About the Course

Grade 1 students read tales of their nation's indigenous people. The captain ideas in this course are that 1) "Native Americans" are not one people group, but many, with very diverse cultures, languages, and ways of living, and 2) Their cultures and ways of living were heavily informed by the geography of where they settled, since they could only use what was available naturally for food, shelter, water, and clothing. Teachers are highly encouraged to research the tribes that lived near your home in addition to the ones you will read about this year. Look for museums, living history shows, state and national parks, etc., where you can see artifacts and hear stories. Pretend play and scouting activities that reflect the books are also highly encouraged. You'll also find suggestions for afternoon occupations included on the right column of the lesson.

How To Teach



Prepare

Read through the lesson and gather any materials or find any necessary links. If you have not already read the book, you may want to read the selected pages in advance.



Recap

Connect back to the previous lesson. Ask students to give a summary of what they remember. (Full narration is not necessary.)



Introduce

Use a picture, map, or engaging question to peak the students interest in the day's lesson. If necessary, you may talk about one or two unfamiliar words that will be crucial to understanding.



Read

Read the day's passage aloud.



Narrate

Have students retell the passage orally.



Discuss

Give the student an opportunity to share thoughts on the lesson and any connections made. You could ask them what they thought about the passage or ask an open-ended question.


