Public holidays

People in New Zealand always look forward to a **long weekend**.

We get a **long weekend** when there is a **public holiday** and it falls on a Monday, so a long weekend is a Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

This means people can have three days off work and more time to spend with their family and friends. They have time to relax at home, enjoy some fun activities together or go away on a trip.

A **short week** means some people only have to work four days after a long weekend, yet they still get paid for five days. This makes them very happy!



Working in the food or service industry



Of course, some people still have to work on a long weekend, especially if they work in the food or service industry.

Supermarkets usually stay open every day. Workers in a supermarket may have to work on a Saturday, Sunday and Monday, so they don't always get a long weekend.

Sometimes people have accidents, so people who work in a hospital or medical centre may have to work on a long weekend too.



However, people who work every day from Monday to Friday are lucky to get a **long weekend** and a **short week** when there is a public holiday which falls on a Monday.

Some people who have to work on a public holiday get paid extra for the time they work and a day off later. This day is called a day-in-lieu.

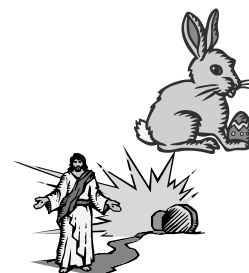


How many public holidays are there in NZ?

Here are the holidays celebrated in 2012-2013 in New Zealand.

A public holiday is celebrated for a special reason

This may be to celebrate a historic event, such as **Waitangi Day** or **ANZAC Day**, a religious festival such as **Easter** or **Christmas**, or some other important part of NZ culture.

We also celebrate another public holiday called **Anniversary Day**, but this day is celebrated on a different day for each region in NZ.

For example, if you live in Auckland province, Anniversary Day was celebrated on Monday 30 January 2012 and if you live in Westland province, Anniversary Day will be celebrated on Monday 3 December 2012.

Anniversary Day celebrates the *founding* or *beginning* of the province where you live, in other words, when the arrival of the first European settlers happened.

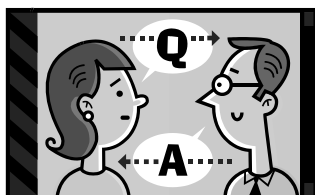

Labour Day

One of the last public holidays of the year before Christmas is in October. It is called **Labour Day** and because the holiday falls on a Monday, it makes a long weekend which we call **Labour Weekend**. Many people go away for the long weekend. Some people go to the beach for the first time after the winter. There is often a lot of traffic on the road. Many people look forward to Labour Weekend because it is a sign that warmer days are coming and also it has been 4 months since the last public holiday!

Why do we celebrate Labour Day and why in October?



Labour Day in New Zealand

In NZ we have an 8 hour working day and a 40 hour working week. Most people work 5 days a week.

There is a **minimum wage** in NZ for all people over 16 years. The adult rate (over 18 years) is \$13.50 per hour. The youth rate (16-17 years) is \$10.80 per hour.



A *minimum wage* means you *cannot* be paid *less* than this amount of money when you are working. People who work *overtime* are paid *more*.

However many years ago during the 1800s in NZ, many people worked for much longer than 8 hours a day and they worked for low wages in sometimes difficult conditions.

In 1840 a carpenter named Samuel Parnell refused to work for more than 8 hours a day. He believed a person should have 8 hours for work, 8 hours for sleep and 8 hours for recreation. Many people agreed with him. 50 years later on **28 October 1890**, Samuel led a parade through the streets to celebrate the first Labour Day in NZ. This became law in NZ in October 1899 and we still celebrate it today on the fourth Monday in October.
