Blind Ambition

Last week we heard James and John asking Jesus: *Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory* (Mk 10:37). Their personal ambition blinded them from the horrible destiny that awaited their teacher, who previously stated to them: *We are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be betrayed to the chief priests and teachers of the law. They will condemn him to death and will hand him over to the Gentiles* (Mk 10:33).

That last stop for Jesus in his final destiny to Jerusalem is Jericho. At this point, he is literally ascending to the great city. The 25 km stretch between from Jericho and Jerusalem was a notoriously dangerous road. Jerusalem is 700 m above sea-level; the Dead Sea, near which Jericho stood, is 400m below sea-level. So then, in 25 km, this road rose over 1 km. It was a narrow road filled with blind corners and sudden turnings, perfect places for bandits to hide and rob pilgrims, which served as the context for the The Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10:25-37.

Also, Jericho would have been a city filled with much activity, as Jewish pilgrims and many Temple priests were on their way for the feast of Passover in a week. Those unable to make the difficult journey because of age or disability, would have lined the streets of Jericho to bid farewell to the pilgrims. Yet in the midst of Jericho's chaos, someone told Bartimaeus, a blind beggar unable to go up to Jerusalem himself, that Jesus of Nazareth was leaving the city.

How did this blind man know of Jesus? Why did he call him out in particular, when there so many other holy people were going up to Jerusalem? Obviously he knew about Jesus from all the miracles had performed. By the point, St. Mark recounts 18 miracles in his gospel, such as the healing of the blind man at Bethsaida (Mk 8:22-26) about a 100km away from Jericho. So persistently did Bartimaeus want the miracle that he calls out to Jesus twice: Son of David, have mercy on me! Jesus is a man on a mission to die, preoccupied by the pilgrimage ahead to Jerusalem, yet calls Bartimaeus to him.

When Bartimaeus hears that Jesus wants to see him he throws off his cloak, and sprang up and came to him. Bartimaeus is so excited to come to Jesus that he casts off one of his few possessions. Jesus then enters into a dialogue with Bartimaeus: What do you want me to do for you? The blind man said to him, My teacher, let me see again (10:50-1).

The blind man now becomes a man with sight. What does he do? Does he look for the cloak, or go back home? No, he followed him on the way. Contrast this with the rich young man earlier in Mk 10:17-27.

The impact of Bartimaeus' healing touched the pilgrims so deeply that they praised Jesus as he entered Jerusalem triumphantly, *Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!* (Mk 11:10), and also "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! (Mt 21:9).

While James and John were blindly ambitious for Jesus to serve them for personal glorification. In contrast, Bartimaeus was blindly ambitious to follow Jesus triumphantly. So, like Bartimaeus, let us follow Jesus blindly so we can glorify for him.
