This rhyme isn't alone -- there are others out there like "Bang Bang Rosie" from the U.K. and "Bang Away Lulu" from the Appalachian region. Sometimes a woman with an alligator purse shows up, other times it's Susan B. Anthony or even more quirky characters. The verses follow a specific pattern of A-B-C-B rhymes, but what makes them stand out are the taboo terms and phrases that get quickly cut off by the next line -- this is called enjambed double entendre. Because kids love to be creative, there are countless versions of this rhyme floating around, each with their own unique twists and turns. Terms you might find include "switchboard operators," World Wars, and other fun bits. For those who don't know, a switchboard operator used to work the phones back when everyone had landlines. The earliest recorded version of the rhyme is from vaudeville in the early 20th century and features a girl named Mary. Later versions popped up in public schools as they became more popular and normalized. As the rhyme gained traction, so did its silly references -- think kissing, boys in bathrooms, bras, and fibs.
