Ms. Groves welcomed the Rev. Laura Everett, Executive Director of the Massachusetts Council of Churches, as guest of the Convention.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Ms. Barbara Groves called on Mr. Steven P. Abdow, Diocesan Treasurer and Canon for Mission Resources, for the 2014 Report of Finances of the Administrative Offices of the Diocese. Mr. Abdow informed delegates that the detailed report is available on the Convention website. He also noted that the Journal of the 2014 Convention is available on our website, as well as the 2014 audited financial statements. Canon Abdow reported that net assets at year-end were 31.9 million dollars and revenues were 2.39 million dollars. Fifty-two percent of revenues for the diocese are derived from a 5% draw on invested funds. Forty-six percent of our revenue comes from congregations. Canon Abdow noted that our congregations fulfilled 100% of their assessments. The Bishop and Diocesan Council are very proud and grateful for the consistent support from the congregations of the diocese. Diocesan funds invested with the Trustees have steadily climbed since the 2008 low of 16.8 million. Currently, invested funds total 26.9 million dollars. An anticipated surplus of \$27,000 for the year led to the approval of funding requests that would enhance our ministry; however, expenses were over by \$34,000, netting a deficit of approximately \$4,000.

SPECIAL ORDER – Change the Babies

Ms. Barbara Groves welcomed the Rev. Elizabeth Fisher of St. Thomas' Episcopal Church, Amenia, New York, who reported on the ministry that supports the Mampong Babies Home in Ghana. The Rev. Fisher reported that she requests parishes to make a five-year commitment of \$1500 per parish, noting that the average stay for a baby at the Home is five years. The Rev. Fisher recommends that parishioners throw loose change into a jar, which adds up very quickly. This year \$4,320 has been raised, and seven parishes have made the commitment: Trinity Church, Milford; Grace Church, Amherst; Church of the Atonement, Westfield; Christ Church/Trinity Lutheran, Sheffield; Grace in the Southern Berkshires, Great Barrington; Church of the Reconciliation, Webster; and St. Stephen's Church, Westborough. She reported that 40 parishes are needed to collect their loose change—this can be lifechanging to a child at the Mampong Babies Home.

RECOGNITION OF YOUTH DELEGATION

Bishop Fisher recognized our Youth Delegation, led by the Rev. Hilary Bogert-Winkler, Diocesan Youth Missioner. The youth group participated in a Lock-In at the Cathedral overnight prior to coming to Convention.

SPECIAL ORDER VIDEO - Ascentria Care Alliance

Ascentria, a service organization formerly known as Lutheran Social Services, runs up to 65 programs concurrently throughout all six New England states. Ascentria is based in Worcester. Programs are holistically-based and include literacy, workforce development, and financial literacy, assistance to refugees, elder care, and nursing home programs.

9:00 AM CONVENTION EUCHARIST

In preparation for Convention Eucharist music was provided by the Reverends Carolyn Jones, Charlotte Cooper, Peter Swarr, and Bennett Jones. Holy Eucharist was celebrated in the Grand Ballroom at the Marriott Hotel by the Rt. Rev. Douglas J. Fisher. Bishop Fisher delivered his third Annual Address, which can be found in its entirety in Section 1 of the Journal. During the Prayers of the People, the Annual Necrology was presented on-screen. The United Thank Offering was collected during the Eucharist. The Eucharistic offering was designated for the Ascentria

Refugee Resettlement ministry and the Change the Babies ministry. Following the Eucharist, Bishop Fisher blessed prayers shawls and baby quilts that were presented for a blessing.

Mr. White spoke of the privilege he felt when Bishop Gordon P. Scruton invited him to serve in this position as Missioner. Mr. White thanked the team of Diocesan Staff that has assisted him in this endeavor, including Ms. Cozette Haggerty, Ms. Lainey Hurlbut, Ms. Carol LaPlante and Ms. Vicki Ix. Mr. White also thanked Bishop Fisher for his support of Legacy Stewardship; Mr. Bruce Rockwell for his mentorship; and gave a special thanks to Bishop Scruton for the recognition of Mr. White's talents and gifts in serving as Missioner for Legacy Stewardship.

However, she stated that sometimes we are divided by denomination, race, and geography. The Rev. Everett said that here in Massachusetts, where only 20% of the people attend church regularly, we as Christians are a minority to the larger culture, and that we need one another. We have to change. We must trust that the Gospel is true. The Church is one and eternal. We have to die to be resurrected. The Rev. Everett asked that we remember that God is at work—we need to *see* it. She asked that we notice what is going on in our neighborhoods.

The Rev. Everett also reported that the MCC is working towards equipping congregations to deal with the current opioid epidemic. Workshops on addiction and spirituality will be offered throughout Massachusetts. She thanked the Rev. Janice Ford for her work in the area of addiction, with the start-up of Sober House. The Rev. Everett expressed her eagerness for invitations to speak to our parishes.

HEALTH INSURANCE TASK FORCE

Ms. Barbara Groves welcomes the Rev. Molly Scherm, Christ Church Rochdale, and Ms. Moira Miller, Trinity, Shrewsbury for their report from the Health Insurance Task Force. Ms. Miller reported that the Task Force has been reviewing issues concerning the cost of health insurance and projected increases for 2016. REPORTS OF COMMISSIONS, COMMITTEES, TASK FORCES AND MISSIONERS

Bishop Fisher announced that all written reports of commissions, committees, task forces and missioners that were received prior to Convention are available on the Diocesan website and in Appendix A of this Journal.

SPECIAL ORDER – Commission on Ministry

The Rev. Nancy Baillie Strong, Chair of the Commission on Ministry (COM), reported on the blessing that is her work on the COM. She reported that the Commission recently reviewed Canon 3, which provides that the Commission and the Bishop will furnish all congregations with resources for discernment for all the baptized. The Rev. Strong reported there are many areas of, and directions for ministry to take; therefore, the COM has engaged in their own process of discernment for the past eighteen months. This has resulted in a pilot program called *Loving the Questions*. The major purpose of *Loving the Questions* is to provide opportunities for all the baptized to seek to discern their own individual gifts for ministry. An overview of this pilot program is available on the diocesan website. At present there are two parts to the program: 1) Community Education and Formation meets monthly, and 2) there will be communities of discernment in each corridor. The Rev. Strong reported that the Pilot Program begins in January 2016 and runs through June 2016. Careful evaluation of the program will take place after it has run for six months.

Bishop Fisher thanked the Commission on Ministry for their hard work and redesign of the entire discernment process, with the emphasis on lifting up lay ministry.

<u>SPECIAL ORDER VIDEO – Our Mission to El Salvador</u>

Bishop Fisher introduced Tom and Dianne Wilson, our Missioners to El Salvador, and thanked them for the work they have done there. The Wilsons reported that while in El Salvador they led weekly bible study classes, which were translated into Spanish; assisted in establishing a community well to provide people with clean water on a

daily basis. The Wilsons reported that after serving nearly three years in El Salvador, they learned their lives were in grave danger due to gang activity, and they had to leave abruptly. They noted that the El Salvadorian people have no escape from the threat of violence. The Wilsons thanked the Diocese and all the people who supported their mission work in El Salvador.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PLANNING OF NEXT CONVENTION

The Rev. William Murray, Secretary of Convention, reported that the 115th Diocesan Convention will be held on October 28 and 29, 2016 at the Springfield Marriott.

SPECIAL ORDER VIDEO - Diaper Ministry

The Rev. David Woessner reported on a new ministry, *Marie's Mission*, at St. Michael's-on-the-Heights in Worcester. This ministry provides diapers, and creams and wipes to families in need. The ministry takes place monthly and has expanded to include food, goodies for the children, a reading time, and, in addition, giving books to the children to take home. The Rev. Woessner reported that the ministry is building community—some of those ministered to are coming to Sunday services, and some people from the community are coming just to volunteer in this ministry.

The Lawrence House Service Corps interns reported to Convention that they have developed and provided to Convention a survey card for each parish to assess how welcoming their congregation is to minorities.

Bishop Fisher thanked the Daughters of the King for providing prayer support during this Convention.

The Bishop's Convention Address 2015

Just a few days ago I was at the National Cathedral in Washington DC for the installation of Michael Curry as our new Presiding Bishop. I can't possibly express adequately the enthusiasm that is running through our Church. Michael is the first African-American Presiding Bishop and the first ever to be elected on the first ballot. He is dedicated to social justice AND to growing our church. He says he is now the CEO of the Episcopal Church – the Chief Evangelism Officer. Michael is inviting all of us to join the Jesus Movement – a mission to change this world from the nightmare it is for so many into the Dream God has for it. I'm still on a spiritual high from that liturgy at the National Cathedral so if I start talking too fast, tell me to slow down.

And I have a great love and admiration for our outgoing PB, Katharine Jefferts-Schori whom many of you met three years ago around the corner at the Mass Mutual Center when I was ordained a bishop. I will always remember a sermon Katherine gave at General Convention this summer. She was preaching on the story in Mark's Gospel when Jesus is told a twelve year old girl, the daughter of the synagogue leader, has died. Jesus immediately goes to the bedside of the girl, takes her by the hand and says "Talitha cum" which means "Little girl, get up!" Immediately the girl got up and began to walk.

As Katherine retold the story she reinterpreted "Talitha cum" to have Jesus shout: "Get up girl! You're not dead yet!" Katherine then applied that to the Episcopal Church. "Get up, Church, you're not dead yet!" We have had turmoil within and an increasingly secular society without, but we are not dead yet. Not only are we "not dead", there are signs of abundant life, resurrected life.

Those signs of resurrection are here in WMA and our future is bright IF...Brothers and Sisters, it is a big IF. IF we allow God to be God. The God we believe in, the God we meet in the Old and New Testaments, the God we meet in the person of Jesus, the God we experience in the Holy Spirit, is a God who is constantly creating, constantly imagining and reimagining, constantly moving through death into new life.

It can't get much clearer than the Book of Revelation. "Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth...See, I am making all things new." Here's the good

news. The newness is not just taking place in heaven. It's taking place here...on earth. "See the home of God is among mortals." This is not "fluffy spirituality." It is not abstract. "See the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them and they will be his peoples." And God is on a mission to wipe out all the "deathliness" and suffering of the world. You see, God is agreeing with Michael Curry! The Jesus Movement is on a mission to change the world from the nightmare it is for so many into the Dream God has for it.

Let's break away from Christianity for a moment and go east. I don't know a lot about eastern spirituality directly. Maybe, someday. Most of what I know about it comes from the Roman Catholic monk Thomas Merton and the Franciscan Richard Rohr. Rohr tells us Buddhist wisdom says "Thank God for impermanence. Thank God for constant change because it sets us free. It sets us free from constantly being bound by that which is passing away." Buddhists acknowledge that "pain is inevitable, but suffering lies in clinging to that which has died."

There are some dimensions of our church that are dying. And we suffer when we cling to them. At one time they were new and part of God's plan. But now their mission is over and it is time to pass through death into the newness of resurrected life, into the life of God's endless creativity and imagination.

One of our churches closed this summer. Several others are closing or considering closing. These decisions are made prayerfully and with a willingness to look at reality. I am grateful to our senior staff – Steve, Pam and Rich- and to the leaders of these parishes who are doing the hard work of transition. And I am grateful to the neighboring parishes that are actively welcoming members of these churches into their faith communities and appreciate the gifts they bring. The buildings close but the church continues. The Jesus Movement rolls in a new way.

Let's turn to some glimpses of God's newness among us. One of the highlights of my year was ordaining three new young priests and welcoming a fourth newly ordained from the great state of Idaho. They bring an energy, excitement and a fresh perspective. I remember doing that 35 years ago. And now I want to listen to them because there are certainly some things God is calling us to see that these old eyes are not seeing. To take advantage of their wisdom, and that of several young and dynamic lay people, I am forming the "Young Leaders Council to the Bishop." We will meet from time to time to see how we might be church for the 21st Century which is already 15 per cent over.

And I invite you to do the same. I'm blessed to look out at you- faithful and wise leaders of our churches. I encourage each one of you to seek out young people (under 50) in your parishes and start incorporating them into leadership, which may or may not look like a vestry. And, when they meet resistance, support them. Turn to those who say "we never did it this way before" and with love and kindness and respect convey that we need to let God be God. Let God express imagination and creativity.

There is another expression we need to avoid. And we clergy are often the guiltiest of using it. When someone wants to try something new, we say "oh, we did that before... In 1987... It failed." Maybe it was an idea ahead of its time. Maybe there is a new context. Maybe we aren't hearing the idea correctly.

You see, people like me who remember when President Kennedy was shot, are desperately needed in our churches - more than ever. But one of our big jobs is mentoring. Inviting in the next generations to bring their own special gifts.

Let's bring the gospel to new places. Like laundromats. Do you know about the Laundry Love program? You will learn about them later today. We have at least three of them in WMA.

Let's bring the gospel to new places like our streets. I didn't walk those 175 miles for exercise. I did it to bring the faith out of the church building and into the places where people live and work. And it wasn't me just bringing the faith, I received the faith. I was inspired by so many who are working for Jesus' Mission of Mercy, Compassion and Hope. Later we are going to hear about our urban mission to Worcester. I know many of our parishes have done the 20 minute walk north, south, east and west from their buildings and have reimagined their ministry based on what they found. I might be wrong, but there might be more community outreach going on through our parishes than ever before. You will hear about a few of those parishes in videos later today.

One of the awesome blessings of my walk through the diocese was meeting with community leaders, including police captains and sheriffs at jails. I learned so much. Including staggering facts about the heroin addiction that is crippling New England. Some of you are engaging community leaders in conversations about what churches can do. God bless you. This is Matthew 25 work for today's world. "I was addicted and you cared."

Let's bring the Gospel to new people. Theologian Brian McLaren asks "why do denominations assign leaders to buildings when they should be sending them to populations?" In WMA we are taking that question seriously. We are actively

engaged in ministry with veterans, immigrants, Latino populations, to the addicted and the incarcerated. It does not look like traditional parish ministry but it does look like God's imagination at work.

How about bringing the Gospel to old places with new people? I'm thinking of our college campuses. There are 32 of them in WMA with 130,000 students. Now some outstanding campus ministry is already going on, but not nearly enough. Some of you were around three and a half years ago when I told this story in the "walkabouts" leading up to the election of a new bishop. Or the "Hunger Games" as my kids called them. When our youngest child Gracie was a freshman at Dickinson College in Carlisle, PA her spring break was just two weeks before Holy Week. When I was taking her back to school at the end of the break, she said "dad when will you or mom pick me up for Easter?" I said, "Oh honey, you have classes right through Good Friday and you need to be back in class on Monday morning. You know your parents are both priests. There is no way we can drive 4 ½ hours to Carlisle and pick you up and drive you home on Good Friday and make that nine hour round trip on Easter Sunday after services." She was disappointed but understood. We kept driving and when we stopped at a traffic light in Carlisle, she said "There's the Episcopal Church...Where I will be sitting all by myself on Easter Sunday morning."...We figured out a way to get her home for Easter.

Is there a college campus near you? How are you reaching out to those young people? Remember, most of them – the vast majority of them, unless like Gracie a P.K. (preacher's kid), have been raised with no religious experience at all. They are not looking for a church to go to because they have probably never been in one. "Church? Hmm... I think when I was around ten my cousin got married and I was in this building with candles and windows with paintings in them." But that might be to our advantage. College is all about learning new things, new experiences. It is about rebelling against your parents. What could be more radical, more "out-there" than discovering life in Christ? And I bet that discovering could come through service to the community because young people love to volunteer for worthy causes. We have an opportunity here, beloved of God, if we can tap into God's imagination. Lawrence House is one such example and you will be hearing about that later on.

It is great to be a believer, a Christian, an Episcopalian in 2015 because the imagination and creativity of God has given us social media. The word "gospel" means "good <u>news</u>." John's Gospel tells us "in the beginning was the Word." We are in the communications business and God has given us more tools than ever before. Let's use them! That stroll I took through WMA had 100 times

more impact because Vicki Ix, the best communications director anywhere, got the word out on the website, Facebook, twitter, Instagram and traditional newspaper and TV outlets. I know, I know. I have the luxury of a full time professional communications director to do this work. I invite you to tap into God's imagination to see how you might take advantage of social media to proclaim good news. Someday we will all see Jesus face to face and we might say "Jesus, I know I promised in the Baptismal Covenant to proclaim the Good News in Christ and I'm sorry I did not reach as many people as I hoped. It was so frustrating." And Jesus will say "But I gave you Facebook!"

Here is one last area for God's creativity for this Convention address. I have not covered nearly all of them. That is the all-important area of social justice. I have been inspired by multitudes in this dimension of the Gospel, some famous and by some oh so grassroots. One of the famous ones is the theologian Walter Bruggemann who writes about our Revelation passage: "I saw a new Heaven and a new earth. For the first heaven and the first earth had passed away. The future is not a private, individualistic future. It is a new epoch in the history of the world." Here is a key line for us church folk. "The church knows that the old earth cannot be sustained." That's right. I'll add the old earth that burns fossil fuels without limit cannot be sustained. The old earth that does not allow refugees and immigrants to move away from war torn and gang-infested and impoverished areas of the world cannot be sustained. The old earth where a gun culture in the US is allowed to run wild cannot be sustained. The old earth where one per cent of the population takes in the vast majority of the wealth cannot be sustained. The Church of the New Creation God knows this. The Pope, the Bishop of Rome, knows this and when he said it he was called too political. The Episcopal Bishop of Western Massachusetts knows this and has been called too political. But friends, know this, the anticasino bishop, trying to catch up with the imagination of the God of the prophets and Jesus, is going to double-down on social justice issues. Because I can't honestly say I believe in the God of the Old and New Testaments if I do anything else.

There is a prayer we all say at the Easter Vigil and we say it at ordinations which means I got to pray it four times in the last six months. It speaks to our situation in the church and in the world, and expresses our never-ending hope in the promises of the living God.

"O God of unchangeable power and eternal light: Look favorably on you whole church, that wonderful and sacred mystery; by the effectual working of your providence, carry out in tranquility the plan of salvation; let the whole world

see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to their perfection by him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever."

The Jesus Movement rolls on. Amen.

REPORT OF HEALTHCARE TASK FORCE

2015 DIOCESAN CONVENTION

NOVEMBER 7, 2015

HEALTHCARE COSTS - MARKET FACTORS

- Nationwide, healthcare market is in a state of flux, a major issue facing organizations, families and individuals (ACA, economy, aging populations, etc.)
- Organizations of all kinds are challenged to continue to provide benefits highly valued by employees while managing increasing costs
- According to Massachusetts Division of Insurance, healthcare plan costs will increase average of 6.3 percent in the first quarter of next year.
 - Highest first-quarter increase since 2011
 - Several insurers posting double digit increases
- Cost increases due to several factors: high drug prices, increased use of expensive health care services and the implementation of the federal Affordable Care Act (ACA)
- ACA will have a significant impact on the cost of medical insurance
 - Federal excise tax, (Cadillac Tax), due to take effect in 2018, top ACA cost driver
 - 40% non-deductible tax on high-cost health plans that exceed threshold
 - Threshold is currently \$10,200 for individual coverage, \$27,500 for family coverage

HEALTHCARE COSTS - CHURCH FACTORS

- Churches and insured employees are feeling the pressures from rising healthcare costs that are beyond our control
- 2016 Diocesan health rates increasing 6%
- Cost for basic family plan will be just under \$30,000
- Cost for basic individual plan will be about \$10,000 annually
- Based on current rates and annual increases, Diocesan plans will exceed the ACA threshold in 2018

HEALTHCARE COSTS - CHURCH FACTORS

- 1994 Diocesan Convention approved guidelines for health insurance benefits
 - Each Parish and Mission will provide active, full-time clergy a minimum of 85% of the cost of whichever health insurance plan best suits the needs of the Cleric and his/her family.
- 2009 General Convention of The Episcopal Church passed a resolution creating the Denominational Health Plan
 - Requires parity in health insurance benefits for lay and ordained staff who work a minimum of 1500 hours/year by December 31, 2015
 - Offerings must be provided by The Episcopal Church Medical Trust
- 2014 Resolution at Diocesan Convention proposed to give Diocesan Council the authority to review and revise the 1994 Guidelines (Council can act on behalf of Convention between meetings). Bishop tabled the resolution following discussion
- 2015 Bishop formed task force to review and assess the impact of guidelines/practices and healthcare market forces (e.g. ACA) on healthcare options in order to make recommendations to Bishop and Diocesan Council on next steps

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS

TO THE

114th ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONVENTION

November 7, 2015

The Committee on Constitution and Canons makes the following Report to the 114th Annual Meeting of the Convention of the Diocese.

The current Diocesan Canons, last amended in October, 2012, can be accessed from the Diocesan website at: https://www.diocesewma.org/wp-content/uploads/2013/01/Diocesan-Canons-Amended-thru-10.20.-2012-secure.pdf. Perhaps more simply, they can be found by entering into the box to search the site at, www.diocesewma.org, the words "constitution and canons."

In the electronic "compare" text enclosed as Attachments to this Report, the current Canonical text is shown in regular type, deletions are shown as strikethroughs, and additions are shown by underlining.

I. Amend Article XI.2:

1. Amend Article XI.2 of the Constitution of the Diocese by deleting the first sentence in its entirety, and by substituting therefor the following:

The election of Members of the Standing Committee and of Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the General Convention shall be by ballot and by Orders, provided that if there is no contest for the election to the Standing Committee, the election shall be by Orders, but need not be by ballot.

So that Article XI.2 shall read, in its entirety, as follows:

Section 2: The election of Members of the Standing Committee and of Deputies and Alternate Deputies to the General Convention shall be by ballot and by Orders, provided that if there is no contest for the election to the Standing Committee, the election shall be by Orders, but need not be by ballot. If, after a second ballot, the required numbers have not been elected, the second ballot shall be recounted, with a majority of the two Orders taken together, on this, or any subsequent ballot, sufficient to elect.

Committee Comments:

The first sentence of Article XI.2 now reads, "The election of the Standing Committee and Deputies to the General Convention shall be by ballot and by Orders."

In 1993, Convention modified Article XI.1 of the Constitution, so that a ballot (which must be in writing) was only required for elections for which there was a contest. Article XI.2 has specific provisions relating to the election to the Standing Committee and for General Convention Deputies, which were not affected by the 1993 Amendment. In recent years, there have been occasions when there is no contest for an open Standing Committee seat, but the Convention has been required to have a written ballot. This Amendment applies only when there is no contest for a particular Standing Committee seat, and allows voting by Orders, by a means other than a written ballot.

This proposal to amend the Diocesan Constitution requires the affirmative votes, by Orders, at two (2) successive Diocesan Conventions. If this proposal is accepted at this 114th Convention, the 115th Convention will be asked to approve the change.

Committee Recommendation:

The Committee recommends the adoption of the Amendment.

II. Reorganization of Diocesan Council

1. Amend Canon 8, Of The Council, by deleting it in its entirety, and by substituting therefor the following:

OF THE COUNCIL:

- Section 1 The Council shall represent the Convention between meetings of the Convention. It shall have the necessary authority to speak for the Convention; to authorize appropriate action in carrying out the basic policies established or approved by the Convention; and to ratify, modify or take other action on all matters pertaining to the administration of the Diocese and of all administrative officers, except as otherwise provided for in these Canons.
- Section 2 The Council shall consist of the Bishop, the President of the Standing Committee, the Secretary of the Convention, and the Treasurer of the Diocese, plus one (1) representative appointed by the Trustees for the Diocese, and ten (10) other persons to be elected by the Convention, from the Corridors, as follows:
 - a) Worcester Corridor two (2) Clerics and two (2) Lay Persons;
 - b) Valley Corridor two (2) Clerics and two (2) Lay Persons;
 - c) Berkshire Corridor one (1) Cleric and one (1) Lay Person.
- Section 3 Persons to be elected from the Corridors shall be nominated by a Diocesan Nominating Committee. The Bishop shall annually appoint the Chair of this Committee. The Council shall appoint at

least six (6) additional members, including Lay Persons and Clerics from each Corridor, for staggered three (3) year terms. Any member may be re-appointed for a second consecutive three-year term. The Council shall establish procedures for all Council nominations.

- A Member elected by the Convention shall serve for a term of three (3) years, and any Member shall be eligible for re-election to one (1) additional consecutive three-year term. If elected to two (2) successive three-year terms, no Member shall be eligible for election again until after the lapse of one (1) year.
- As vacancies occur between meetings of the Convention, Council may fill such vacancies from the appropriate Corridor and Order by appointment until the next Convention. Any person so appointed is eligible for election by the Convention to complete the unexpired term and, upon completion of the unexpired term, would be eligible for election to a three-year term and for re-election to a second three-year term.
- Section 6 The Bishop shall be the President. The President of the Standing Committee shall be the Vice-President, and shall preside in the absence of the Bishop. In the absence of both, the Members present shall choose a Presiding Officer.
- Section 7 Except for vacancies on the Standing Committee, the Council shall have authority to fill all vacancies in offices held by election, such appointees to remain in office until the next Annual Convention. Vacancies occurring in offices held by appointment shall be filled by the appointing officer.
- Section 8 The Council may, in its discretion, establish or discontinue such administrative departments, commissions, committees and task forces, as the Council deems appropriate to carry out its responsibilities.
- Section 9 The Bishop shall appoint all paid employees of the Diocese; but no such appointment to an executive staff position shall become effective until confirmed by the Council.
- Section 10 The Council shall meet not less than quarterly each year. Dates of all Council Meetings shall be published in appropriate Diocesan communications on a regular basis. The Council may be called into session by the President, the Vice President, or at the written request of not less than six (6) Members.

- Section 11 Special Meetings may be called by the President, the Vice President or six (6) Members by notice, including the purpose for such meeting, sent to all Members at least forty-eight (48) hours, or by personal delivery or by e-mail at least twenty-four (24) hours, before the meeting, to the address designated by each Member. If such notice is sent by postal mail, it shall be sent at least five (5) days before the meeting.
- Section 12 Members of the Council or any committee of the Council may participate in a meeting of the Council or such committee by conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear such others at the same time, and participation by such means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting.
- Section 13 Six (6) Members shall constitute a quorum.
- Section 14 Whenever a notice, document or other item is required to be "sent" by the Constitution or any Canon or Rule of Order, such may be accomplished by mail, e-mail, telefax, other electronic means, or equivalent services, or by personal delivery, to such address designated by the intended recipient.
- 2. Amend Canon 12, Of The Deaneries, by deleting it in its entirety, and by substituting therefor the following:

Of The Corridors:

- Section 1 There shall be three Corridors within the Diocese of Western Massachusetts. They shall include the congregations of the Diocese located within the following counties and the members of the Clergy actually or canonically resident within the same counties:
 - a) Berkshire Corridor: Berkshire County.
 - b) Valley Corridor: Hampden, Hampshire and Franklin Counties.
 - c) Worcester Corridor: Worcester County.
- Section 2 The Bishop shall designate one or more Clerics in each Corridor as Dean(s), who shall have such duties as the Bishop shall assign, which may include convening the Clergy in the areas assigned to them.

3. Amend Canon 16.15(a), by deleting in the first sentence thereof the word, "Deanery" in the two places it appears, and by substituting therefor the word "Corridor", so that the first sentence of Cannon 16.15(a) shall read:

Notification: If a congregation has not met the Basic Standards for at least ninety days, and if the leaders of the congregation have not initiated the process of Section 14 by notifying the Bishop, other Diocesan leaders, including but not limited to a Dean of the Corridor, key Diocesan staff, and Members of Diocesan Council from the Corridor, may request review of the circumstances and the development of an action plan.

So that Canon 16 shall read, in its entirety, as follows:

Section 15: Of the Renewal of a Congregation – The Process (2006) Initiated by Diocesan Leaders (2015)

(a) Notification: If a congregation has not met the Basic Standards for at least ninety days, and if the leaders of the congregation have not initiated the process of Section 14 by notifying the Bishop, other Diocesan leaders, including but not limited to a Dean of the Corridor, key Diocesan staff, and Members of Diocesan Council from the Corridor, may request review of the circumstances and the development of an action plan. The request shall be made in writing to the Bishop. If the Bishop receives credible information from any other source, the Bishop may initiate this process. Within thirty days of such request, or of the Bishop's initiation of this process, the clergy person in charge, the wardens, and the vestry of the congregation will be notified and will be invited into the process of developing and implementing an action plan towards resolving the inability to meet the Basic Standards. The Bishop shall report such requests to Diocesan Council at its next meeting.

Committee Comments:

These proposals arise out of discussions and Task Force work of Diocesan Council. The Report of the Diocesan Council Task Force on Canonical Changes, dated May 14, 2015, is enclosed as Attachment A.

The substance of the proposal is to replace the seven (7) current Deaneries in geographic areas throughout the Diocese with three (3) Corridors: Berkshire Corridor, Valley Corridor and Worcester Corridor - and to adjust the membership of Diocesan Council from these geographic areas. As outlined in the Task Force Report, the Deanery Chapters, as envisioned when they were established seemingly in the 1950s, have fallen into disuse. Much of the Diocesan program life is organized within the three (3) Corridors. The canonical changes proposed acknowledge that reality. The current provisions of Canons 8, 12 and 16.15(a) are enclosed as Attachment B

to this Report. Attachment C is an electronic comparison of how the proposed changes, if adopted, change the existing Canons.

In outline, the proposal:

- A. Replaces seven (7) Deaneries with three (3) geographic areas designated as Corridors;
- B. Provides a total of five (5) Clerical and five (5) Lay members of Council from among the three (3) Corridors [two (2) of each from the Worcester and Valley Corridors, and one (1) of each from the Berkshire corridors];
- C. Provides for a voting Member of the Council representing the Trustees for the Diocese;
- D. Creates a Nominating Committee for candidates for Council and other offices elected by Convention;
- E. Provides that the Nominating Committee will have Lay and Clerical Representatives from each Corridor; and
- F. Makes a number of minor editorial revisions.

Diocesan Council has endorsed these revisions.

Committee Recommendations:

The Committee recommends the adoption of these proposed Amendments.

III. To Amend Canon 23.2.10, Church Attorney

1. Amend Canon 23.2.10, Church Attorney, by deleting it in its entirety and by substituting therefor the following:

<u>Church Attorney</u>. The Bishop, in consultation with the President of the Board, shall appoint an attorney as Church Attorney to serve for a term of three (3) years or until a successor is appointed, and from time to time may appoint such additional Church Attorneys as are deemed necessary. The person(s) so selected must be duly licensed attorney(s), but need not reside within the Diocese. The Church Attorney(s) may be removed from the position(s) by the Bishop, with the consent of the Vice President of the Diocesan Council, at any time and for any cause deemed sufficient by them, in their sole discretion.

Committee Comments:

This proposal changes the term of the Church Attorney from a single calendar year to "a term of three (3) years or until a successor is elected." An electronic comparison of how the proposed change, if adopted, changes the current Canon 23.2.10 is enclosed as Attachment D. The phrasing of the term would be the same as now applies for the Chancellor, in Canon 6.

Nothing in the Amendment changes the substantive role or accountability of the Church Attorney, or the oversight by the Bishop.

Committee Recommendations:

The Committee recommends the adoption of this proposed Amendment.

IV. To Amend Rule XV of the Convention Rules of Order

1. Amend Rule XV, of the Convention Rules of Order, by deleting Rule XV in its entirety, and by substituting therefor the following:

Rule XV-A Nominations and Ballot.

(2015)

The Secretary shall prepare for the Convention one ballot, in the Australian form (i.e., written ballot including all qualifying candidates and with provisions for secret balloting), containing nominations for such offices as are to be filled by election of the Convention.

All nominations shall be made in writing and signed by the Nominee and by three or more members or members-elect of an approaching Diocesan Convention, at least two (2) of whom are not associated with the Congregation of which the Nominee is a member. All qualifying nominations received by the Secretary of the Convention from the Nominating Committee before 12 noon of the last day of June of the year of the Meeting of the same, shall at once be sent one to each Cleric of the Diocese, and one to each Lay Delegate duly elected to attend the next Meeting of the Convention.

The printed ballot prepared for the Convention shall be made up of all qualifying nominations received by the Secretary of the Convention from the Nominating Committee before 12 noon of the seventh day preceding the meeting of the same.

If nominations from the floor of the Convention for any office are accepted, the names of such Nominees shall be written on the ballot prior to the voting by the Convention.

In the case of an uncontested election, the members of Convention may direct the Secretary to cast one ballot for the candidate.

Rule XV – B Nominating Committee.

(2015)

There shall be a Nominating Committee. The Chair shall be appointed by the Bishop. At least six (6) Members shall be appointed by Diocesan Council, including at least one (1) Lay person and one (1) Cleric from each Corridor. The Nominating Committee shall be subject to such other policies and guidelines as may be established by Diocesan Council from time to time.

The Nominating Committee shall communicate to the Diocese broadly and by various available media the elected positions to be filled by Convention, solicit and encourage identification of eligible, qualified and suitable candidates, and confirm the willingness and eligibility of each Nominee and the appropriate Nominators.

Nominations from the floor for any office must be submitted in writing to the Nominating Committee before the President calls for the Report of the Elections Committee, and must include:

- i. Written nomination signed by at least three (3) Delegates or Alternates entitled to vote at the Convention, at least two (2) of whom are not associated with the Congregation of which the Nominee is a member.
- ii. Written consent of the Nominee.

If the Nominating Committee confirms the qualifications of a Nominee from the floor and the Nominators, it will notify the Secretary, and the name(s) shall be added to the ballot.

Rule XV – C (2015)

Elections Committee.

There shall be an Elections Committee, appointed by the Bishop, to consist of equal numbers of Clerics and Lay Persons, which shall have charge of the elections. The Elections Committee shall report the result of each vote to the President.

All elections, save that of a Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, Suffragan Bishop, Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer, and where otherwise ordered by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, may, upon the recommendation of the Elections Committee or upon vote of the Convention, be determined by a vote of all the members of the Convention present and voting, according to a system of preferential voting,

The Elections Committee shall, with the approval of the Convention, adopt or draw up regulations governing the method of counting votes. Regulations once adopted shall be in force until altered by the Convention.

Committee Comments:

This proposal arose out of the discussions regarding the Nominating Committee referenced in the proposed revision of Canon 8. It organizes Rule XV into three (3) separate sections, A (Nominations and Ballot), B (Nominating Committee), and C (Elections Committee). The proposal does add to all nominations the requirement that two (2) of the Nominators be from Congregations other than that of the Nominee. A compare version of Rule XV, enclosed as

Attachment E, reflects that the provisions relating to the Ballot and the Elections Committee are substantially unchanged, while the provisions relating to the Nominating Committee are new.

If these rule changes are accepted by the Convention, the Committee recommends that they be effective for the 115th Convention in 2016.

Committee Recommendation:

The Committee recommends the adoption of the Amendments to Rule XV.

Updating Our Diocesan Structure

This report explains the reasons for the proposed replacement of Deaneries with Corridors and gives an overview of how it is proposed to accomplish this change.

Our Three Corridors

Our Diocesan organization has always included geographical subdivisions. Initially there were two Convocations, one for the eastern portion of the Diocese, the other for the western portion. These were subsequently divided into three, one for Worcester County, one for the central part of the Diocese and one for Berkshire County.

In the 1950's, these three Convocations were further subdivided into seven Deaneries. Each congregation was to elect representatives to meet periodically with the clergy of the Deanery, convened by a lay President. The responsibilities of these Deanery meetings were generally to help develop and carry out specific programs to support the mission and ministry of the Diocese. More specifically the Deaneries had the responsibility to identify suitably qualified persons (clergy and lay) to serve on Diocesan Council. Additionally, the clergy of each Deanery (the "Clericus") would meet separately as needed for mutual pastoral support, convened by a Dean appointed by the Bishop.

This last area, the meetings of the clergy, has been relatively consistent in most Deaneries. Regional activities, however, have actually occurred most commonly at the level of the former Convocations, now referred to as "Corridors", and the regular Deanery meetings have ceased to happen reliably.

This has left a gap in the recruitment of new members for Diocesan Council and in default of our Diocesan Canons. Therefore consideration has been given by Diocesan Council to changing our Canons (the formal set of rules which govern our Diocesan life) to reflect the reality that Corridors rather than Deaneries are now the primary focus of regional activity. The question of how to ensure that the Council continues to include representative lay and clergy voices from across the Diocese has come to the fore.

Diocesan Council

The Diocese is governed by its Convention. Delegates from each Parish and Mission and the Clergy of the Diocese, chaired by the Bishop, meet to make the major decisions needed to move our mission and ministry forward.

Between meetings of Convention, decisions concerning programs and budget are delegated by Convention to Diocesan Council, which is also chaired by the Bishop.

The majority of the members of Council are laity and clerics elected by the Convention and drawn from the geographical areas of the Diocese as described above. Council also includes the Treasurer of the Diocese and the Secretary of Convention, who are each elected by Convention; and the President of the Standing Committee and a representative from the Trustees of the Diocese.

Present and Proposed Council Membership

Our current Canons provide for each Deanery to nominate one lay person and one cleric from each of the seven Deaneries, who are then elected by Convention. While this process potentially provides 14 members for Council, a *de facto* merger of the Northern and Southern Berkshire Deaneries and one vacancy has reduced the current membership to 11.

Diocesan Council and Standing Committee, meeting together, concluded that ten members would ensure effective geographical diversity and balance, being composed of two lay members and two clerics from the Worcester Corridor, two lay members and two clerics from the Valley Corridor and one lay member and one cleric from the Berkshire Corridor.

Nominating Council Members

Council and Standing Committee recognized that without regular regional meetings (Deanery or Convocation), a robust and transparent process is needed to produce nominees for Council membership to be elected by Convention. A joint task force was established for this purpose.

The resulting proposal provides that the Diocesan Nominating Committee shall include lay and clerical members from all three Corridors, who shall serve rotating three year terms to ensure continuity. The Nominating Committee will advertise, seek and welcome qualified nominees for the various open positions to be elected by Convention. Additional nominations for Council membership and other positions will be permitted at the convention itself (not possible now with Council positions). Nominations from the floor must meet the same basic standards as nominations made in advance.

The specific language proposed for these matters is contained in the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Any person so appointed would be eligible for election by the Convention to complete the unexpired term and, upon completion of the unexpired term, would be eligible for election to a three-year term and for re-election to a second three-year term. Section 6 The Bishop shall be the President, the President of the Standing Committee shall be the Vice-President and shall preside in the absence of the Bishop. In the absence of both, the members present shall choose a Presiding Officer. Section 7 Except for vacancies on the Standing Committee, the Council shall have authority to fill all vacancies in offices held by election, such appointees to remain in office until the next Annual Convention. Vacancies occurring in offices held by appointment shall be filled by the appointing officer.

Within thirty days of such request, or of the Bishop's initiation of this process, the clergy person in charge, the wardens, and the vestry of the congregation will be notified and will be invited into the process of developing and implementing an action plan towards resolving the inability to meet the Basic Standards. The Bishop shall report such requests to Diocesan Council at its next meeting.

Canon 23.2.10

Section 2.10—23.2.10 Church Attorney. Within sixty (60) days following each Annual Convention, the The Bishop, in consultation with the President of the Board, shall appoint an attorney as Church Attorney to serve for the following calendar years term of three (3) years or until a successor is appointed, and from time to time may appoint such Additional Church Attorneys as are deemed necessary. The personsperson(s) so selected must be duly licensed attorneysattorney(s), but need not reside within the Diocese. The Church Attorney(s) may be removed from these positionsthe position(s) by the Bishop, with the consent of the Vice President of the Diocesan Council, at any time and for any cause deemed sufficient by them, in their sole discretion.

EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF WESTERN MASS ELECTION AND NOMINATING PROCEDURES

Rule XV-A Nominations and Ballot.

The Secretary shall prepare for the Convention one ballot, in the Australian (2004)—form (i.e., written ballot including all qualifying candidates and with provisions for secret balloting), containing nominations for such offices as are to be filled by election of the Convention.

All nominations shall be made in writing and signed by the Nominee and by three or more members or members-elect of an approaching Diocesan Convention, at least two (2) of whom are not associated with the Congregation of which the Nominee is a member. All qualifying nominations received by the Secretary of the Convention from the Nominating Committee before 12 noon of the last day of June of the year of the Meeting of the same, shall at once be sent one to each Cleric of the Diocese, and one to each Lay Delegate duly elected to attend the next Meeting of the Convention.

The printed ballot prepared for the Convention shall be made up of all qualifying nominations of eligible persons, made in writing and signed by three or more members or members elect of the approaching Convention, received by the Secretary of the Convention from the Nominating Committee before 12 noon of the seventh day preceding the meeting of the same. Those making a nomination for an elective office, shall have the consent of the person nominated, and shall so signify when sending that name to the Secretary.

If nominations from the floor of the Convention for any office are accepted, the names of such <u>nominees Nominees</u> shall be written on the ballot prior to the voting by the Convention.

In the case of an uncontested election, the members of Convention may direct the Secretary to cast one ballot for the candidate.

Rule XV – B Nominating Committee.

(2015) There shall be a Nominating Committee. The Chair shall be appointed by the Bishop. At least six (6) Members shall be appointed by Diocesan Council, including at least one (1) Lay person and one (1) Cleric from each Corridor. The Nominating Committee shall be subject to such other

policies and guidelines as may be established by Diocesan Council from time to time.

The Nominating Committee shall communicate to the Diocese broadly and by various available media the elected positions to be filled by Convention, solicit and encourage identification of eligible, qualified and suitable candidates, and confirm the willingness and eligibility of each Nominee and the appropriate Nominators.

Nominations from the floor for any office must be submitted in writing to the Nominating Committee before the President calls for the Report of the Elections Committee, and must include:

- Written nomination signed by at least three (3) Delegates or
 Alternates entitled to vote at the Convention, at least two
 (2) of whom are not associated with the Congregation of which the Nominee is a member.
- ii. Written consent of the Nominee.

If the Nominating Committee confirms the qualifications of a Nominee from the floor and the Nominators, it will notify the Secretary, and the name(s) shall be added to the ballot.

Rule XV - C Elections Committee.

(2015) Th

There shall be an Election Committee, appointed by the Bishop, to consist of equal numbers of Clerics and Lay Persons, which shall have charge of the elections. The Election Committee shall report the result of each vote to the President.

In the case of an uncontested election, the members of Convention may direct the Secretary to cast one ballot for the candidate.

All elections, save that of a Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, Suffragan Bishop, Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer, and where otherwise ordered by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, may, upon the recommendation of the Election Elections Committee or upon vote of the Convention, be determined by a vote of all the members of the Convention present and voting, according to a system of preferential voting,

The Elections Committee shall, with the approval of the Convention, adopt or draw up regulations governing the method of counting votes. Regulations once adopted shall be in force until altered by the Convention.

Committee on Constitution and Canons

114th Annual Meeting of the Convention November 7, 2015

To resolve an ambiguity relating to Clergy who reside and serve in different Corridors in the Diocese, the Committee's recommendation regarding Canon 8.2 is revised to read:

[Canon 8 Of The Council]

- Section 2 The Council shall consist of the Bishop, the President of the Standing Committee, the Secretary of the Convention, and the Treasurer of the Diocese, plus one (1) representative appointed by the Trustees for the Diocese, and ten (10) other persons to be elected by the Convention, from the Lay and canonically resident Clergy who are members of or serving in the Corridors, as follows:
 - a) Worcester Corridor two (2) Clerics and two (2) Lay Persons;
 - b) Valley Corridor two (2) Clerics and two (2) Lay Persons;
 - c) Berkshire Corridor one (1) Cleric and one (1) Lay Person.

Changes in the Canon 8.2 recommendations are highlighted.

- **III.** To amend Canon 23.2.10, Church Attorney, as recommended in Section III of the Report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons dated August 17, 2015.
- **IV.** To amend Rule XV of the Convention Rules of Order as recommended in Section IV of the Report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons dated August 17, 2015 to be effective on and after the adjournment of this 114th Convention of the Diocese.

Standing Committee Report, November 2014 – September 2015

All actions were unanimous unless otherwise noted. Minutes are on file at the Diocesan Office.

November 22, 2014: We met at the end of a joint retreat of the Diocesan Council and Standing Committee at the Barbara Harris Center. Steve Abdow reported on a request from St. Thomas (Auburn) on the use of proceeds from the sale of property earlier this year. We elected the Rev. Catherine Munz President and Nancy Lowry Secretary.

January 15, 2015: We held a brief meeting following a joint session of the combined Diocesan Council/Standing Committee. We signed a certificate concerning the loan to St. Barnabas and All Saints and we signed a certificate of the de-consecration of St. Mary's Church, Palmer.

March 18, 2015: We held a meeting following a joint session of the combined Diocesan Council/Standing Committee. Standing Committee discussion topics and actions:

- The Rev. David Hall and former senior warden David Lindstrom described and answered questions concerning new directions at St. Thomas, Auburn, and we supported the request that part of the proceeds from the property sale be made available to St. Thomas to fund a proposed mission project.
- Steve Abdow provided an update on the sale of property by St. Mark's, Leominster, and he briefed us on an easement for St. John's, Williamstown
- We tabled a request to approve the Rev. Peter Eaton as Bishop-Elect of Southeast Florida pending receipt of further information.
- We recommended that Sarah Dunn and José Reyes be ordained to the priesthood, and that David Woessner be ordained to the priesthood pending receipt of further information.
- We agreed to review the process by which candidates for ordination are presented to the Standing Committee and the documentation we would want to receive in order to better inform our votes.

May 28, 2015: We held a meeting following a joint session of the combined Diocesan Council/Standing Committee. We passed a motion regarding the Chapel of all Saints in Leominster to rescind the vote of the Standing Committee regarding the sale of the property at 1469 Main Street, Leominster, Massachusetts, taken on May 1, 2014; to approve the request of Episcopal Missions of Western Massachusetts (EMWM) to sell the property at 1469 Main Street, Leominster, Massachusetts, formerly known as the Chapel of All Saints, to the Seventh Day Adventist Reform Movement Eastern U.S. Field for a gross sale price of not less than \$376,000, on or before November 1, 2015; and to authorize any duly elected officer of the Standing Committee, acting alone, to execute such Authorizations or Certificates as may be required to evidence this vote.

This motion passed while Council and EMWM were present; the vote was 5–2.

Council and EMWM left, and Standing Committee continued in session:

- Steve Abdow updated us on the easement for St. John's, Williamstown, and the possible marketing of a church property in Palmer.
- Richard Mahaffy, a postulant for the priesthood, joined us with his interpreter, Lucy O'Connell for discussion.
- Cat Munz will be on sabbatical September 21 December 14, 2015. Derrick Fetz will be the acting president from September 21 until October 6 (including the September meeting), and Nancy Webb Stroud will be the acting president October 6 until December 14 (including the November meeting).
- We accepted Jane Beebe as a candidate for Holy Orders. The vote was 6 in favor with 1 abstention.

September 24, 2015: We held a meeting following a joint session of the combined Diocesan Council/Standing Committee. We did not have a quorum for this meeting. The main topic of discussion was the meeting time of the Diocesan Council and Standing Committee with overlap time between meetings.

There were five majority votes consenting to the election of bishops.

Report on the 78th General Convention

It was a very busy 10 days. For those of us assigned to a committee our days started at 7:00 with committee hearings and writing resolutions, and often our evenings ended at 9:00 p.m. with committee hearings. Yes, there were some evenings where we had time to go out to dinner and enjoy each other's company and have some laughs and act silly. And yes, Salt Lake City at the end of June early July is very hot. The average daily temperature was over 100 degrees.

One of the most exciting parts of General Convention is the daily worship. Worshiping with more than 1,000 Episcopalians is amazing. The music and the liturgy and the various languages spoken around the world by our fellow Episcopalians was for me incredibly uplifting.

Of course one of the many highlights was the election of our new Presiding Bishop Michael Curry. It is often been said since his election that we are in for a ride over the next nine years. If you have not heard Bishop Curry preach, I urge you to search on line and listen to his sermons.

One other major piece of legislation to be passed was the marriage cannon. The debate was respectful; all sides were listened to with respect. When the vote was announced there was no cheering or celebrating – the celebrating was done after session closed for the day.

There was also the celebration of 75 years of Episcopal Relief and Development. We learned that "ERD" is rated by Consumer Reports as one of the TWO top international charities.

Another anniversary that we celebrated was the 125th anniversary of UTO. Our diocese was a grant recipient which was presented at the ECW session. Barbara Kalber proudly accepted the award.

We voted to reduce the level of apportionment from dioceses to the National Church over the next three years to 18%; 16.5%; and finally 15%. The feeling is this there will be more funds available to do God's work on a local level.

In order for a piece of legislation to go into effect it must be passed in both the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops. If it fails in one house it does not pass. There are times when a piece legislation does not go to the floor for a vote because it does not come out of committee (just like congress). If you are interested all of the details about legislation can be found on the General Convention website.

Narrative Report on the 2014 Year-End Income Statement

Total **Revenues** for the year were over budget by just \$2000 on a budget of \$2.4 million. No surprises there.

Expenses with the **Wider Church** were right on target.

- We spent \$12,000 on Veterans Ministry instead of the budgeted \$10,000
- Our expenditures to Province One were almost \$3000 less than budget offsetting the overage.

Mission with Congregations came in \$13,000 over budget on a total budget of \$485,000.

- We overspent by \$5000 in the area of Hispanic ministries
- We overspent by \$10,000 in Christian Formation. At the beginning of the year we did not expect to have anyone on the payroll for Christian Formation and the addition of a quarter time missioner explains that difference.
- Congregational development grants came in \$11,000 under budget because some of the grants were returned when projects did not materialize.
- The expense line titled Special Assistance to Congregations came in \$10,000 over budget. This was money that was spent to subsidize bill coins salary as he helped the Church of the Good Shepherd in West Springfield find a way forward after the death of their rector.

Leadership Development and Clergy Support expenses were \$30,000 less than the budget of \$385,000.

- Deployment (transition ministry) came in \$12,000 less than what was budgeted because the Canons to the Ordinary took over that responsibility from the consultant early in the year.
- We had budgeted money for racism awareness training that was not spent resulting in \$7600 lower than expected expense for Strategic Leadership Development
- Retiree Benefits were mistakenly budgeted \$9500 higher than actual.
- Those are the significant variances which account for most of the difference from budget.

Episcopal Oversight expenses for the year were \$30,000 above a budget of \$480,000

- Diocesan Convention expenses were \$4000 less than budgeted because we had originally planned to have a two-day convention
- We showed expenses of \$14,500 to pay for work on the diocesan archives. This was \$5000 more than what was budgeted. All of that expense is personnel related. The costs for the lay personnel under Leadership Development and Clergy Support however were under by \$5000 offsetting that difference. The expense is for the same staff member in both of those sections of the budget.

- Communications expenses were \$4500 higher than expected. Our program of communications is much more robust than we had expected when writing this budget and those costs are well justified.
- We had an expense for the Bishop's Corridor Walk of \$4000 that had not been included in the 2014 budget
- Cost for the overseas House of Bishop's meeting were not anticipated and exceeded the budget by \$15,000

Administration and Finance Expenses were \$2000 under a budget of \$440,000

- Personnel Expenses in this area of the budget were \$14,000 less than expected. This was because of unexpected and extensive medical leave for a staff member in the department. The person was able to receive short-term disability benefits.
- Legal expenses for the year came in \$23,000 higher than the \$45,000 budget. Our agreement is for typical Diocesan legal expenses to be covered under an agreed upon fee of \$3300 per month plus expenses amounting to around \$40,000. In 2014 the Diocese had additional expenses of \$16,000 related to a claim from the 1970s and \$10,000 for extra work on two complicated situations the Standing Committee was involved in for work with Christ Church Fitchburg. Note: in 2014 we incurred additional \$16,000 in legal expenses that were paid out of EMWM for expenses related to real estate transactions and church closings.
- We saved \$5000 on our copier lease by a renewing the lease instead of replacing the copiers.

Diocesan Agency expenses were \$10,000 over a budgeted for hundred and \$64,000

• We incurred \$10,000 more in personnel related expenses in this area of the budget then expected as staff hours were increased to cover the schedule as a result of the medical leave previously mentioned.

For the year we showed a surplus of \$8000 against a budgeted surplus of \$27,000. While the variance represents only .8% of the total budget it is a greater variance then is desired. However, since we were expecting a surplus already we were less hesitant to say no to funding requests which would enhance our ministry even though we knew it would erode our projected surplus.

May 2015 Revision to the 2014 year end Income Statement

At the March 22 meeting I reported that we showed a surplus of \$7,929 for the year against a budgeted surplus of \$27,033. The report was made prematurely. Our accounting manager had been behind on the year end work because of medical leave at the end of the year, and the year-end work is always more involved than regular month end work, and we discovered some discrepancies. An additional \$12,358 in expense was discovered. Two items which represent 90% of the total were incurred in December. One was \$6,000 in medical insurance expense for Jenny Gregg which was not posted to the account correctly, and the other was for a payment for consulting services and expenses to the Episcopal Church Building Fund of \$5,000. That, too, had not been posted correctly when the statements I presented in March were run.

The result is that we ran a deficit of \$4.729. I am concerned about the variance from budget for 2014 and will take extra steps this year to keep everyone informed on our financial performance compared to budget and work to minimize the variance. I am hoping that as the new leadership team finds a groove we will be able to anticipate financial needs in the upcoming year and budget more accurately. To that end I will begin the 2016 budget process more vigorously before the end of Q2.

2015 Building Bridges Diocesan Convention Report

The Building Bridges Veterans Project is currently experiencing a dramatic expansion as it seeks to serve homeless and homed veterans throughout the Diocese of Western Massachusetts. In response to the staggering statistics – one in four homeless Americans is a veteran, and more than twice the number of Viet Nam veterans who died in battle have committed suicide – Bishop Fisher called for a mission specifically dedicated to this highly at-risk population. Comprised of local communities founded to respond to the social needs of our too often isolated veterans, "Building Bridges" is currently operating two communities in Northampton (numbering between fifty and seventy-five participants), one just launched in Springfield, with plans to launch new communities in West Springfield and Greenfield in the near future. In the three current locations, conversation and veterans-related programming occur over lunch, while a veterans group dedicated to women takes place in the mid-afternoon with tea, conversation and yoga. In the Worcester area, The Reverend Janice Ford of the Church of the Reconciliation, Webster, is hosting regular large-scale dinner presentations focused on addressing veteran issues.

In addition to this growing network of communities in the Diocese, "Building Bridges" has held weekly art classes at the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Leeds, and recently hosted a Columbus Day weekend art exhibit featuring the work of Veteran artists. In collaboration with "Soldier On" in Pittsfield, preparatory work is being done to create a regular veterans artist group with the goal of similar art exhibits.

I once asked a leader of the Veterans nonprofit organization, "Soldier On," what he thought the church could do for Veterans that no other organization could do. He replied that one critical unmet need uniquely suited to local churches is "building bridges" in the communities where veterans reside. The potential danger in any such ministry is the re-isolation of the very people it is seeking to engage. As a longstanding part of many western Massachusetts communities, Diocesan parishes have the capacity to utilize their networks to aid in healing a too often isolated Veterans population.

To help equip parishes to learn about Veterans issues, and perhaps to launch a Veterans initiative themselves, my Assistant, Alison Brauner, has developed a three-part curriculum designed to teach about relevant Veterans issues. To be used in the context of a coffee hour discussion or an adult education program, the "Building Bridges" curriculum is comprised of three presentations: "The Tragedy and Healing of Moral Injury"; "Beyond the Polarizing Politics of War"; and "Homeward Bound," which addresses how parish communities can aid in breaking the cycles of poverty and isolation so rampantly experienced by veterans of war.

Report by the Rev. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas, Missioner for Creation Care Diocesan Convention, November 2015

"Environmentalists have taken this as far as we can. Now it's up to people to faith to push for what needs to be done."

So said Dr. Brent Blackwelder, President Emeritus of Friends of the Earth and a faithful Episcopalian, when I ran into him on a sunny morning in September. Along with tens of thousands of other people, we were on the National Mall to amplify the message of Pope Francis as he spoke to a joint session of Congress about the urgent need to work for a just and sustainable future.

This may sound overly dramatic, but it's not: we live in a planetary emergency. In order to pass along a livable planet to our children, we need the vision and passion of people of faith – people who can see the long view, not just short-term quarterly reports; people who care about the homeless, hungry, and poor, not just about elites; people who understand that the web of life is a gift to be protected, not a commodity to be exploited and destroyed; people who place their hope not in the promise of success but in the faithfulness of God.

I began serving as Missioner for Creation Care in January 2014. I give thanks for the many people who are working with me to re-weave our broken society and to mend our sorely wounded natural world.

Some highlights of the past year:

• I traveled twice to Washington, D.C. In June I lobbied conservative Christian Republicans about the moral call to put a fair price on carbon, on behalf of Citizens Climate Lobby and its 100 Faith Leaders Action Team.

In September, during the Week of Moral Action for Climate Justice (also deemed "Pope Week"), I gave the opening prayer at the annual Prayer Breakfast organized by National Religious Coalition on Creation Care (NRCCC), and announced the completion of letters to President Obama and to members of Congress. With members of NRCCC, I met at the U.S. State Department with Karen Florini, Deputy Special Envoy on Climate Change, to push for stronger climate action in advance of the Paris climate summit, and also with the legal counsel of Senate Majority Leader, Mitch McConnell. I met with staff and members of Blessed Tomorrow, a faith-based initiative by ecoAmerica to expand communication on climate (and we watched through the window – cell phones clicking away – as Pope Francis entered St. Matthew's Cathedral across the street). As Yom Kippur concluded, I offered prayer at a Multi-faith Prayer Vigil near the National Mall, and the next day headed to the lawn outside the Capitol Building to watch on big screens as the Pope addressed Congress.

- Along with other members of Episcopalians for Fossil Fuel Divestment & Clean Energy Reinvestment, I traveled twice to New York City to advocate for fossil fuel divestment by the Episcopal Church. In April I met with staff of the Church Pension Fund and in June with staff of Episcopal Church Foundation. I rejoiced when the Church, with the encouragement of this diocese, decided at General Convention to divest from fossil fuels. However, the Church's decision excludes the Pension Fund, and in any case will need to be tracked, since the resolution did not include a mandate to report back on progress.
- I continue to update my Website, RevivingCreation.org, with blog posts, sermons, articles, multimedia, and more. Some of this year's blog posts were picked up by other groups, such as Episcopal Café, Citizens Climate Lobby, Harvard Heat Week, and *Fellowship* magazine.
- I provided two sermons for the Episcopal Church's "30 Days of Action" on climate change, and an article for Vestry Papers on "Beauty and Advocacy," which was based on our diocese's celebration of Creation Season last year.
- I preached at Trinity Church, Ware; St. Stephen's, Pittsfield; St. John's, Northampton; St. John's, Sutton; St. Paul's (Fairfield, CT); St. Michael's-on-the-Heights, Worcester; and Grace Church, Great

Barrington. I also led adult education forums on Christianity and climate change.

- Our diocesan network for Creation care has more than doubled in the past year, growing from 60 to 147 individuals, and we opened our Facebook page, Creation Care, to the public. Alongside the Rev. Mac Murray, DeAnne Riddle, and Meg Schoenemann, I co-led a workshop, "Planet Earth, Our Island Home: There is No Plan B" for Parish Leadership Day last March.
- I continue to serve on the Board of Better Future Project, which is developing the grassroots climate movement in Massachusetts. (To join the climate movement, search for '350 Mass. for a Better Future.' In the Pioneer Valley, visit 'Climate Action NOW in Western Mass.')
- I gave talks and led retreats about climate change in a variety of settings. I led a 3-day retreat for Unitarian Universalist clergy on "Cultivating a Hopeful Heart in an Age of Climate Crisis," and, with Rabbi Katy Allen, co-led an interfaith retreat on "Cultivating Faith and Hope in an Age of Climate Crisis," sponsored by Massachusetts Interfaith Power & Light. I spoke to students at Harvard Extension School for a class entitled "World Religions Face the Climate Crisis," and to students at UMass Amherst for a seminar on "Spiritual Perspectives on Environmental Sustainability." I spoke at the Cambridge Climate Summit, offered by the South Asian Center of Cambridge and St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Cambridge, and I was a panelist at the Harvard Divinity School conference, "Spiritual and Sustainable: Religion Responds to Climate Change," where I also led a workshop on spiritual resilience. At a panel for an event in Amherst, "Could we make a carbon fee and rebate work in Massachusetts?" I offered a spiritual and ethical perspective. I led a workshop for Trinity United Methodist Church, Springfield, and gave a talk at a retirement community in Amherst.

By the time of Convention 2015, I will have co-led with Rev. Dr. Jim Antal an ecumenical workshop for preachers, "Prophetic leadership in the face of climate change," held in Concord, NH, and led a workshop on spiritual resilience in an age of climate crisis. I will have spoken at "Answering the Call: An Interfaith Gathering for Climate Action," held at Temple Beth Elohim, Wellesley. I will have spoken at a class for Western New England University, "Global Warming," and given a public lecture to support the school's divestment movement. And perhaps I will have seen many of our clergy at "Gospel Hope and the Climate Crisis: A Workshop for Preachers," held at St. Andrew's Church, Framingham.

- Over the past year I helped to organize a #LightForLima prayer vigil in Ashfield for U.N. climate talks in Lima, spoke at a Northampton City Council hearing and attended a public hearing in Greenfield to oppose Kinder-Morgan's proposed new gas pipeline, and participated in anti-KXL pipeline rallies.
- As a member of the steering committee of the Springfield Climate Justice Coalition, I helped to plan strategy and events to implement a climate action plan for the city, including this year's Earth Day Walk and Rally for Climate Justice in Springfield. I am grateful to our bishop for speaking at the climate justice rally that was held outside Springfield's City Hall on the same day that the Pope addressed Congress.

By the time you read this, our diocese will have launched this year's season of Creation Care, *A New Awakening*. Along with ecumenical friends, we are asking faith leaders and congregations across New England to preach, pray, and advocate about climate change from October 4 (Feast of St. Francis) to the end of Epiphany. For details, visit our diocesan Web page for Creation Care. For an extensive list of resources, visit climatewitness.org, and, if you're a preacher, please register to preach about climate change at least once this season!

Although I have been involved in the religious climate movement for many years, I've never seen it become as vibrant and powerful as it is today. I hope that you will add your voice, and that of your congregation, to the hard and holy struggle to preserve our common home.

LEGACY STEWARDSHIP 2015 Report to Convention November 7, 2015

OVERVIEW:

One of our primary objectives is to tell the story of the value of making Legacy Gifts for the individual, for the family and for parishes and for the Diocese. What is unusual in our Diocese compared to others is that even though I am the Bishop's missioner, my focus has been on supporting legacy giving to parishes and not focused on giving to the Diocese. To date we now we have 261 members in our Diocese who have made legacy gifts of which some 95% of the gifts are designated to parishes. We also know there are many more legacy givers with whom we are not aware or whom we are aware of but who choose not to be part of the Bishops' Legacy Fellowship.

Our approach continues to be one of general education and sharing stories of legacy giving, not one of personal one-on-one solicitation. We send out one diocesan mailing from the Bishop yearly asking people to consider making gifts. We are present at most all-Diocesan wide events either providing resources and or giving talks.

We are committed in supporting parishes in creating their own Legacy Fellowships modeled after the Diocesan Bishops' Legacy Fellowship. To date we have 11 parishes with Legacy Fellowships-and these parishes, not surprisingly, are the ones with the most active legacy giving today.

We tell the story of legacy giving in many ways; continue to contact Rectors and stewardship chairs; continue to send out our occasional one page e-Stewardship Newsletter. And we host The Bishops' Legacy Fellowship Annual Appreciation Concert and Dinner each spring averaging 60 in attendance.

PERSONAL:

After 13 years of being the Missioner for Legacy Stewardship, I have decided to step down. I will always be very grateful for having had this opportunity to serve the diocese and the parishes as your Missioner. In 2002 when Bishop Scruton asked me to serve as Missioner, I was surprised and overwhelmed by the task of setting up a new program for the Diocese. With much team support and careful planning we were off and running with a new legacy giving program within the year.

Bruce Rockwell has been my mentor and the one who deserves so much credit for the success of this program. I thank him profusely. I thank Bishop Fisher for his enthusiastic support. There are so many others to thank as well who have been part of the Legacy Stewardship team: Cozette Haggerty, Lainey Hurlbut, Carol LaPlante, Vicki Ix, Mick Kalber and Steve Abdow-and especially, so many clergy who have led the way in making their own legacy gifts and in encouraging legacy giving in their churches.

What began as just another volunteer job became a call to serve God and a spiritual journey. I have grown spiritually in ways I could not have imagined. I will always be grateful to Bishop Scruton for seeing within me a call I could not have seen in myself. I am deeply grateful for his invitation and support.

Report to Convention Missioner for Servant Leadership The Rev. Jennifer Gregg

As Jesus and the disciples moved from place to place they became accessible to a much larger community. And throughout their travels people sought them out: the young and the old, the sick and the lonely. One of these individuals was a woman who had been hemorrhaging for 12 years. For 12 years she had been an outcast, for 12 years she had been alone. She hears of Jesus' arrival and thinks, "If only I touch his cloak, I will be made well...". As Stephen Bouman articulates in his book *The Mission Table*, it is in this incredible act of courage that this faith-filled woman puts herself on the line, by violating every law. In her decision, lay the hope that if she could just touch Jesus cloak she might be made well. An opportunity provided only because Jesus and his disciples had simply made themselves "touchable."

Do we risk everything to let others "touch" the hem of Christ's body in our local settings, if so, how? If not, what prevents us from doing so and how do we let ourselves become more vulnerable for the sake of God's mission?

The work that I continue to embark on in the Berkshires and around the diocese is driven by a desire to make the church more accessible or as in the case of the hemorrhaging woman "more touchable." This work comes in three forms: Cathedral in the Night –Pittsfield, Servant Leadership Classes and Berkshire Interfaith Organizing (BIO).

Cathedral in the Night:

In September, Cathedral in the Night – Pittsfield marked its one year anniversary. Since beginning a year ago, we have had 17 congregations participate, a small group from the Berkshire Medical Center and a local high school group. This simple service which features a simplified liturgy of the word and an Agape Meal is held on the front lawn of St. Joseph's Catholic Church on North Street. It has provided a venue for Roman Catholics and Protestants to come together to share in ministry together, a precedent not seen within recent history. Highlights of the past year have included:

- A downtown Easter celebration. During the Easter season, downtown churches and local Pittsfield residents came together to celebrate Easter. Over 200 people gathered for worship and the barbeque that followed. This service continues the ongoing collaboration that has begun to take place with Pittsfield around Holy Week and Ash Wednesday services.
- Conversations started within Pittsfield about what it might mean to be a "Bridges Out of Poverty" Community.
- Leadership Team and trainings for CITN-Pittsfield began to take shape.
- Relationships have been fostered between the mental health community and congregations leading to a Spiritual Support Group that has met weekly for the last year.
- Ongoing 1-on-1's with local community members and participants of Cathedral to build relationships.

Servant Leadership:

- This fall we have begun a class on Barbara Brown Taylor's book Learning to Walk in the Dark.
- A curriculum on the multi-layers of poverty is in the process of being formed to be used with congregations.
- Two workshops on bullying were offered for Junior and Senior High Youth. The workshops featured keynote speaker: Kevin Dowd. Youth from across Berkshire County were invited to join.
- Launched an ecumenical youth group composed of six congregations with a growing reach to the larger community.

Berkshire Interfaith Organizing:

Berkshire Interfaith Organizing has had a monumental year. In January 2015, the organization was founded with 15 member organizations and 5 regional sponsors including the Diocese of Western Massachusetts. Our year's work has continued to focus on two issues affecting the region: Food Insecurity and Transportation. The strides we have been able to make toward systemic change in these areas will also help those struggling with these issues throughout Massachusetts. Highlights of the year are as follows:

Food Insecurity:

In the spring of this year, a state wide campaign was launched to get MEFAP (Massachusetts Emergency Food Assistance Program) raised from \$15 million to \$20 million. This funding increase supports the four Food Banks across Massachusetts, including our Food Bank of Western Massachusetts, which allows for the purchase and delivery of nutritious, free food to food

pantries in our area. Parishes throughout the diocese and the state were invited to call their state legislators to encourage them to vote for this increase. Through the help of many inside and outside the Berkshire region we were able to increase funding by \$2 million dollars (\$15Million to \$17Million). To all those that helped throughout the diocese, thank you!! In September, 30 members of BIO traveled to the statehouse in Boston for Hunger Action Day. During our time at the statehouse *Take Another Look*, a photographic exhibit by local artist Nicholas DeCandia, was displayed featuring images of South Congregational's food pantry and meal program. Using photographs and statistics, the exhibit served to educate senators and representatives from across the state about the nature of hunger in the Berkshires. BIO members met with Senator Ben Downing and other local representatives to thank them for their work to increase MEFAP and to continue to work on funding the Mass Food Trust which would provide grants, low-interest loans and creative financing options for food-related enterprises in the Commonwealth. This would provide jobs and access to healthier food options for residents.

Transportation:

In the weeks leading up to our March 30 follow-up Action with our five state legislators, congregations across the Berkshires collected over 1,000 single sheet petitions in support of BCAC's adoption of Berkshire Rides, in an effort to expand it countywide. To that end, our legislators were able to get an earmark for Berkshire Rides/BCAC (Berkshire Community Action Council) in the state budget. Currently, the amount stands at \$400,000 which while it is not enough to increase services to the southern Berkshires, a feasibility study will be conducted.

In the summer of 2015, BIO launched a "Ride the Bus" campaign to educate local residents and members of congregations about the many challenges that come with negotiating our current system with daily schedules. The other goal of this campaign was to talk with bus riders about their experiences and to learn about what would improve their experience of rural public transportation.

REPORT OF THE STEWARDSHIP MISSIONER

The lay ministry of the stewardship missioner continues to involve assisting parishes in forming generous, faithful, thankful stewards. While assisting congregations in developing financial commitment programs that will encourage generous and faithful responses is part of this ministry, it is only part of it. The increased dollars that will flow to the parish through the offering plate are merely the by-product of stewardship formation. The end product is people who realize that their lives as baptized Christians, as faithful children of God, are about using all the gifts God has entrusted to them to do the work God seeks them to do.

The ministry of stewardship formation requires the discerning work of parish stewardship ministry teams that meet regularly throughout the year to pray and engage scripture together while they seek ways in which they can form stewards in the congregation. My prayer continues to be that each and every congregation will have a year-round stewardship ministry team. I believe this is the most effective way to form loving, thankful, generous stewards throughout the church.

Our diocesan membership in The Episcopal Network for Stewardship [TENS] continues to provide parishes with excellent stewardship resources. It is my hope that your congregation made use of the *God the Giver* materials this fall as part of your stewardship financial commitment program. And be sure to go to the TENS website throughout the year to find other helpful stewardship formation ideas and resources.

Many of you joined me at the ecumenical stewardship conference in April where Michael Curry, our new Presiding Bishop, was a keynote speaker. The conference was sponsored by the Northeast Ecumenical Stewardship Council, a group that I have been honored to serve as Convener. The conference was an opportunity to hear inspirational speakers and to learn how others are working to develop generous stewards in congregations not only in Episcopal churches but also in UCC, Lutheran, and United Methodist congregations throughout New England.

One of the great joys of my lay ministry has been to work with John White, who has served so creatively and faithfully as our Missioner for Legacy Stewardship for the past thirteen years. It has been an honor to work with John. He has done such good work. Under his leadership and guidance more than 260 people have indicated they have made legacy gifts to support the work of the church. Eleven congregations have legacy stewardship programs that would not be in existence, were it not for John's gentle but persistent leadership. I give great thanks for John's lay ministry.

I look forward to continue working with the people and congregations of this diocese in 2016 as we continue to form generous, faithful, thankful stewards of all of God's creation.

Report to Diocesan Convention 2015

The Rev. Meredyth Wessman Ward, Urban Missioner

In June of 2014, we received a grant from the Episcopal Church for urban ministry. That money was matched by the Diocese, in part from the remaining assets of the former St. John's Church in Worcester. Those assets had been designated for mission work in the city of Worcester, and I am deeply grateful for that legacy gift to our Diocese.

While we received the grant in 2014, my work as Urban Missioner started on January 1st, 2015. For the past ten months I have been engaging in a ministry of presence in the Main South neighborhood, making connections with people and organizations in the community.

One of the gifts and challenges of this year has been working without a building. I work from my car, in neighborhood coffee shops, on my dining room table, and beside park benches. I spend a good part of each week walking in the neighborhood, talking to people and offering both material support and prayer. I delight in good weather, and work around bad weather.

Obviously, winter was a challenge. Even if I was willing to be out in February, other people were not. As I was looking for places to connect with people, I began hanging out in laundromats—they are warm, open to the public, and young families use them regularly. I discovered that the white noise of washers and dryers made relatively private conversations possible, even though it was public space. I helped fold clothes, played with children, talked about life, and realized how expensive laundry can be. Commercial washers range in cost from \$2.50 for a small load to up to \$8.25 for a triple load. Dryers cost \$.25 for six minutes, and nothing much will dry in that length of time! For a family on public assistance or working a minimum wage, the \$20 or so it costs each week is a huge portion of their disposable income.

In consultation with my board, and with the help of several Worcester area churches, we began offering free laundry once a month at one of the local laundromats. The program is part of the Laundry Love network. We bring detergent, dryer sheets, activities for kids, pizza, juice and LOTS of quarters with us each month. Volunteers from seven area churches have been involved, as well as students from Holy Cross College. Still more local churches donate supplies and quarters each month.

The most important thing about our Laundry Love nights is not the free laundry, although that is certainly a big deal for those who come. The most important thing is the community that forms, and continues from month to month. We laugh together, we share stories, we eat together, and, at the end of the evening, we pray together. By the end of the night there is no "us" and "them" or "church people" and "customers." We are

one group of people, sharing stories and laughter and food and joy. Christ Church, Rochdale is collecting funds for Laundry Love

I also collaborate with churches in the neighborhood, working to create a network of services for people in need. I meet with social service agencies, community non profit groups and other people of goodwill. Next month, I will be part of a community conversation on restorative justice, bringing together police, state representatives, people who have been incarcerated and school officials to talk about alternatives to incarceration.

One of the foci of my work is people in recovery from addiction. I spend time with 12 Step groups, and offer help and support to those in recovery programs and detox. One of the gaps in services which I've discovered is a lack of 12 Step meetings which provide childcare. For parents of young children, this is a significant barrier to recovery work.

Through the help of one of our board members, we have located an empty storefront on Main Street in Worcester. Through a grant from the Health Foundation, the storefront will be renovated this fall, and we hope to be able to open this winter. The storefront will allow us to offer 12 Step meetings (with childcare!), parenting classes, children's events, and space for community meetings.

Report to Convention Diocesan Youth Missioner The Rev. Hilary Bogert-Winkler

I was recently organizing my desk in preparation for the new school year, when I came across a thank-you note from one of the youth of our diocese who attended Winterlight (a winter break youth event held at Kanuga in North Carolina) this past year. She wrote, "I especially got a lot out of the theme Lost and Found. It brought me closer to God in many ways as well as helping me to find myself." This is the primary aim of youth ministry—to help our young people encounter Christ, bringing them together and learning about the Christian faith with them, and then equipping them to go forth into the world to bring that love of Jesus to everyone around them. It is with these aims in mind that I have worked to build a youth program for our diocese.

Over the past year, I have served as the Interim Christian Formation Missioner for the diocese and, as of August 1, transitioned into my new role as Diocesan Youth Missioner, serving quarter-time in both of these positions. The highlights of this year have been:

- -Organizing and leading a trip for thirteen youth and three adults to Winterlight 39 at Kanuga Camp and Conference Center in Hendersonville, NC over winter break. I also served as a staff member at this event.
- -Leading a workshop on alternative ways of thinking about Sunday School at parish leadership day.
- -Holding our first diocesan "Adults Who Worth With Youth" day at the Cathedral.
- -Working to help spread the news about summer camp opportunities at the Barbara Harris Camp in Greenfield, NH.
- -Serving as a guest chaplain at Barbara Harris Camp for two weeks this summer with the EDGE adventure campers.
- -Going with three youth and the bishop to the Freedom Ride pilgrimage sponsored by the Diocese of North Carolina.

In my new role as Youth Missioner, I am able to turn all of my attention to the youth ministry aspect of Christian Formation and will mainly be focusing on our efforts to build a diocesan youth program. In the coming year I hope to form a diocesan youth council, once again take a group of youth from the diocese to Winterlight at Kanuga (and hopefully bring some other youth from Province I), and have a weekend retreat for young people in grades 6-12 in the spring. I will also be working to further our relationship with the Barbara C. Harris Camp, and with youth programs in other diocese in Province I.

This is an incredibly exciting time to be a part of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts, and I am so thankful to Bishop Fisher and the people of this diocese for allowing me to be a part of it. We have wonderful youth here, and I am so excited to see what the Holy Spirit is up to among them!

Report of the Bement/Waterfield Educational Grants Committee

Because of the generosity of Mary Bement and William Waterfield, Jr., we are able to award Educational Grants to our college bound scholars for the school year 2015-2016. This year we awarded \$37,000 in grants to 36 applicants. The awards are based on three criterion. 1. The Christian life of the applicant and the potential for their developing in personal growth, church and community. How do they see themselves developing in their faith and the place of faith in their life? 2. How does their education reflect the faith God has given them? 3. The extent of financial need.

When the applications are received at the Diocesan Office, then each Committee member received a packet of a certain number of the applicants. The members reviewed the applications and set up interviews. The Committee then met once in May to review the applicants and grant the awards. In October the Committee met for their annual policy meeting.

Jean Ryan and I are grateful for the support and encouragement that the Committee has given us this year.

REPORT ON ECUMENICAL AND INTERRELIGIOUS WORK

Our time is one of tremendous opportunities for ecumenical and interreligious work as well as a time which presents very serious ecumenical and interreligious challenges. The ecumenical movements begun in the twentieth century continue to grow as conversations and dialogues gradually evolve into actions. Joint initiatives, shared ministries, and common visions for mission are no longer novelties. The progress to fulfill Jesus' prayer that "All might be One" is sometimes slow and, at times, even marked by backslides, but progress continues. In this diocese, the ecumenical activities and joint efforts between Episcopal parishes and congregations of other denominations and spiritual communities are too numerous to list but what is quite clear is that the Diocese of Western Massachusetts is committed to living out the baptismal promise "to seek and serve Christ in all person, loving our neighbors as ourselves". This can be seen in a wide range of work from the continued life of conjoined parishes like Christ Episcopal/Trinity Lutheran in Sheffield, the sharing of clergy like Epiphany Wilbraham and Christ the King Lutheran who share the pastoral leadership of the Rev. Nathaniel Anderson and who increasingly share worship and parish activities, and the sharing of ministries and mission like the Latino ministry initiative in Holyoke. Yet, some thirteen years after Lutherans and Episcopalians joined together in full Communion with the "Called to Common Mission" agreement, we are still learning about one another's history, traditions, beliefs, and liturgies. As we move closer to the Fiver Hundredth Commemoration of the Reformation in 2017, plans are underway for a wide range of worship, study, and mission activities to bring our churches into greater unity. Canon Richard Simpson and I are honored to have been asked to be a part of the Reformation Commemoration Planning Committee for New England.

One of the main avenues for ecumenical work and witness continues to be our participation in the Massachusetts Council of Churches. For more than one hundred years, the network of seventeen denominations, parishes, and individuals has operated under the conviction that what unites us is far greater than that which separates us. Our Diocese is a longstanding member and a consistent participant in the many and various activities of the Council. Canon for Mission Resources, Steve Abdow, serves as the Council's Treasurer and I serve as our Diocesan Representative.

The growing religious diversity of our region as well as our nation presents tremendous opportunities for interreligious work. While the Episcopal Church and many of our parishes have had longstanding relationships with the Jewish Community, it has only been (largely) since the 1990's that we have begun to have conversation and to establish relationships with Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu and other religious communities. On the national level of the Church, a statement and study guide entitled "Towards our Mutual Flourishing" on interreligious relations was [resented in its final form at this past summer's Genera; Convention. In the 1990's, the Massachusetts Council of Churches developed dialogues with Jewish and Muslim Communities (as well as several Christian groups that would not accept formal membership with the Council). Reflecting on his walking pilgrimage of the Diocese, Bishop Fisher spoke of his experience of walking with Imam Wissam Abdul Baki of the Islamic Society of Western New England in West Springfield as well as a joint prayer service at Congregation Ahavath Sholom in Great Barrington in his interview with Anne-Gerard Flynn of the Springfield Republican, August 13, 2015. And many parishes, clergy, and individuals of the Diocese have been, and continue to be involved in interreligious activities, discussions, and studies. Yet, in spite of the many

ecumenical and interreligious commitments and activities at all levels of our nation, Commonwealth, and communities, there are some very serious challenges.

The terrorist attack on our nation on 9/11/2001, the continued threats to our security, war in Iraq and Afghanistan that has lasted over a decade, serious violence and chaos in the Middle East, and threats from organizations like ISIS have heightened suspicion and discrimination against Muslims. Anti Jewish and Anti-Semitic incidents continue to occur in communities throughout our state. And all too often, we discover that there are serious barriers between us and fellow Christians. Unfortunately, a lot of us do not know our own Church teachings and beliefs. We do not really know what our fellow Christians believe, even those with whom we are supposed to be in full Communion. Even the most educated among us still tend to be woefully ignorant of what other religions teach and believe. All too often, we confuse politics with belief and customs with threats. And the result of combining ignorance and suspicion with fear is hate/ Add to this the secularism of our culture and the growing push to remove any and all religion from any conversation in our society and one begins to see how delicate, difficult, and even desperate the work of ecumenism and interreligious conversation is in our time.

Our Church, internationally, nationally, and at the diocesan level remains committed to ecumenical and interreligious work. Such work begins with study and learning. Our National Church website provides many resources and materials for individual and group studies. We are blessed with many wonderful institutions of learning in our region, many that have scholars with great knowledge about religion and various religions. Increasing numbers of our communities have Jewish, Muslim, Hindu, and Buddhist communities (among others) most of which many of us have found are welcoming and quite eager to share what they believe and how they worship. Simple and casual contacts with these neighbors can go a long way to dispel the false generalizations and offensive caricatures we sometimes see on television and at the movies. But the place to begin and ecumenical and interreligious effort is not with a book or the web or a phone call but with a reflection upon and recommitment to our baptismal covenant:

-to continue in the Apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread and in the prayers;

-to persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever we fall into sin to repent and return to the Lord;

- -to proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ;
- -to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- -to strive for justice and peace among all people, and to respect the dignity of every human being.

Board of Examining Chaplains

The Board of Examining Chaplains (BEC) works in partnership with the Commission on Ministry (COM), specifically, to ensure that the academic/intellectual requirements and competencies required for ordination in the Episcopal Church as specified in the Canons. The work of the BEC involves working with those in the formation process for ordination both advising and tracking their academic progress. Along the process, the BEC offers its certification to the COM, Standing Committee, and Bishop that a person has met the academic criteria to become a candidate for ordination. The Episcopal Church administers the General Ordination Examination each January to those men and women nominated by their Bishops, who have or who are nearing completion of their academic studies. These examinations, composed by the General Board of Examining Chaplains, a group of clergy and lay people elected by the General Convention, are designed to allow candidates for ordination to demonstrate their competencies in the areas of: Holy Scripture, History of the Christian Church, Christian Theology, Christian Ethics and Moral Theology, Christian worship according to the Book of Common Prayer, the Hymnal and additional Texts authorized for use by the Episcopal Church, and the Practice of Ministry in Contemporary Society. This past year, the BEC certified that The Rev Sarah Dunn, The Rev Jose Reyes, and the Rev David Woessner had met the standards for academic/intellectual formation as specified by the Episcopal Church as preparation for ordination to the priesthood.

Report from the Hispanic, Latino missioner – 9/23/2015

We have continued the work of developing Hispanic and Latino ministries in the Diocese, despite that I am no longer the official Hispanic/Latino missioner because of my new duties at the Cathedral. We have formed a Hispanic/Latino ministries network to help provide encouragement, education and support for churches ready to begin a more active ministry with their Hispanic/Latino neighbors. Participants attended a training in Austin, Texas this summer to learn more about working with English-speaking Latinos. Janet Zimmerman, Mac Murray, Jose Reyes as well as a handful of lay leaders from the Cathedral attended the conference. The placement of Jose Reyes in Worcester is a major step forward and will make a difference in the Worcester corridor. In the Central corridor we received a UTO grant to help fund a position of a missioner in the city of Holyoke and have been working with the ECLA to find a priest or pastor who can work in conjunction with St. Paul's, and do outreach and make connections with the large Hispanic/Latino community there. We have also continued working in the Southern Berkshires.

If you are interested in starting a ministry or even curious about what you might do, or you are finding yourself called to work among the Latino community, I encourage you to contact me and consider participating in the network of Hispanic/Latino ministries. One thing we learned this year was that this is not a ministry about language, since most Latinos speak English, and it is not a ministry about immigrants, since most Latinos are born in the United States, and it is not a ministry about offering services to the poor, since most Latinos earn roughly the same as most whites or African Americans. It is a ministry about preparing your congregation to reach out and develop your capacity to evangelize and do something new. Please join us.

LITURGY COMMISSION REPORT FOR 2015 DIOCESAN CONVENTION

Bishop Fisher appointed members of the Diocesan Liturgy Commission at the end of 2013, and the Liturgy Commission began its work in earnest at the beginning of 2014. Members were (and are) the Rev. Meredyth Ward (*co-chair*), the Rev. Jesse Abell (*co-chair*), the Rev. Dr. Will Bergmann, the Rev. Cricket Cooper, the Rev. Nancy Webb Stroud, the Rev. Derrick Fetz, and Ms. Kris Layton. Our diocesan staff support person is the Rev. Canon Pamela Mott.

Over the course of 2015, we have worked on a few key projects:

- EUCHARISTIC VISITOR TRAINING: The Rev. Nancy Webb Stroud coordinated with the Commission on Ministry and the diocesan deacons to work on a revision of the diocesan Eucharistic Visitor training program that prepares lay ministers for taking Holy Communion from congregations to those who are ill or homebound. The revision of the training has been completed, and the plan is to soon offer this training by corridor and to schedule it so as to coincide with Safe Church Training events around the diocese. Ideally, new Eucharistic Visitors could attend the morning Safe Church training and then stick around after lunch for Eucharistic Visitor training.
- 2. **DIOCESAN PREACHING FESTIVAL:** The Liturgy Commission sponsored our first ever Diocesan Preaching Festival on Saturday, September 26. It was organized by the Rev. Jesse Abell, the Rev. Dr. Will Bergmann, and the Rev. Greg Lisby and was hosted at All Saints Church in Worcester. All Lay Preachers and aspiring Lay Preachers were requested to attend as part of their continuing education for this important ministry of Word, and all clergy were invited to attend. Over 40 people registered and attended the event. They gathered for communal prayer and heard talented preachers from our own diocese, and they attended workshops that were designed to enhance their preaching skills. We plan for this event to continue each year.
- 3. LAY PREACHER TRAINING: The Rev. Jesse Abell and the Rev. Dr. Will Bergmann have collaborated to develop a thorough training program to prepare aspiring Lay Preachers in the Diocese. The program lasts roughly 12 months and involves monthly meetings for the cohort of candidates for homiletical training, group biblical study, and preaching practice. Candidates are nominated by their clergy person for the program, although all clergy and candidates are warned that participation in (and completion of) the program does not guarantee a license for this ministry. The program will be one of discernment, and if preaching does not seem like the best match for a candidate the program facilitators will work with him/her and his/her clergy and the Commission on Ministry to find a better suited lay ministry. The program launched in late spring of 2015 with seven candidates. They worked on some homework individually over the summer months and began their first group meetings as part of the Diocesan Preaching Festival.

In the year ahead, the Liturgy Commission has some other projects in mind: reviving a Lay Worship Leader training program, organizing an event for youth acolytes around the diocese to convene, and helping with the planning and execution of diocesan liturgies.

Social Justice Commission

Following Jesus' call to discipleship and seeking to live into our baptismal promises, the Social Justice Commission of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts strives, with our congregations, to create new ways to heal injustice, challenge violence, pursue peace, and care for creation.

Created by Bishop Fisher in the fall of 2013 with ten members, the Commission formally adopted the above mission statement in February 2014. Over time, we have added two additional members, one of whom provides a link to the Lutheran Church. Members who have served during 2015 are listed below.

Over these two years, we have led workshops for Wardens and Vestry/Leadership Days, Companions of the Holy Cross, and a diocesan Baptismal Ministry Day, and started an informal network of people working for social justice in their parishes, including a Facebook group. In January 2015, we supported partner sites in all three corridors of the diocese for the Trinity Institute "Creating Common Good" conference. We have supported advocacy efforts, particularly around casinos and creation care, working with organizations like the Springfield Climate Justice Coalition and Mass Power Forward, and sponsored the resolution passed at last year's diocesan convention to reduce fossil fuel holdings and reinvest in clean energy.

The Commission has produced two position papers. The first, "Not Only with Our Lips, But in Our Lives" (June 2014), encouraged conversations about engaging in the struggle for economic, environmental and social justice, discussing the importance and appropriate limits of Christian political engagement. The second, "Welcoming the Stranger" (September 2015) is about the timely issue of immigration. We commend both documents for congregational study.

Our current focus is anti-racism. We are participating in a multifaceted Province-wide effort organized by the Cultural Competency and Multicultural Awareness task force that includes facilitator training, web conversations, tours of culturally-significant sites, and sponsoring partner sites for this coming January's Trinity Institute, "Listen for a Change: Sacred Conversations for Racial Justice."

Episcopal Church Women

2015 was a triennial year! Barbara Kalber represented the women of the diocese at the weeklong Triennial Meeting held in conjunction with the General Convention in Salt Lake City, Utah. Barbara also presented the UTO offering at the General Convention Eucharist.

Barbara reflected on her time as a delegate to 48th Triennial Meeting of ECW; some of the highlights were:

- Daily Eucharist and an evening Integrity Eucharist worshiping with thousands of other Episcopalians.
- The opening celebration, to "stir up the spirt" where Presiding Bishop, The Most Rev. Katherine Jefferts Schori, presented all of us with specially designed crosses.
- Plenary sessions with prayers and mediation led by The Rev. Mary Sheridan Janda and music by pianist Matt Lemmler.
- The Keynote Speaker, The Rev. Canon Jan Naylor Cope, Provost of the National Cathedral. Her topic was welcoming millennials into the church. She showed a video entitled "What if we marketed our churches like Starbucks markets their stores?"
- Breakfast with guest speaker, author, The Rev. Lindsay Hardin Freeman. She spoke about her book, "Bible Women: All their words and why they matter."
- A particular highlight was hearing Presiding Bishop-Elect, Michael Curry speak at the UTO dinner. He reminded us that Jesus asked us to "GO!"; get out there and do God's work.
- Saturday's triennial plenary session was sponsored by the Social Justice Committee; three individuals representing organizations ECW is supporting spoke. They included Rachel Lloyd, founder and CEO of

Girls Education and Mentoring Services (GEMS) who spoke about Human Trafficking.

- Sunday was a busy day. ECW had a 5K walk/run to raise funds for causes in the Salt Lake City area, the Walk Against Gun Violence sponsored by many of the Bishops (including Bishop Fisher) took place, and there was a UTO Ingathering and Eucharist attended by approximately 4,000 individuals.
- Workshops were held over a three day period; Barbara attended five workshops:
 - Crowd Funding-raising funds using social media.
 - Savoring Life's Turning Points/Journaling- encouraged journaling to help deal with the emotions raised during transitional periods in our lives.
 - Mind, Body and Tea, given by Rev. Becca Stevens who founded Thistle Farm in Nashville, TN-While sharing Moringa Madres Tea from Mexico, that Thistle Farms distributes, learning about the work done by Thistle Farm to turn around the lives of those who have lived on the street.
 - Chair Yoga with a Christian Twist- how an Eastern practice can be part of Christian discipline.
 - God and Garden- the topic was herbs referred to in the bible, and how to grow and use them.
- The Providence I ECW met over breakfast; they will meet this Fall on Oct. 17th in Brookline, Massachusetts and will feature a speaker on Human Trafficking.
- Share Fair was held on Monday and Barbara brought back a few ideas including knitting 8" squares for blankets for Syrian refuges and ongoing costume jewelry sale to raise funds to support mission.

In conclusion Barbara said, "Over the seven days of ECW Triennial Meeting I met many women from around the county who are engaged in activities to support their congregations and communities. It was an opportunity for me, after 30 years of participation in ECW efforts at the local level, to learn from others and broaden my view of what ECW does beyond my own church and diocese. For this opportunity, I am very grateful."

On behalf of Bishop Fisher and Diocesan Council I am honored to present the proposed budget for 2016. I will be in each of the three corridors in the Diocese (Berkshires, Pioneer Valley, and Worcester) before convention at scheduled meetings to present the budget to you in person. At that time we will review the plan to fund our ministry in more detail than is possible on the floor of Convention when the budget will be moved for acceptance.

The Bishop and his Canons have identified the following goals for the Episcopacy at this time:

- Developing transformational lay and clergy leadership
- Empowering clergy through supportive/networking groups
- Encouraging partnerships between congregations
- Engaging congregations in self-assessment processes
- Commitment to Social Justice issues (moving from idea to ministry to movement)

Our goal is to present a budget that is aligned with our mission. Slightly more than half of the budget is for payroll and personnel related expenses. The work of the bishop's office is relational and highly dependent on personnel, and we feel that this ratio is appropriate to accomplish the mission.

Revenues supporting our Common Ministry:

We are blessed in this diocese with 100% fulfillment by our congregations of their Support of our Common Ministry, and with substantial invested funds wisely managed by the Trustees for the Diocese. As the financial markets have been consistently up for the past six years, our projected revenues for 2016 are \$2.54 million. This is compared to projected revenues of \$2.28 million in 2013.

As I write this memo the financial markets have been down and volatile. A "correction" has been long overdue according to forecasters. What this means for us is that it is likely that projected revenue in subsequent years will be lower.

Expenses directly supporting our Common Ministry and the Ministry Plan:

Our Mission in the World:

Our mission in the wider church and world has increased 21% (\$86,000) over last year. As our revenues have gone up so has our apportionment to The Episcopal Church which is calculated at 15% of our income and amounts to \$320,000. Additionally we are funding creation care ministry and veteran's ministry (Building Bridges) in accordance with our goal of commitment to social justice. Approximately half of the creation care and veteran's ministry budget will be funded from a contribution from the Bishop's Discretionary account.

We continue to fund our member's ministry around the globe, Millennium Development Goals, ecumenical relations, and reserves for General Convention at the same levels as in the past.

Our Mission with Congregations:

In 2016 we are proposing a change in the grants that go directly to congregations. While maintaining funding for these grants at \$90,000 we will be targeting Ministry Development programs in congregations geared to reaching people we are not currently serving. The grants are not dependent on co-investment and will vary between two and \$10,000. There is also money earmarked for website development.

In the Christian Formation Ministry budget we have maintained generous funding for programs at \$85,000 and will have a quarter time Youth Missioner on staff as well as a halftime Spiritual Formation Missioner. The Spiritual Formation Missioner will be funded through the Fanning the Flames initiative.

We have eliminated the Hispanic Ministry missioner position from the diocesan budget but have added a full-time Hispanic missioner in Worcester which is funded through the bishops Fanning the Flames initiative. Additionally, there is a startup Hispanic Ministry that will take place in Holyoke (Missio de Gracia) in partnership with the Lutheran Synod funded through a grant from UTO and co-investment from the Synod. Resources for the annual Hispanic ministry retreat will come out of Christian Formation budget.

In 2015 we had set aside money to assist congregations in severe distress. We have eliminated that funding and will use money from the assets of closed churches as needed to pay for a pastoral presence in those churches.

We have increased the budget for our annual parish leadership day, and scholarships to undergraduates and seminarians.

The total budget for our Mission with Congregations in 2016 is lower by 4.2% (\$23,547.)

Leadership Development and Clergy Support:

We are increasing the budget for Commission on Ministry, scholarships for seminarians, Continuing Education grants, and Clergy Conferences in accordance with our goal of enhancing leadership in the diocese. Our work with parishes in transition and \$110,000 in retiree lay and clergy benefits are also part of this category of the budget.

Overall this portion of the budget is up 3% (\$11,170) over what it was in 2015.

Mission and Ministry of the Bishop:

The budget for Episcopal oversight includes the expenses related to governance including the cost of our Convention, Diocesan communications, stewardship development, special projects like grant writing, white papers and the development of ministry with veterans, diocesan archives, and other business of the bishop.

The communications budget has increased the most with greater allocations for the missioner's salary and business expenses, and for further development of our website and social media platforms.

The budget in this area is up \$12,000 (2.3 %.)

Administration and Finance and Agency Functions Provided to Congregations:

The administration and finance section includes the cost to rent the office, accounting and legal fees, office equipment and supplies, telephone, computer, internet, etc. The Agency Function of the bishop's office provides full payroll services, complete benefits administration, and oversight of the property and casualty insurance program for the congregations and programs of the diocese.

The combined impact of these two areas in the budget is an increase of \$10,000 (1.5 %.)

Wages and Benefits expenses that appears throughout the budget:


- The budget proposed for 2016 includes increased wages of ~3%. The Human Resource committee of the diocese will meet after this memo goes out and will make a specific recommendation. Raises will be based on merit, as determined by a standard performance review process, and approved by the bishop with input from the executive staff.
- Health insurance premiums are forecasted to be 5% higher in 2015.
- Personnel expenses are distributed through the different areas of the budget based on an evaluation of how staff time is spent.

Fanning the Flames: An Investment in our Future

We are all aware of the challenges the Diocese faces regarding membership and financial pressure. As you can imagine, this is a frequent topic of discussion for the Bishop's staff and the Diocesan Council.

Here are some thoughts on the situation recently expressed by Bishop Fisher:

"In the two and a half years that I have had the blessing of experiencing the Church in Western Massachusetts I have seen God at work in many ways and in many places. I rejoice in that. At the same time, I am aware of the raw statistical data that tells us our membership has been in decline for many years. Sadly those numbers will only get worse, as so many of our members are elderly, without well thought out and resourced strategies.

A number that goes up, due to the savvy management of our trustees and the gift of a strong investment environment, is our endowment. It is now over 27 million dollars.

Put those two realities together and I get this picture of the day I hand over the leadership to the next bishop in ten or so years: "I have good news for you and bad news. First, the bad news: I inherited church of 16,000 members from the previous bishop (who inherited 22,000 members) and I'm leaving you with a lot less. Here is the good news: the endowment is stronger than ever."

In response, the Diocesan Council has approved the additional expenditure of \$1,000,000 over the next four years. Monies would come from the assets of closed churches and from additional withdrawals of our unrestricted invested funds. The purpose is to make strategic investments in ministry which will yield tangible results.

This money would NOT be used to prop up unsustainable congregations or to cover diocesan overhead. It will be used exclusively to invest in ministry to fan the flames of places where the Holy Spirit seems to be already at work. Jesus tells us very clearly that the Spirit blows where it will. We need to catch that Spirit and ride it into abundant life.

In 2015 funding will be provided for our largest congregations in Pittsfield and Worcester to create programming and outreach in their greater regions. The goal is to have those churches serve as "magnets" for the surrounding churches. The smaller churches around

them could share in the mission and ministry of the large church, breaking out and sharing in the vibrancy. Possible activities are youth groups, alternative services, and outreach to people in need.

We will dedicate funds for the development of Hispanic Ministry in the Worcester area, the second largest city in New England.

We plan to use a portion of the funds towards formation of adult Christians in our diocese by hiring a lay missioner on a part time basis to focus on that work.

We will create a new, Hispanic worship community in Holyoke. This will be done in partnership with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the first of its kind.

The Bishop's Choir School is being formed, led by the Cathedral's Choirmaster and Music Director. David is developing a regional choir school for children from all over.

Commentators have been discussing the decline of the "mainline" denominations for years. We believe passionately that the Episcopal Church has profound blessings to offer in God's world. We can be a source of hope and transformation. We will use the resources we have been given to enliven this mission.
