits you are receiving like Income Support, Housing Benefit or Council Tax Reduction. They tell you to 'to talk to your Jobcentre Plus work coach before you start any work.'
- You will see that the HMRC Factsheet page also says that 'if you receive Housing Benefit or Council Tax Reduction and you're thinking of starting permitted work, you must talk to your local council straightaway, as the amount you get could change.'

Jobcentre Plus - please talk to <u>Jobcentre Plus</u> about the fact that you want to undertake activity with us.

- Please double check if you need to get permission to do activity with us.
 - You can call the activity with us 'service user involvement' or 'coproduction'.
- We can provide a letter to explain activity with us in more detail if you or Jobcentre Plus would like this.

GOV.UK – it is important to be aware of the amount of income tax you need to pay

- The amount of income tax you need to pay depends on several factors you can find out more about this on the <u>GOV.UK webpage</u>.
- If you are already employed and still want to get paid by the Co-Production
 Collective for your time you may need to see if this classifies you as 'working for

- Pay you expenses and for any time incurred separately even if to the same bank account so that the Jobcentre Plus does not treat the amount paid for expenses as for time worked.
- Talk you through the payment options available to you and help you get the support you need to decide how best to be paid.
- Provide information needed about the nature of the work you are doing with us to help you fill out any forms.
- Not pay you we can offer alternative non-monetary ways to recognise your contribution instead.
