PRESS RELEASE FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

BOTH SIDES, NOW, an arts-based community engagement project exploring what it means to live well, and leave well, co-presented by Drama Box and ArtsWok Collaborative since 2013, returns this November. This latest edition, MENGUKIR HARAPAN, is made with, and largely for the Malay-Muslim community in Singapore. Mengukir Harapan – 'carving hope' – represents our wish to create a culturally contextual, safe space in which the community can share their aspirations, wishes and challenges about not just death, but the journey leading up to it.

Adib Kosnan, one of two of our Leading Artists, shares:

We hope to open up conversations about the quality of life one desires when entering the end-of-life phase. This is something that is not talked about in the Malay-Muslim community as we are usually focused on the next phase of our journey, the afterlife. But what about the days before that, for ourselves and also for those we leave behind?

Mengukir Harapan is the result of a dedicated research process that took over oneand-a-half years. Our Creative Producer **Ngiam Su-Lin** reflects:

Having presented this project for the past 7 years with a primarily Chinese audience, we very much wanted to create more culturally relevant content and approaches for other ethnic communities, starting with the Malay community. We wanted a rigorous process for this, and to be informed by the community themselves. As such, we worked with a team of professional researchers to guide our process.

This included gathering information from experts in different fields, and stories from the community through 7 different engagement workshops with those aged 17 years old and above, meeting different demographics of the Malay-Muslim community to gain an understanding of generational perspectives on end-of-life, amongst others.

The Lead Advisor to the research team was **Dr Ad Maulod**, Senior Research Fellow at the Centre for Ageing, Research and Education, Duke-NUS Medical School. He shares:

We observed some resistance among members of the Malay–Muslim community to initiate end-of-life conversations with their loved ones. Children resist conversations about end-of-life to avoid offending parents while parents worry about children taking on the burden of additional responsibilities. This mutual misunderstanding is not due to a generational gap or loose family ties. Rather, strong bonds and deference towards elders among Malay–Muslim families make such conversations more difficult than anticipated.

This research process laid the foundations for **KATA-KATA KITA**, our variety show in November over three evenings. In the words of our Artistic Director, **Kok Heng Leun**:

We realise that the kind of dramatic context we're looking for as well as the findings of our research coincide. And that actually gives us a lot of confidence on developing the programme, turning the research into artistic work, creating the central questions that we need to engage with the audience.

*Kata-Kata Kita* takes form in a variety show owing to the special circumstances of the pandemic. Our other Leading Artist, **Moli Mohter**, who along with Adib Kosnan has been with us for previous editions of *Both Sides, Now*, explains:

Kata-Kata Kita, meaning 'our words', represents the stories of our community. Normally, we would hold a festival, with a bit of everything: music, theatre, discussions with audience members. As this year we will be going online, in addition to having limited live audiences, we landed on the variety show as the perfect format to have a range of – everything! – and be accessible online.

Hosted by popular personalities Hatta Said and Gloria Tan, our line-up includes RADIO DUKACITA, PANTANG and SUKAR (MELEPASKAN). Alongside these, setting the ambiance will be live music by the gifted Khairul Afwan.

Since September, we have been collecting heartfelt letters from members of the public which they never had the chance to send to people whom they lost. Brought to life by the voice of **DJ Big**, their unspoken words may provide some form of catharsis, and hopefully comfort, for contributors and listeners alike. On the other hand, *Pantang* brings a light touch to the topic of funerals, with our actors entertaining scenarios such as the worst condolences messages ever received and what to wear for a funeral – or what not to. Our creative team expresses:

We hope to alleviate the resistance to having these conversations by acknowledging these issues in an entertaining and relatable manner.

Our sandiwara-style drama, Sukar (Melepaskan), unfolds over three episodes and stars Dalifah Shahril, Farez Najid, Izzul Irfan and R Chandran. Three siblings grapple with the loss of their mother while caring for their father. Death, as we know, is inevitable. But what comes before, in navigating the hard parts of caregiving, inheritance and terminal illness? After each episode, there will be a live panel discussion with experts from the fields of law, palliative care, and social work.

Kata-Kata Kita will be presented online with a limited number of live audiences at Aliwal Arts Centre due to pandemic-related conditions. Yet we will be engaging with everyone else in new ways: people will be able to comment online – via the Both Sides, Now website and social media, and even contribute to the show in real-time. And beyond that, after the live shows, people will still be able to access our content online, and continue these conversations.

Next year, we hope to journey deeper with *Mengukir Harapan*, by engaging the community of Bedok. Here, we will be creating opportunities for more in-depth conversations about end-of-life, with initiatives such as arts workshops for members of the community, leading up to another arts engagement open to the public.

## ABOUT BOTH SIDES, NOW: MENGUKIR HARAPAN

Both Sides, Now: Mengukir Harapan, the latest edition of Both Sides, Now, is an arts-based community engagement project exploring what it means to live well, and leave well.

Death is a part of life, impending and certain. Unfortunately, not many of us are willing to talk about it openly. What are our wishes and hopes while our hearts are still beating? How do we prepare for our final exit without losing our dignity? Are people who are closest and dearest to us ready to accept our sometimes painful, final decisions? Death does not discriminate.

When the time comes, will those we leave behind be prepared to take the step forward and carve out a new hope?

Audiences will be entertained while learning more about end-of-life topics, such as Advance Care Planning, Faraidh law, wills, grief and bereavement. We will round up each day with a live panel discussion with experts from different fields.

### **CREATIVE TEAM**

# Artistic Director Kok Heng Leun, Drama Box

Heng Leun is a prominent figure in the Singapore arts scene, having built his artistic career over many decades as a theatre director, playwright, dramaturg and educator. Heng Leun is known for his ability to engage the community on various issues through the arts, championing civil discourse across different segments of society. His explorations with multi-disciplinary engaged arts have produced works like *Project Mending Sky*, a series on environmental issues, *Both Sides, Now* a project that seeks to normalise end-of-life conversations and *It Won't Be Too Long*, which touched on the dynamics of space in Singapore. His most recent work *Tanah+Air* 水+±: A Play In Two Parts was about the dispossession of the indigenous Malays and Orang Seletar of Singapore. Heng Leun's contributions to the arts have landed him awards from the Singapore National Arts Council – the Young Artist Award in 2000 and Cultural Fellowship in 2014. He also served as a Nominated Member of Parliament from 2016 to 2018, representing the arts sector.

#### **Leading Artists**

#### **Adib Kosnan**

Adib is a theatre practitioner, and currently an Associate Artist with Checkpoint Theatre. He acts, writes and directs, and has worked with companies like Teater Kami, Teater Ekamatra, TheatreWorks, The Necessary Stage, Drama Box and Buds Theatre, among others.

He was recently awarded Best Supporting Actor at the *Life Theatre Awards* 2020 for his role in *Angkat* by Nabilah Said and Noor Effendy Ibrahim, and was nominated in this same category for *0600* by Ground-Z0 in 2019. In 2018, his script *28.8* by Teater Kami was nominated for Best Original script.

He is also an arts educator and has mentored youths as part of *Tumpil Yang Tampil*, a theatre mentorship programme by Teater Kami. He has written, facilitated and directed numerous school assembly shows catering to a wide variety of levels from preschool to tertiary institutions. He is especially interested in improvisation and forum theatre as tools for creating awareness and enhancing communication.

#### **Moli Mohter**

Moli is a theatre practitioner whose vast experience spans between being an actor, educator, facilitator, as well as a writer and director.

Recently, she founded Makaia Arts in 2019 to tackle social issues pertinent to the Malay community. She has written, directed and produced memorable works such as *Penantian* in 2013 and *Sembelit Lagi* in 2012. As an actor-facilitator, she was part of forum theatre play – *Trick or Threat* by Drama Box, and through that was given an opportunity to tour to the World Forum Theatre Festival in Austria in 2009.

As an arts educator, she works with Buds Theatre, Teater Kami, and Drama Box to teach children and youth. She has also worked with youths-at-risk in Singapore Girls' Home, Singapore Boys' Home, and the Institute of Technical Education.

# Creative Producer Ngiam Su-Lin, ArtsWok Collaborative

Su-Lin is the co-founder and Executive Director of ArtsWok Collaborative and has been active in the arts scene for close to two decades, specifically in the areas of education, community, creative producing and interdisciplinary collaborations. She has worked with various arts organisations before co-founding ArtsWok in 2013. Su-Lin has produced community theatre and festivals in collaboration with the public and private sectors, worked with numerous schools, social service, community and health organisations to incorporate arts processes and approaches into their programmes, including the development and writing of training toolkits. She has also developed, and facilitates capability development programmes and initiatives on arts-based community development. Su-Lin is also a trained counsellor, and believes that being human and fully alive is to be in life-giving relationships with self, and others, in community.

# Lead Advisor Dr Ad Maulod

Research Fellow, Duke-NUS Medical School, Centre for Ageing Research and Education

Ad Maulod is a cultural anthropologist and Senior Research Fellow at the Centre for Ageing Research and Education, Duke-NUS Medical School, Singapore.

Ad trains and leads a team of qualitative researchers using culture-centred approaches to explore the key determinants of meaningful and healthy ageing in Singapore. Ad's research with older persons across different communities in Singapore examines the centrality of 'placemaking' in the development of age-in-place models in the community, particularly in the integration of care. Through a deeper engagement in these processes, Ad hopes to advance the development of research, policies and care-models that enhance health equity, social inclusion and community empowerment for older persons in Singapore.

### **ArtsWok Collaborative**

The work of ArtsWok Collaborative focuses on arts connecting communities by harnessing the power of the arts to create dialogue, invite social participation and build bridges across difference.
