The Princeton Project 55 Fellowship program connects talented Princeton graduates with some of the most effective and innovative public interest organizations around the United States. Our Fellows spend a year working in substantive, paid positions and join a lifelong community of more than 2,000 Princeton alumni who have launched their postgraduate lives through Project 55 since the program's inaugural cohort in 1990.

What makes a Project 55 Fellowship unique is our holistic approach to personal and professional development. Fellows engage in enrichment and community building through various intentional aspects of the Fellowship program. Each Fellow receives a professional placement at one of our partner organizations, is matched with a mentor from within our network and supported by local volunteer area committees, and participates in a year-long curriculum of personal and leadership development.

This formative and fully immersive experience instills in each Fellow a greater awareness of critical social issues, a deeper understanding of their capacity to bring about change, and a lifelong commitment to civic engagement. Fellows are able to impact social change by contributing to an organizational mission that is both personally and professionally meaningful. On the Path serves as Princeton AlumniCorps' directory, sharing details about each Project 55 Fellow participating in this year's program.

The Project 55 Fellowship Program is made possible by over 100 volunteers, more than 500 donors, and 32 nonprofit partner organizations throughout the United States. Thus far, there are 41 Fellows that have accepted offers to participate in the Project 55 Fellowship Program during the 2022-23 program year.




Caryn Tomljanovich (SHE/HER)





Development Associate, Association to Benefit Children


