Why survey?

- Survey is a way to give voice to Ukrainians to express their needs and views
- First Survey of Ukrainians was conducted in May 2023 UACT was the first organisation in Ireland to ask Ukrainians about their needs
- Other channels of learning about the needs of Ukrainian community:
 - Ukrainian Community Center Rathmines
 - Rallies for peace, anti-war protests
 - Clean-ups and cultural events
- We are in a <u>unique</u> position to share insights about Ukrainian community by combining qualitative and quantitative data



Survey details

Data collection method: online questionnaire

Data collection period: 27 Jan 2023 – 08 Feb 2023 (12 days)

Target audience: Ukrainians in Ireland who found protection

from war

Distribution method: social media, Telegram chats and groups, Youtube video, personal messages, printed QR codes

Language of questionnaire: Ukrainian

Languages of responses: Ukrainian, russian, English










Demographic: totals, gender and age


- 4273 adults participated in Survey
- 3665 children
- Overall 7938 people, which is 10% of all Ukrainians that requested temporary protection in Ireland (12% from estimated number of people staying in state)








Demographic: family status



*Distribution is the same as in 2022











First temporary protection respondents received...

















% of employed respondents



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

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












Pre-school age 0 - 4 18%







Children: challenges



Clear correlation with parent's further plans:

68% of children whose parents plan to **return to Ukraine** when there is an opportunity are happy


76% of children whose parents do not have specific plans are happy.

91% of children whose parents decided to stay permanently in Ireland are happy.



Children: education status

99% of children in the age 5-17 attending a school



43% of children study in two schools – Irish offline and Ukrainian online



Children studying in one school are happier than children studying in two schools (82% and 75% accordingly)

Guidance on continuing education

Observation:


Lots of questions from Ukrainians on process for students that are already studying and those who are going to proceed education this year. No guidance is available yet, issue is time-sensitive

What could help:

Clear guidance how Ukrainian children with Ukrainian documents that are living in Ireland can continue education in Irish colleges or universities



Children: afterschool activities





Mental health support for children

Observation:

We regularly receive requests to recommend a psychologist that works with kids.

Last year Ukrainian Action launched a project to unite all qualified Ukrainian psychologists in Ireland. While we achieved the goal, the group turned out to be small, and only a few people work with children. Those people are normally fully booked and not available to accommodate new requests

"Parents are more likely to ask for help for their children than for themselves, but there are no programs available"

What could help:

Access to mental health support for children

"My young teenage son needs help from psychologist. It would be great if school could provide one so that he does not think it was me who sent him"






Impact of war: psychological support






Impact of war: situation in Ukraine


What should happen in Ukraine so that you can go back?



87% of respondents can name at least one factor that will prompt them to consider going back to Ukraine




72% of those who decided to stay in Ireland can name at least one factor that will prompt them to go back










