**Tuesday, May 25th at 5:00PM**, the NAACP will be holding a **George Floyd Memorial** at City Hall in both Santa Maria and Lompoc. I encourage all members and SURJ supporters to show up for this important event. (See flyer at the start of the newsletter).



The next Santa Maria City Council meeting will be held **Tuesday**, **June 01, 2021 at 5:30PM**. You may view the meeting via <u>Live Stream</u> or <u>view this page</u> for additional information. Agendas generally come out the Friday before the meeting.



The Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors will hold **budget hearings on June 8 and 10**. The next general meeting will be on **Tuesday, June 15, 2021, beginning at 9:00AM**. The date has changed for the annual Truth Act Forum. At the discretion of the Sheriff's Department they have rescheduled the Forum to occur on June 22nd. To clarify, the Truth Act Forum is where the Sheriff's Department must publicly disclose how they collaborate with I.C.E. to the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors. **CAUSE will be looking for support** at this important meeting and now you have more time! To make a public comment either:

- Submit written comments by Monday, June 21st at 5pm, to <a href="mailto:sbcob@countyofsb.org">sbcob@countyofsb.org</a>.
- Give public comment at the meeting on **Tuesday June 22** (Time TBA). A link to access an agenda will be provided later.
- Updated talking points will be provided by CAUSE at a later date.



Here are just two actions that SURJ National invites all of us to take part in:

 In partnership with Detention Watch Network (DWN), SURJ is working not only to abolish ICE but to break the cycle of mass incarceration at the border. Learn more <u>here</u> and take action in these ways: Tell your Congressperson to <u>cut funding for ICE</u> <u>and CBP and defund hate</u>, and <u>sign this petition to Congress</u>. Right now, Congress is figuring out how to fund the government, determining how much money different agencies, including ICE and Customs and Border Patrol (CBP), will get for this year. Members of Congress can and should cut funding to ICE and CBP based on their records of abuse and consistent rejection of oversight and accountability, demonstrating time and again that they are beyond reform.

Elections and voting...Think that November is too far away to begin thinking about elections? Recently the SLO Co Board of Supervisors voted to approve a restrictive voting measure, returning to the pre-COVID method of more polling places but only one day of voting. (See SLO Tribune article here). While SB 29 (which requires that each person be mailed a ballot) will still be in effect for the recall election it is worth noting that the Republican members of SLO's board are listening to the falsehoods about voter fraud. It's also worth noting that AB-37 is in the works and would essentially expand SB 29 beyond 2021. For SB County it is more of a budget issue. The Dept. of Elections initially supported the Voters Choice Act. But with the costs of the recall election they are now opting for AB-37 which they see as less expensive but with many of the benefits of the VCA.

## The Good News

- <u>Legislation is signed</u> to address hate crimes targeting Asian Americans.
- Passing <u>police reform legislation</u> by May 25th, the anniversary of George Floyd's death, may not materialize but lawmakers say progress is being made.
- If you were a fan of the educational video game Oregon Trail, it's had a
  redesign. As part of the makeover, Indigenous historians were brought in to
  better and more accurately reflect the names of the Native American
  characters as well as the roles they played in history. Here's a short story to
  explain.
- Patagonia, the company, is not known for its inexpensive products but it
  has and continues to work very hard to do the right thing by investing in
  sustainable practices and products. Here are a couple of stories they have
