WesBanco Arena, located in Wheeling, West Virginia, was initially known as the Wheeling Civic Center and has undergone changes since its construction began in 1975. With a capacity for 5,600 concert-goers or 5,406 ice hockey enthusiasts, this multi-purpose arena has played host to various events including concerts, sports matches, and conventions. The venue's history dates back to February 1973 when the idea of building a civic center was proposed, followed by architectural firm Mosser Construction Inc. being appointed in May 1973. After receiving approval from Wheeling City Council on April 16, 1974, construction began in September 1975 with Dalton, Dalton, Little & Newport taking over as architects. WesBanco Arena officially opened its doors to the public on April 19, 1977, with a Doobie Brothers concert that drew in 6,922 attendees. The arena has undergone name changes, with WesBanco signing a 10-year naming rights deal worth \$2.3 million in October 2003 and renewing it for another 10 years in August 2013. The venue offers a range of amenities, including 23,684 square feet of space, 7,500 square feet of meeting room space, and an in-house catering department capable of accommodating parties from ten to several hundred people. It has been the home to various sports teams, such as the Wheeling Nailers, Ohio Valley Greyhounds, and West Virginia Roughriders, as well as hosting events like the Mountain East Conference basketball tournament and the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference wrestling tournament. Byrd Intermodal Transportation Center is equipped to accommodate cars for maximum capacity, while the back parking lot provides designated spaces for guests at certain events, as well as for trucks, trailers, and buses of performing acts with direct stage access through a large entrance door. The arena also ensures accessibility for handicap patrons by offering direct access from designated parking spots, an elevator, and convenient locations to concessions and restrooms. The Wheeling Nailers have been hosting home games at the center since 1993. Notably, it hosted three crucial games in the 2016 Kelly Cup Finals against the Allen Americans, with the hometown team initially winning game three before losing games four and five, resulting in a series lead for Allen. The arena has also played host to numerous events and performances, including ECHL All Star Classics and high-profile concerts by Emerson, Lake & Palmer and Elton John. Additionally, it hosts conferences such as the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Hall of Fame, with display cases showcasing memorabilia from local schools and professional athletes like Bill Mazerowski. The arena's capabilities make it an ideal venue for a wide range of events, including stage shows, sporting games, and concerts, making it a favorite among both performers and audience members in Wheeling.
