Gathering eggs at Owen Sound this year

Jim Heywood's Venison Stew

(Serves 6)

1-1/2 to 2 lb, lean venison stew meat, cut into 1-inch pieces

3 thsp. cooking oil

I medium onion, cut into small pieces

3 stalks celery, cut into 3/4 inch pieces

1 clove garlic

4 thsp. flour

1 c. boiling water, stock or beef bouillon

1 (1 lb.) can tomatoes, chopped, with jince

1 (12-oz.) bottle of beer

1/2 tsp. thyme

1 bay leaf

Salt & pepper to taste

1 tsp. Worchestershire sauce

3 carrots, cut into 3.4-inch pieces

2 c. rutabaga, cut into 3 4-inch pieces

2 c. potatoes, cut into 3 4-mch pieces

Brown venison cubes in oil in a deep cast iron pot or other heavy Dutch oven type pot. Remove meat, leaving oil in pot. Add onions, celery and garlic to pot and cook until just tender, do not brown. Add flour to pot and stir in well. Now add boiling water, stock or beef bouillon and stir until thickened and smooth. Add tomatoes, their juice, beer, spices and browned venison. Stir until well mixed. Reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for 1 hour and 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add carrots and rutabaga and cook an additional 30 minutes, covered. Add potatoes and cook until they're tender.

HATCHERY REPORT

Presently we have about 176,000 eyed up Salmon eggs. Permit calls for a release of 150,000 Salmon. Our first batch of eggs were fertilized, water-hardened for one hour and disinfected in Wescodyne solution for 10 minutes and then placed in the incubators.


This has been the practice for several years. One tray, 16, was not treated with Wescodyne and the results perfect. We lost approximately 40% of our eggs. Phoned the Ministry, not in touch with their top Hatchery personnel.

Our main problem turned out to be we did not uter-harden the eggs long enough to fully close the hote in the egg after fertilizing the egg. We then proceeded to use Wescodyne to sterilize the eggs. The Wescodyne had broken down into an acid solution, permeated through the hole and killed the egg.

Four days later we went up to Owen Sound and brought back 65,000 more eggs. These were tertilized, water-hardened over moht, treated the next day with fresh Wescodyne and had about 98% success.

It was a costly lesson and should not have happened. A new procedure has been written and will be followed in the future.

I would like to thank all the volunteers who helped gather the eggs, and the hatchery operators who looked after the eggs on a daily basis. This is teamwork at its best.



The board of directors has called a special meeting for all members of the Blue Water Anglers. Your attendance at this meeting should be viewed as mandatory, as you will be voting on the future of your Club and Hatchery.

At present, the Board of Directors has submitted a recommendation, that unless there are major changes in the involvement of our general membership, the Club has no choice but to cease operations and shutdown the Club and Hatchery

This was not an easy decision, however following the recent years of constant struggling, both from a financial and manpower perspective, there really is no other viable option. This recommendation currently needs to be voted on by the membership, as this is your club, and you together must make this final decision. Anyone not attending this meeting will be counted as a vote for the disbanding of the Blue Water Anglers. Anyone voting to keep the club alive will also be expected to make a commitment to assist in operating this club. We need this commitment to verify our ability to keep operating the club, and it must be in writing and binding, as the past has shown us that we cannot rely on simple "lip service".

There is a drastic need for additional people to fill some vacant positions, and provide some physical assistance to help with the many tasks required. Currently, there are only a hand-full of people who conduct all of the required duties, regrettably some of whom have already submitted their resignations.

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2001 Sarnia Fishing & Outdoors Show Summary

The 16th Annual Sarnia Fishing & Outdoors Show held at the Clearwater Arena on April 6th – 8th was another big success. The 2500 paid attendees and approximately 250 kids (6 and under free) had a chance to visit over 60 exhibitor booths. While paid attendance was down about 500 from last year, the show made a profit of approximately \$9,000, which will go directly towards the 2001/2002 operation of the fish hatchery. This compares with show profits of \$13,327 in 2000, \$10,800 in 1999 and \$6,400 in 1998.

Poached Salmon with Zucchini

Ingredients

4 salmon steaks (1/2-inch thick)

2 tablespoons water

½ teaspoon chicken stock or flavouring

3 medium zucchinis (1 pound)

¼ teaspoon salt (optional)

3/4 teaspoon minced fresh basil

1/2 cup white dry wine or skim milk

Place salmon in large saucepan or skillet that has been coated with cooking spray. Add milk or wine, water and bouillon. Cover and bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer until fish is done, about 6 minutes. Cut zucchini into small strips; steam with a vegetable steamer for two to three minutes. Pour into a bowl and toss gently with basil. Transfer to serving plates. Top with salmon. Garnish with sprigs of basil.

Hatchery Report

Fin Clipping was done on both the Salmon and Rainbow Trout.


The Salmon had the right pectoral fin clipped and the Rainbow had the right lower fin clipped. Three days after the start of clipping we started to stock out fish.

The stocking went well, low water in some of the creeks prevented us from dropping fish in our usual spot. Most of the Rainbows were stocked in the Sarnia area; Bridgeview Marina, North Slip, Sarnia Bay, Hickory Creek, O'Brien Creek and the balance stocked in the Ausable River at Port Franks. We raised and stocked 156,949 Salmon and 45,413 Rainbows for a total of 202,362 fish.

It is with regret that I have handed in my resignation as hatchery co-ordinator. My health and the need of time for other things have made the decision for me.

I would like to thank all the operators and board members who have assisted me in making my final year a success.

Do Trout Feed Primarily by Sight or by Smell?

Trout are primarily visual feeders. They typically live in cool, clear lakes, rivers, creeks and streams where they can put their great eyesight to good use. Sometimes stream trout are so selective that they will only pick off the tiny female mayflies that are lying on the surface of the water. How can the trout tell? They can see the minuscule dab of green or yellowish colour that is the fly's eggs. Talk about being selective. While all trout have great eyesight, it never hurts to make a lure or bail small good. If I am casting a spinner for stream trout or pulling a spoon for lakes, I'll always add a little bit of scent. The trout will spot the lure, swoop in behind it to see if it's something edible, small the scent and wallop it.

I'm wondering if walleye and pickerel are the same fish. And are they types of pike?

A lot of people are confused about these fish. True pickerel (redfin, grass and chain pickerel) are a different ecies from walleye. Most Canadians, however, mistakenly call walleye "yellow pickerel." So if you were in southern Ontario, for example, and you heard people talking about catching pickerel, chances are good they meant walleye. Much more common in the U.S., pickerel are found only in small pockets of Canada. Walleye, however, are among the most widespread of all gamefish. They're found right down the center of North America, from the Arctic Ocean to the Gulf of Mexico. Walleye are not related to pike. They are the largest members of the perch family. Pickerel, on the other hand, are indeed members of the pike family and look very much like northerns.

Cooking Salmon

Salmon fillets (allow 6 ounces per person) 1 carrot 1 small onion, sliced 1 stalk celery, sliced 2 slices lemon 2 slices lemon 5 Several sprigs of parsley 6 Bay leaves (Turkish, or ½ of a California bay leaf) Salt to taste 1 cup dry white wine

Juice of half a lemon

- Cut the salmon fillets into individual portions.
- Place the carrot, onion, sliced celery, lemon, parsley & bay leaves in a saucepan.
- Add the fish, cold water to cover, salt to taste, the wine & the lemon juice. Bring the pot to a boil, uncovered.
- Adjust heat to simmer & let fish cook for 5 minutes.
- Turn off the heat and leave fish undisturbed for 10 minutes. Then remove it carefully to a serving platter.
 The salmon will be perfectly done. It is delicious served either hot or cold.

Cold Poached Salmon, Warm Dill Mayonnaise or Aioli Sauce

Ingredients

- 1-1/2 qt. Court Bouillon simmering
- 4 8-oz salmon steaks
- 1 cup warm dill mayonnaise or 1 cup Aioli Sauce
- 4 cups Salad Greens Mesclun or Spring Mix
- 4 bunches cherry tomatoes on the sprig

Preparation

- Poach salmon in simmering court bouillon, and cool. The texture of the fish should be a shiny opaque flake.
- Remove skin, and brush lightly with Extra Virgin Olive Oil to glaze it, and place it on a bed of salad greens.
- Stripe with warm dill mayonnaise or Aioli Sauce.
- 4. Garnish with cherry tomatoes on the sprig.

POINT EDWARD CHARITY CASINO 2001 SARNIA SALMON DERBY

During this year's Salmon Derby we experienced some real changes in weather patterns. On the opening weekend we had to scrape the frost off the boat windshields, but by mid-week we had three days of record-high temperatures. Fish entries were once again, on the low side with only 876 entered, about the same as last year.

Club member and Derby sponsor, Al Grant's 20.48 lb. salmon caught off Port Franks took top honours and the \$5,000., compliments of Point Edward Charity Casino. Derby participants were down slightly, 727 single, 62 daily and 113 family tickets sold. SPRING LAKE TACTICS FOR BROWNS

If you want to target for brown trout, spring's inshore fishery should offer enough action to keep any angler happy. When working open Lake Huron waters look for protected harbors, points, underwater rocky shoals, sand bars, and mud lines from small creek mouths. Baitfish seem to stock up in these areas and greedy browns are quick to notice.

Planer boards and long lining have become the hand on favorite brown trout catching technique used locally. Planer boards can be put into two categories, in-line planer boards and catamaran boards. The latter is the dual planer board system that requires a towrope from the planer mast to the board. The new compact in-line planer board is the baby brother to the dual planer boards. The principal is the same only that these boards run directly from your fishing line.

In the spring browns are usually the first fish to notice that bait has moved into the shallow beaches to spawn. For any system to work you must thoroughly troll your brown trout holding waters. This means generally keeping your board in less than 10 feet of water and putting your inside planer board just off the beach, sometimes in only 3 feet of water.

For this reason trollers rely heavily on floating type body baits that best imitate the smelt and alewife forage base like Rapalas, Bombers, and Luhr Jensens new Power Minnows. Small spoons like ¼ to 2/5 ounce silver/blue, silver/green Krocodiles and Cleo's account for good numbers of fish as well.

Remember you're fishing in shallow water and brown trout tend to be real spooky, that's why a slight chop on the water can work in your favor. Too much boat commotion from your boat and others trolling in the same area can cut brown trout fishing short. That's why planer boards and trolling in a gentle zigzag patter produces fish. Remember also that browns tend to be line shy, 10# test line is about the maximum you should use.

If you're rigging two or more lines from a planer board remember the outside lines should have the longest leads. When a fish hits it does battle directly behind the boat and won't tangle in the other lines running closer to the boat.

Browns seem to run in small packs during the spring to feed on bait. Remember the area that produced fish and re-work it until you're certain they have moved on.

ROTATING FLASHERS

Last winter I had the opportunity to talk with Lake Michigan charter boat captain Al Laaksonen of Finlander Charters. During our conversation Al asked me if the boy's on Lake Huron used the Dipsy Diver / Flasher technique that was producing so well, especially on bigger fish for the boy's over on his side. (See diagram below)

This summer I had the opportunity to apply this technique during our off shore fishery and needless to say, Al was right. After some experimenting with trolling speed and colour combinations the fish started to come and mostly the larger variety.

Rotating flashers trailed with cut herring have long been recognized as one of the most effective trolling techniques used on the West Coast. Flashers should not be confused with metal dodgers, although the principles are similar; to attract fish and bring them to your lure; to add action to a trolling lure, squid or cut herring. Both are capable when tolled slow to produce a wobbling side to side action, however with the flasher it not only wobbles but rotates 360 degrees in the reverse direction.

The flash and sound from the flasher mimics a feeding salmon and the trailing lure represents the forage base just being attacked. Responding to the flash the salmon moves in closer to investigate and spots the trailing lure. Flashers are most effective at trolling speeds (2.0 - 2.5 m.p.h.) allowing it to just barely roll in a wide acre.


Luhr Jensen's Coyote Flasher is the best deep water trolling attractor available on the market today. It features a full 360-degree rotation and intense horizontal flash that draws fish in from greater distances. Also its molded plastic construction makes it easier to pull then the conventional metal flashers, making it the perfect choice for use with the larger Dipsy Driver. Coyote Flashers come in two sizes and a variety of colour combinations.

Most Great Lake anglers trolling flashers from downriggers use a dependable heavy – tension Scotty or Offshore type release and place the flasher about 10 feet behind the cannonball, but on certain situations distances further back will take fish.

Dipsy Divers have long been recognized as an effective under water diving tool and paired up with a flasher its even more effective drawing in fish that would normally be outside of your trolling area.
