OUR STORY

Her name was Heidi...

and Sherri Franklin was in love. Sherri had just started volunteering at a Bay Area shelter, and in came this beautiful lab mix with a grey muzzle, a wagging tail, and a smile on her face. Her family had given her up because, they said, she was too old. Sherri came in every day to take her for a walk and spend as much time with her as she could before she got snapped up by a lucky adopter.

Weeks went by. That happy wagging girl slowly started to break. Her tail went down. Her energy disappeared. She lost interest in food. And then, one day, Sherri came to visit and she was gone.

“Adopted at last!” Sherri said. A staff member said no, Heidi hadn’t been adopted. She had been euthanized. The shelter was over-crowded, and dogs like Heidi had to make way for younger dogs who were much more likely to find homes.

Sherri was horrified. Heidi was the most loving and soulful dog in the shelter. Why wasn’t she snapped up? “Nobody wants an old dog,” Sherri was told. “I do,” she thought. And she was certain that other people, once they had a chance to meet them, would, too.

Muttville was born.

Seniors Rule

Muttville began with a novel mission: to rescue and find homes for senior dogs, the ones least likely to be adopted – and sadly, first to be euthanized. We wanted to give these wonderful older dogs a safe haven and show people how amazing it is to adopt vintage love!

Veterinary Care

Muttville is the leader and model for rescue organizations' in-house vet care. Most dogs come to us with health needs, some urgent. Our in-house care can quickly relieve pain and suffering, is less stressful for the dogs, gets them ready for adoption more quickly, and saves time and money— which helps us save more dogs!

Cage-Free Shelter

Muttville was the country's first cage-free shelter. For senior dogs, many of whom have spent their entire lives in homes, kennel life (hard floors, cages, noise...) can be traumatic. At Muttville, dogs can mosey about as they choose, with plenty of soft beds, couches, and laps to curl up on.

Hospice Program

For dogs with terminal illnesses, we created the hospice program, one of the first in the country. Muttville provides support and palliative care, while our hospice families give these wonderful pups an amazing last chapter. We have happily shared our hospice model with other organizations and vets.

Manny Mo was surrendered to a shelter in Texas, then rescued by Muttville when Hurricane Harvey hit.

Foster Program

Our amazing network of foster families gives the dogs a soft place to land (and lots of love) while they wait to be adopted. The foster program was essential during the pandemic: with the shelter closed, every single dog went straight to foster, allowing us to continue saving lives.

Fun for Humans

Many potential adopters dread the "depressing dog shelter," and rightly so. Muttville is different. We strive to make it a joyful place where people feel comfortable and where they can connect with each other and with our wonderful dogs.

Since 2007, we've saved 9,000 dogs.

A turning point for Muttville came when the SF SPCA leased us our current space on Alabama Street. With a permanent address and regular hours, we could expand our cage-free, homey environment to accommodate volunteers, staff, and visitors. And what visitors! Our adoption weekends became standing-room-only events, and our adoption rate increased by 44%!



Every year since Muttvile began, we've been able to save more and more wonderful senior dogs, thanks to generous support from corporations, foundations, and thousands of individuals.





A typical day at Muttvile...

There's a lot going on here, and it will put a huge smile on your face. Muttvile is a cage-free shelter (the first ever in the U.S.), which means dogs are happily roaming about, lounging around, sitting on laps, and melting hearts.

You'll see newly rescued mutts coming in for intake and veterinary care; staff working at desks loaded with chihuahuas; and volunteers in yellow aprons cuddling, walking, feeding, and adoring the dogs. You may see a group of seniors citizens at our Cuddle Club or kids learning Humane Education. And you'll see adopters finding their new best friends.




We also learned from the pandemic that we need space that provides ample circulation and fresh air to keep our mutts and our human staff, volunteers, and visitors safe.

Help More Dogs

Muttville has become a crucial part of the rescue network in California and beyond. Shelters depend on us to find loving homes for the senior dogs they fear they won't be able to place.

Expanded Vet Care

Currently, our vet team doesn't have the space to do more than one exam or procedure at a time. The new veterinary suite will give us multi-room capacity, and bring nearly all of our surgeries in-house.

Humane Education

The mutts love it when kids visit! School children regularly come to Muttville to learn about compassion for vulnerable creatures. Our new home will have plenty of space for these adorable sessions.

Emergency Response

The new space will increase our capacity to take in refugees on short notice from hoarding situations and puppy mills, as well as natural disasters such as wildfires and hurricanes.

Seniors for Seniors

We are committed to connecting senior people with senior dogs. For those who can't adopt, we host Cuddle Clubs, where they can socialize, hang out with the mutts, and bask in the love.

Community Events

We're excited to have the space to host more social events, educational workshops, and professional symposiums. The more people we can welcome into the Muttville world, the better!




The protected outdoor courtyard is a perfect place for mutts to play.

A place to prepare meals, medication, and to-go foster packs for the dogs – and a warm gathering place for the humans.




The Neighborhood

A central location in our beloved Mission District. Our welcoming neighbors, including the Mission Food Hub next door, are already helping us bring senior mutt love to the community!


