What is a Mandala?

A mandala is a wondrous and meaningful design made in the form of a circle. A simple definition of the mandala is that it is a circular drawing made to represent the harmony and wholeness of life or the wholeness of a person. Tibetans used the mandalas for calming themselves and for thinking about the meaning of life.

Where did Mandalas originate?

These special drawings were first created in Tibet over 2,000 years ago. Since then, they have been made by cultures from the Aztecs to the Navajo Indians to people today.

What are they used for?

People often create mandalas to form a simple representation of who they are.

Why a circle?

The shape of a mandala is a circle because a circle is the most simple and universal shape we find in the world around us. It is the form of an eye, the sun, and a snowflake. Also, since there is always a center to a circle, as you look at a circle it exercises your mind and draws you into the center of yourself or your topic.

Requirements:

- 1. Take 2-3 minutes to complete a quick write about Santiago. Consider what his essential qualities are, what defines him, and what is most important to him throughout the novel.
- 2. Include the novel title and author **outside** the Mandala.
- 3. Identify 6-8 symbols that represent who Santiago is in the novel and draw them on the Mandala Handout.
 - a. Must be hand-drawn or computer-generated (see my examples)
 - b. Tracing is acceptable
 - c. Can include no more than 2 words as symbols
- 4. Identify 2-3 quotes from the novel that help the reader understand Santiago's character.
- 5. Choose one symbol from the Mandala and write an 8-10 sentence analysis of how the symbol pertains to Santiago's character/journey.
 - a. This is **NOT** a plot summary! This is an analysis!
 - b. The symbol analysis will be typed and turned in on Classroom.
- 6. On the back of the Mandala, identify each symbol and what it represents in the novel.
