Where the Wild Things Are by Maurice Sendak, a magical story about a little boy who meets a troupe of teeth-gnashing monsters and starts a wild rumpus. Knight Owl by Christopher Denise, a charming picture book that won a 2022 Good Housekeeping Kids' Book Award, where a tiny owl bravely defends a castle from a fire-breathing dragon during the Night Watch. If You Give a Mouse a Cookie by Laura Numeroff, a humorous case of cause and effect that begins with Oliver giving a chocolate chip cookie to Quinley, a mouse. the publishing industry has undergone significant changes since 1996. originally, there were fewer children's bestseller lists, but now they have proliferated, alongside larger advances for authors and illustrators. a notable change was the emergence of harry potter in 1998, which dominated both hardcover and paperback lists with its novels placing among the top 20. other strong debuts include thomas the tank engine, blue's clues, the chronicles of narnia, sandra boynton's board books, and if you give a mouse a cookie and its companions.
