

Follow in His Steps

A compelling verse from 1 Peter 2:21 tells us that the call of Jesus on our life means we are to "follow in his steps."

Jesus covered a lot of ground. Someone has estimated, based on the gospel accounts, that he walked at least 3,000 miles in his three years of earthly ministry. Jesus' focus was primarily on his home region of Galilee and trips to Jerusalem, the religious and political center of Israel. But the Bible describes numerous times when Jesus crossed boundaries.

One of those times is recorded in Mark 5:1-20. Jesus visits the country of the Gerasenes, in the Decapolis. This region, literally "the ten cities," all but one east of the Jordan River, functioned autonomously under Roman protection. For many years before that it had been a center of Greek influence. Religious practice featured an amalgam of Greek, Roman, and Semitic gods. To devout Jewish people it was a place of bewildering and disturbing paganism.

There was a wretched man who lived in the mountains among the tombs. He was not in his right mind. His life was marked by loud outbursts of frenzied language and self-harm. To protect himself and others he was often shackled. When Jesus got off the boat that had brought him to the Gerasenes, he was immediately confronted by this man.

Jesus saw at once the spiritual dimension; this man was possessed by demons. With a word of command, Jesus drove out the demons (whose name was Legion). The man was set free, a new creation in Christ. All who saw him marveled.

When it is time for Jesus to return home, the man formerly possessed by demons asks Jesus if he can go with him. What a poignant scene! No, Jesus, says. Stay here and give testimony to what the Lord has done for you. Which this man did, with great effectiveness. Note Matthew 4:25: "Great crowds followed him from Galilee and the Decapolis....."

Embracing the adventure with Jesus means following in his steps. It means crossing boundaries that may place us in situations out of our comfort zone. We might come upon people who whose manner of life is different, whose religious and political views don't align with our own, whose behavior shocks us. Jesus went to such a place. This visit, through the faithful testimony of the man Jesus delivered, bore much fruit.

In this season of division and differentiation, we all face many boundaries. What are the boundaries before you? Some boundaries separate us from bewildering and disturbing paganism. Some boundaries separate us from those who vote for the other



party. Some boundaries separate us from family members with whom relationship is broken.

Let us follow in the steps of Jesus, bearing his name. One of my favorite gospel songs declares, "There is strength in the name of the Lord, there is power in the name of the Lord, there is hope in the name of the Lord: blessed is He, who comes in the name of the Lord."

Blessed are those who follow in the steps of Jesus, who embrace the adventure, who cross boundaries for him, who go in the name of the Lord.

Property Development

We are delighted to report tremendous progress on our Hope for Tomorrow project! This summer we have:

- •completed reinsulating and reroofing the sanctuary
- •begun gutting the lower level beneath the sanctuary in preparation for remodeling
- •selected interior finishes and placed our flooring order ahead of price increases
- •closed our construction loan and long-term note with Alerus Bank
- •signed an agreement to market spaces in the Hope Center as they come available

After announcing that demolition work would begin in June, we experienced a delay of six weeks due to asbestos abatement issues. A project of this magnitude teaches patience! But having received the necessary permits, demolition work began in late July and has moved quickly. We acknowledge that it is jarring to see the original buildings of Hope Church gone. We look back with great fondness and appreciation for these spaces that housed 65 years of ministry. We celebrate the wonderful people who loved the Lord and served his people there.

As we look ahead, the final project completion date is uncertain. It is heavily dependent on the weather and material supply. In the short term, demolition and site work will continue into the first of September. We will also close on the purchase of the house at 7120 Portland. Thereafter, work will commence on the building infrastructure. The foundations will be poured for footings, pads, walls, and the new elevator shaft.

At the same time, the west wall of the sanctuary will be excavated for lower level classroom windows. Then, regrading, utility work, and partial resurfacing will take place in the Fourth Avenue parking lot. That will take us well into November. God willing, the weather will hold out and the material deliveries will enable us to continue with work on the building exterior walls and roofing.

What an exciting time this is in the life of Hope Church! God has done great things! And, we look ahead with great anticipation, knowing that God has great plans in store for us.

Hope Center reaches out to the community of Richfield! The new signs are up and inviting people to find comfort, support, assistance, and caring friends inside our fresh facilities. Hope Center, the third branch of our "ministry trinity" (along with Hope Church and Hope Shores), is specifically focused on welcoming and serving the people of Richfield and neighboring communities. Programs include education, childcare, youth outreach, affordable clothing and home goods, and global missions.

On July 27, the session elders of Hope Church toured Hope Center to see the facilities and learn about the variety of programs and ministries represented within. They paused frequently to pray. Carrying small vials of eucalyptus oil, they anointed doorways, desks, chairs, and equipment, asking God to bless the people who come, the people who administrate these programs, and those who volunteer their service.

As a newly elected elder, I was seeing some of these facilities for the first time. It was both solemn and exciting to visit the places where we expect the Holy Spirit to bless people by responding to their specific needs, some of which we know are difficult and even painful. We want Hope Center to become an inviting beacon in our community, a welcoming and comfortable place where people will experience the love of Jesus in practical and personal ways.

The ministries and programs at Hope Center are Vine + Branches, Richfield Young Life, Frontier Fellowship, Hope Preschool and School Age Care, Blossomtime Montessori, and Richfield Public Schools Alternative Education Program.
