Paul and Sue Rosenau, a Minnesota couple, were sitting in bed when they realized they had won \$180 million in Powerball. It was the fifth anniversary of their granddaughter Makayla's death from Krabbe disease, a rare condition that destroys nerve cells. The couple decided to use their winnings to start a nonprofit foundation, aiming to fund research and find treatments for Krabbe disease. They dedicated their lives to helping families affected by the condition and used \$26.4 million of their winnings to establish the Legacy of Angels Foundation, later renamed the Rosenau Family Research Foundation. Between 2009 and 2016, the foundation provided over \$10 million in grants to Krabbe researchers, leading to advances in treatments. Sue and Paul Rosenau, a loving couple who tragically lost their granddaughter Makayla to Krabbe disease in 2011, have dedicated their lives to finding a cure for this rare condition. In 2016, they won the lottery and used the funds to support research on gene therapy, which showed promising results. Dr. Maria Escolar, one of Makayla's doctors and researchers at the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh UPMC, led the project. The Rosenaus' foundation has since provided over \$6 million in thunding for Dr. Escolar's work. The couple has also awarded more than \$2.5 million to other rural community. Makayla's mon, Stacy Pike, is a board member of the foundation, which is dedicated to improving the quality of life for children with rare their disorders. Despite personal struggles, including suc's diagnosis with stage 3 varian cancer in 2016, the search Foundation, which was renamed in her memory five years later. The organization continues to work towards finding a cure for Krabbe disease and other rare conditions, using the blueprint left by Sue. Paul and Susan Rosenau's lives were forever changed after their granddaughter Makayla Lynn Pike passed away in 2003 due to Krabbe Disease, a rare genetic disorder with no known cure. On the fifth anniversary of Makayla's death, hey won \$180.1 million in
