We are thrilled to present the impact report of the Scholars Taiwan programme, outlining the dynamic partnership between AccessEd and National Chung Cheng University (CCU) throughout the 2022-23 academic year.

In 2022, AccessEd embarked on an innovative journey, collaborating with Philippe to explore the educational landscape in Taiwan. This groundbreaking endeavour marks AccessEd's first non-English university access programme.

The selection of CCU as our strategic partner was intentional, driven by its location in Chiayi County, where educational disparities disproportionately affect marginalised students.

One PhD researcher was selected, trained, and empowered to develop a course delivered to 11 Year 10 – 11 students.

AccessEd's first non-English university access programme has left a positive imprint on its beneficiaries. This is evidenced by impact data, which shows that the PhD tutor, pupils, and high school were satisfied with the programme.

Anticipation is high as we set our sights on scaling the programme for the 2023-24 academic year. We aspire to place 10 PhD researchers from diverse disciplines across 3 high schools, increasing our reach and impact.

With this pilot programme as a bedrock, we are excited to delve into the future, leveraging our learnings and insights. We hope you enjoy reading the Scholars Taiwan impact report.


We are scaling up a university access solution that grew from the UK education system.

## **Programme Journey**



The Scholars Taiwan Programme is designed to give pupils an authentic university experience. From being taught by PhD tutors to studying research-oriented style programmes and visiting a university campus, the Scholars Taiwan Programme aims to raise academic aspirations and break down barriers to university.

#### **Final Assignment**

The in-school tutorials culminated in pupils completing a challenging university-style assignment, which their PhD tutor marked. Students presented their final assignment to the Scholars Taiwan team and university professors during the graduation event, which was held at the CCU campus.



### **Tutor Recruitment & Training**



In January 2023, Scholars Taiwan launched the recruitment process targeting PhD researchers at CCU to design and deliver the pilot programme with us. Below is the recruitment poster in Mandarin.



**5 PhD researchers** applied for the programme. Following a rigorous interview process, **1 PhD researcher** was selected.





The PhD researcher underwent an 8-hour tutor training workshop to ensure he knew the Taiwanese education system, pedagogical principles, safeguarding principles and in-class scenarios.


## Research Inspired Learning

Chun-Hsien Lin, a PhD candidate in History at CCU, designed a course titled, Why We Need Examinations? The Impacts of Imperial Examination System from Song Dynasty, alongside the Scholars Taiwan team.



"It is a unique experience delivering the Scholars Taiwan pilot programme. Students in Taiwan rarely explore specific topics in-depth due to competing demands associated with their various subjects. Throughout the course of the Scholars Taiwan programme, I adopted project-oriented teaching. In class, students discussed specific topics in-depth with reference to stories and scenarios. Thereafter, students completed their final assignments based on the content I taught and the literature that interested them. It was a great success. I found many inspired works in their final assignments. The Scholars Taiwan programme affords students the opportunity to practice independent thinking."
