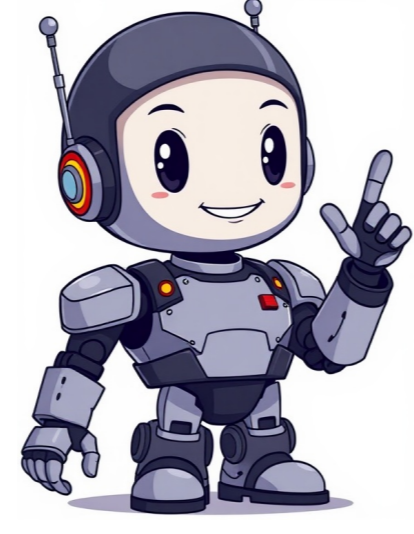

===== Roxas, a municipality in Isabela province, had a population of 2,194 in the 2020 Census, making up 6.49% of Naguilian's total population. The town has seen significant growth from 1,670 residents in 1990 to 2,194 in 2020, with an annualized growth rate of 2.76%. This represents a substantial increase in the past three decades. The age group with the highest population in Roxas is between 5-9 years old, followed by those under 13 and 1-4 years old. On the other hand, the lowest population ranges are seen among residents aged 70-74 and 80 years or older. Roxas shares a border with several barangays, including Bantug, San Antonio, and San Rafael. The town has undergone significant infrastructure development since its mayor took office in 1996. The construction of roads, public markets, and parks has contributed to the town's growth. For example, the Roxas Public Market led to the diversion of the national highway, connecting various barangays. The local government has also invested in concreting roads, with a total length of over 30 kilometers developed during the tenure of previous mayors. The town has received support from government agencies, such as the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), which provided funds for infrastructure projects and shelter units. The municipality of Roxas boasts a unique blend of infrastructure and community development initiatives, particularly under Mayor Benedict Calderon's administration. ===== The town's Core Shelter Assistance Program has been instrumental in providing support to families affected by typhoon Juan, while the Green House Project initiative has helped local residents engage in high-value crop cultivation. The Roxas Astrodome, a three-level seating facility with a capacity of 5,000 to 6,000 people, serves as a hub for entertainment and local events. Roxas is characterized by its well-maintained roads, including the Maharlika Road National Road, which extends northward to adjacent municipalities and provinces. The town's municipal road network provides connectivity to neighboring towns, while the national highway offers access to distant destinations. The Philippine National Police (PNP) maintains law and order in Roxas, with a ratio of one policeman to 1,381 persons, surpassing the national standard. The municipality is also equipped with fire trucks, radio transceivers, and service vehicles, ensuring public safety. Power supply in Roxas is managed by Isabela Electric Cooperative (ISELCO) District II, which provides electricity to over 8,392 households, or approximately 84.05% of the total households. The town's water supply system is one of its richest, with residents relying on shallow and deep wells, as well as pump-well systems. Telecommunications services are readily available in Roxas, with a leading telephone line provided by PLDT. Radio broadcasting from nearby towns is also received, while several AM stations, including DZCV and Bombo Radyo, offer local news and entertainment. Internet services have become prominent in the town, with wireless broadband internet now offering 4G and LTE connectivity. The municipality boasts a high number of bus and jeepney terminals, making transportation convenient for residents and visitors alike. The sisters from Roxas, Ilocos Norte, are now famous in the Philippines and abroad. GV Florida Transport is their company. ===== GV Florida Transport offers services beyond the town limits of Roxas to other provinces such as Ilocos, Cagayan, Nueva Vizcaya, Pangasinan, and Manila. Travelling within the town is mainly done on tricycles - a type of auto rickshaw that uses a motorcycle with a small attached cab. There are also many vans that use for transportation from Roxas to other parts of the province. Many buses also pass through Roxas going via Cagayan to Manila and Baguio. Some of these buses are Victory Liner, Ballesteros Bus Line Corporation (BBLC), DALIN, Lizardo Trans (GL), GMW Trans (a sister company of GV Florida Transport), Maribel (a sister company of BBLC), Rosalinda and DOLBO Transportation. The story of 4th Power, also known as 4th Impact, began when a fan from the UK suggested auditioning for The X Factor. Despite facing numerous challenges and setbacks, the group persevered and eventually made it to the live shows. Their performance of "Bang Bang" by Jessie J, Ariana Grande and Nicki Minaj wowed the audience and judges alike, earning them a standing ovation. 4th Impact's Journey: From Invas10n Tour to Global Recognition The Philippines' very own 4th Impact has come a long way since their Invas10n Tour in August 2017. The group officially announced their first album, recorded under Star Music, and embarked on an international tour in Auckland, New Zealand, and Melbourne and Sydney, Australia. In November 2017, they signed with US-based Granda Entertainment and We R 1 Music Group and began recording an EP of original music. They also released the official theme song for the Star Cinema movie 'Ang Dalawang Mrs. Reyes' entitled "It's Not The Same Anymore". On March 21, 2018, Tony Valor announced the international release of his single "D' Nah Nah", recorded in collaboration with 4th Impact. They also performed as the opening act for Boyzone in Manila (Farewell Tour) on August 26, 2018. In December 2019, 4th Impact announced that they would be performing at the 24th Asian Television Awards. However, the COVID-19 pandemic caught them in the midst of their preparations to release new original music. Despite the challenges, the group managed to release their first single since going independent, K(No)w More, toward the end of March 2020. They thrived in the livestreaming space and were recognized as Celebrity of the Year in the 2020 Kumu Livestreaming Awards. In August 2020, they produced and streamed their online digital concert entitled Dream5, in celebration of the 5th anniversary of 4th Impact. They also released music video-esque song and dance covers on their Youtube channel to maintain fan and audience engagement. In February 2021, the group opened their own studio where they planned to practice, rehearse, produce, and perform their own content. They envisioned that their studio would someday be a platform where they can help introduce new Filipino artists. In October 2021, 4th Impact announced that they have signed with ShowBT Philippines and will be coming out with new original music soon. Early in 2022, they revealed that they have begun recording their newest single, which they announced to be as a comeback track. The group started teasing details of their comeback, beginning with the announcement of a new group logo and the release of a fashion teaser video. They released their comeback single, Here We Go, on March 25, 2022, as part of a single album which includes the song, K(No)w More. Toward the end of June 2022, they announced that they will be releasing a new single on July 22, 2022. The group achieved a first in their music career by being chosen to represent the Philippines at the Asia Song Festival (ASF) 2022 held in Seoul, South Korea on October 14, 2022. In September 2023, 4th Impact announced the release of their debut US single, Distorted, which dropped on October 8, 2023. The municipality of Roxas is located in the coastal province of Isabela in the Philippines. It covers an area of 139.95 square kilometers and has a population of 65,839 as of 2020. The density of the population is approximately 470 inhabitants per square kilometer. Roxas consists of 26 barangays, each with its own unique demographic profile. Roxas, situated in Isabela, Region 2, Philippines, boast a strategic location, with distances to notable cities such as Aurora (14.67 km S8°E), Cabatuan (19.30 km S16°E), and Cauayan (25.98 km S37°E) among its neighbours.
